2000 Proposed Tax Rate

PUBLIC HEARING

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court will hold a public hearing on Friday, August 25, 2000 at 9 a.m. at the Rockcastle County Courthouse for the purpose of obtaining comments from the public regarding the proposed tax rate. Based on state estimates, this will add only one penny per week (.52c per year) to the average tax bill in Rockcastle County.

The tax rate levied last year was 0.074% and produced revenues in the amount of \$165,381. This year's compensating rate is 0.072% and will produce revenues in the amount of \$171,569. The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court proposes a tax rate of 0.074% which will produce a total of \$176,335 in revenues.

Revenue expected from New Property is \$5,431.48.
Revenue expected from Personal Property is \$44,322.67;
Revenue expected from Motor Vehicles is \$50,466,
and Revenue expected from Watercraft is \$1,178.

Revenue received in excess of last year's revenue will be used for General Government Purposes. The Kentucky General Assembly requires that the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court publish this notice with the above information contained herein.
