come, Joseph, a new addition to their family.

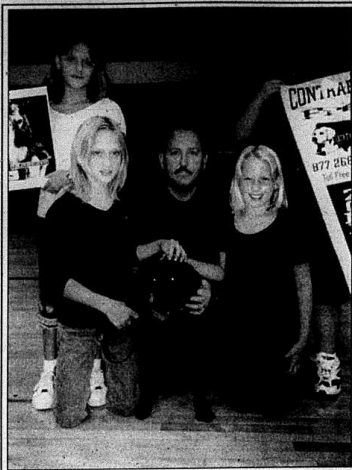

Tips for parents to help kids learn. 1. Spend time every day outside encouraging your children to crawl, run, jump, hop, skip, climb. Include balance and other physical activity as your children grow. 2. Provide a variety of block for playing, stacking and building. Use soft blocks for very young children; later add cardboard, plastic and/or wooden ones of differing sizes and colors. 3. Examine to the zoo. Follow your child and occasionally give examples of what observation really is. Sit or stand and watch a particular cage or family of animals for some time. Do not simply flip past everything with your hand. The entire zoo need not be covered in one visit. 4. Arrange for your children to be with other children. Begin with only one child and increase the number of children and length of time as your child grows.

Thought for the week: If children live with praise, they learn to appreciate.
