

Vitalize Mount Vernon Director Lynn Tatum is leading the charge to beautify Main Street once again this year.

However, she is hoping hings will go a little dif ferent than in previous beautification efforts. "Each year there are some very nice projects but they are only spotty through the town," she said. "One spot may be cleaned up and enhanced, but everything around it stays the same."

This year, Tatum hopes to get nearly everyone on Main Street involved in at least a small way. "It isn't nearly as nice to have one spot cleaned and enhanced when both sides of it are still in need of some work."

Mask mandate lifted

Three arrests made after local traffic stops yield meth

Troopers with the Kentucky State Police made three traffic stops that resulted in arrests involving methamphetamine last week in Rockcastle County.

According to KSP citations, last Tuesday, April 3rd, a trooper on routine patrol attempted to stop a vehicle that began driving away at a high rate of speed. The trooper gave chase but the vehicle sped away until the trooper lost sight of the vehicle in traffic.

According to the report, the trooper then located the vehicle on Level Green Road but when the vehicle was caught, the driver continued to speed away onto KY-70. After a chase, the report says the vehicle stopped at Briar Rose Road.

According to the citation, Eric W. Simpson, 25, of Crab Orchard, exited the vehicle and admitted to the officer that he had smoked marijuana and used meth the night before. A search revealed suspected meth in the vehicle along with marijuana.

Simpson was then arrested and transported to the Rockcastle County Detention Center where he was charged with reckless driving, improper passing, no registration plates, possession of

drug paraphernalia, failure to maintain insurance, operating a vehicle under the influence, possession of marijuana, possession of meth and fleeing or evading police.

In another incident on Saturday, April 8th, KSP troopers stopped Jerry Morris, 36, of McKee on Towhee Lane on suspicion of driving without a license since the officer recognized Morris as the driver.

I love to see the young generation succeed. America moving forward is a wonderful thing and kids these days know as much by the time they are 10 years old, as we knew at 30.

The down side, of course, is that means they are also exposed to bad things at three times the rate that we were.

But all in all, kids today seem to learn things much, much quicker than we did when I was a lad.

Paige and Spencer's son, Marcos, came by one day last week with his big Martin Guitar. My thoughts were, I would give him the benefit of my 50 years and show him some stuff that may help him. He has just been playing for a short time and I wanted to help him get ahead.

But danged if he didn't know more already than I learned in 15 years. He played for a minute or two and I had to use that time to switch my mind from "beginner teacher" to "advanced teacher" before he finished the song he was playing.

Then he played another and I realized, he doesn't need my help, at all.

Yes, I love to see this generation move forward. I love to see progress but I can't help but wish I had YouTube when I was a beginner.

When I was learning, I didn't have all the technology and virtual tools that kids have today.

When I started learning to play banjo my mother stood over the Victrola with her finger on the vinyl record slowing it down so that I could hear individual notes.

I had to tune my banio way down until the strings were flopping because a slow record plays at a lower pitch.

Mom would use her finger to slow the record for a few notes and then push down and stop it while I found those notes. on my banjo. Then she would let it spin slowly again for a few more notes and stop it again until I memorized those notes. Over and over and over again until I learned every, single note, oneby-one in Foggy Mountain Breakdown.

My poor mother stood there for hours making the record album repeat the same few notes over and over until I got it right.

Finally, after days of that kind of tedious work, I had the song down note for note. Of course, when I played it, it sounded a little like a record that was skipping from time to time so I had to spend the next month, correcting the timing. Getting the notes was the easy part. Playing them in time was much harder.

And then, Jimmy Brown the Newsboy was next. Note for note, stroke for stroke until that record too was old and scratchy.

But I have discovered that kids today have YouTube and CDs and videos and all kinds of technical tools they use to learn. They have video that they can pause or play slowly and actually watch the fellow's fingers playing the song. We didn't even have VCRs when I was learning. I had to wait to see Earl Scruggs on a tv show and that was very rare.

For 6,000 years, us musicians had to listen to a song to learn it. Anymore, they can listen and watch the fellow's fingers to see exactly how it is done while the guy playing it explains exactly what he is doing. No wonder music is getting better all the time.

It took me six months to learn a song right, then it took me 20 years to learn an entire set of songs to play.

But kids now can learn a song note for note in 15 minutes. That means they can learn a new set in a day. After 20 years of work, imagine how good they become.

> performing from 2PM to 4pm. May 5-7, we are hosting the Dual Sport Motorcycle Ride with over 500 participants. The following weekend,


May 12-13, the Woodsongs Songfarmers Weekend will take place with workshops on instruments, history, and techniques.






The power of the resurrection gives hope beyond

In Praise of Hellebores

One hardy evergreen plant that struts it's stuff in March is the hellebore. This plant hails from eastern Europe, and some species bloom from November to May. But most raised in our area of the United States is helleborus hybridis or helleborus spp. This garden perennial is especially glorious in neighborhood gardens as I type today's column.

The cost of this plant has been a major reason it's not found in more gardens. It takes three years from seed germination to blooming—so is priced more like a shrub than an annual. But, it's become quite common among serious gardeners, being shared among friends and neighbors. Most of the plants do produce seedlings that come up around mature plants. (Just remember it takes a baby 3 seasons before the first bloom.)

Those I've seen for sale at the box stores are generally sterile, having no seeds. This is a "pro"

if you're concerned about it becoming invasive...but a "con" if you're hoping to have

some little ones to plant in other spots or to share among friends and neighbors.

Blooms of the hellebore tend to droop, so planting them on a hill or raised area can be a big plus in appreciating them. Some do have upturned blooms, and some even the backside of the bloom looks georgeous. This year, the cold did cause leaves to die back, but this only made the blooms that popped out even more obvious. (Normally, I recommend snipping the old leaves just before blooming to display the blossoms more prominently.) The blooms

range from about a foot tall to mature clusters less

BLACK WALNUT BREAD

1 egg, lightly beaten 1 cup packed brown sugar

1 cup milk

1 cup black walnuts, chopped

3 cups all-purpose flour

3 teaspoons baking powder

1 pinch salt coarse 1 pinch cinnamon

2 and 1/4 cups all-purpose flour

1 and 1/2 cups sugar 3 teaspoons baking powder

1 teaspoon salt 1/2 cup Crisco 1 cup milk 2 eggs

1 and 1/2 teaspoons black walnut extract 1/2 cup ground black walnuts (reserving some for topping)

Preheat oven to 350°. Grease and flour or spray with non-stick spray a 9 x 13 baking dish. Mix flour, sugar, baking powder, and salt in a large bowl. Add Crisco, 2/3 cup of the milk, and extract. Beat 2 minutes on medium speed. Add the rest of the milk and eggs. Beat 2 minutes more. Stir in ground

black walnuts. Pour into prepared pan. Bake for 40 to 45 minutes. Pour glaze over cake while cake is still warm. Sprinkle with remaining walnuts.

GLAZE: 1 stick butter 1 cup evaporated milk 1 1/2 cup white sugar 1 teaspoon vanilla Boil for 3 minutes; pour over cake while cake and glaze are still warm.

BROWN SUGAR GLAZE

4 tablespoons butter 1/2 cup light brown sugar (packed) Pinch of salt 1/2 cup heavy cream

Melt butter in a medium saucepan over medium-low heat. Add the brown sugar to the butter and cook, stirring, for 1 minute. Add salt and cream; bring to a boil over medium heat. Continue cooking, stirring, for 2 minutes. Cool for about 15 to 20 minutes and then drizzle over warm cake.


