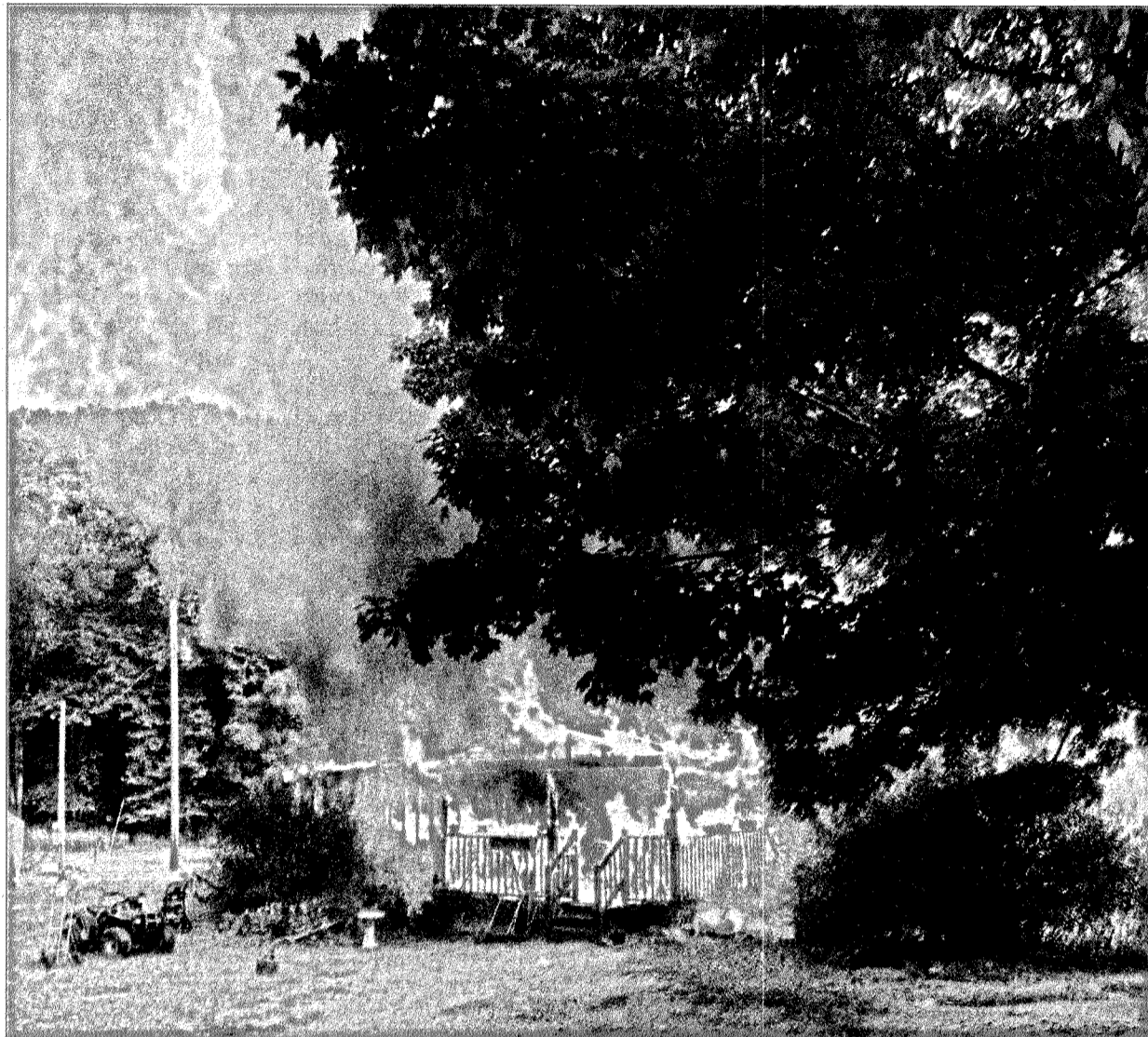

The Mount Vernon Fire Department, with mutual aid from the Brodhead Fire Department, responded to this residential structure fire on East Fork Skeggs Creek Road Sunday. Officials say the blaze was reported at about 5 p.m. Sunday and, due to the remote area, the home was completely engulfed by the time firefighters reached the scene. The home was a total loss but no injuries were reported. This was the second structure fire reported on Skeggs Creek Road in the past month but officials do not think the two incidents are related.

New commissioners sworn-in Monday at Livingston meeting

The Livingston City Commission has been two members short after recent resignations and officials have scrambled to find two replacements.

One of those replacements came too late for commission action so, by law, Governor Andy Beshear's office appointed Livingston resident Donna Durham to replace Katha Carpenter.

The remaining opening was filled during Monday night's regular monthly meeting when Mayor Dwane King swore in his daughter, Melissa Hahn, as the fourth city commissioner. Hahn replaces Julie Hazelwood who also resigned her commission seat last month.

However, this appointment is meeting with strong opposition from local resident and business owner Larry Davidson. Davidson says the Mayor and the City Commission have ig-

nored the city's nepotism ordinance

Tuesday, Davidson said, "this is a blatant disregard for our city ordinances." The local business owner expressed many of his reasons for disagreeing with the appointment and the current administration's lack of transparency saying the current administration is "destroying everything that we have strived to accomplish in the past five years."

However, Mayor King said before the appoint-

98 of the 120 counties in Kentucky are now in the red zone again. Just one month ago, none were.

Among those is Rockcastle County with a quickly rising incident rating of 35.08 Rockcastle has risen dramatically each week for five consecutive weeks. Kentucky's current average rate is 10.78.

The Cumberland Valley District Health Department says there are seven new confirmed cases and 34 additional probable cases in the past seven days in Rockcastle. There have been 27 COVID-related deaths in the county.

Burglary suspect caught by own camera

A complaint warrant was served against Mitchell Dooley, 36, of Berea, in connection with the burglary and robbery of a sporting goods store

in Rockcastle County in June.

According to the complaint, on June 19, the local business was entered at 5 a.m. and several items were stolen. The warrant does not say why

or how Dooley became a suspect but it does say that Kentucky State Police Detective Ryan Loudermilk, and other officers, went to Dooley's residence to find that Dooley was not home. While at the residence, police say they saw several shell casings on the ground and on the porch of the home. Neighbors also told police they had

heard gunshots in recent days. Several firearms were among the items stolen from the sporting goods store which is owned by Joe Cummins.

The warrant goes on to say that police interviewed Krissy Dooley, Mitchell's wife, who was incarcerated at the Rockcastle County Detention Center. Dooley's wife told police that her husband

had permission to be on the property and no one else was there.

Later that day, Loudermilk, and an ATF agent, caught up with Dooley after he met with probation and parole officers at the local courthouse. During the interview Dooley denied having any firearms at the

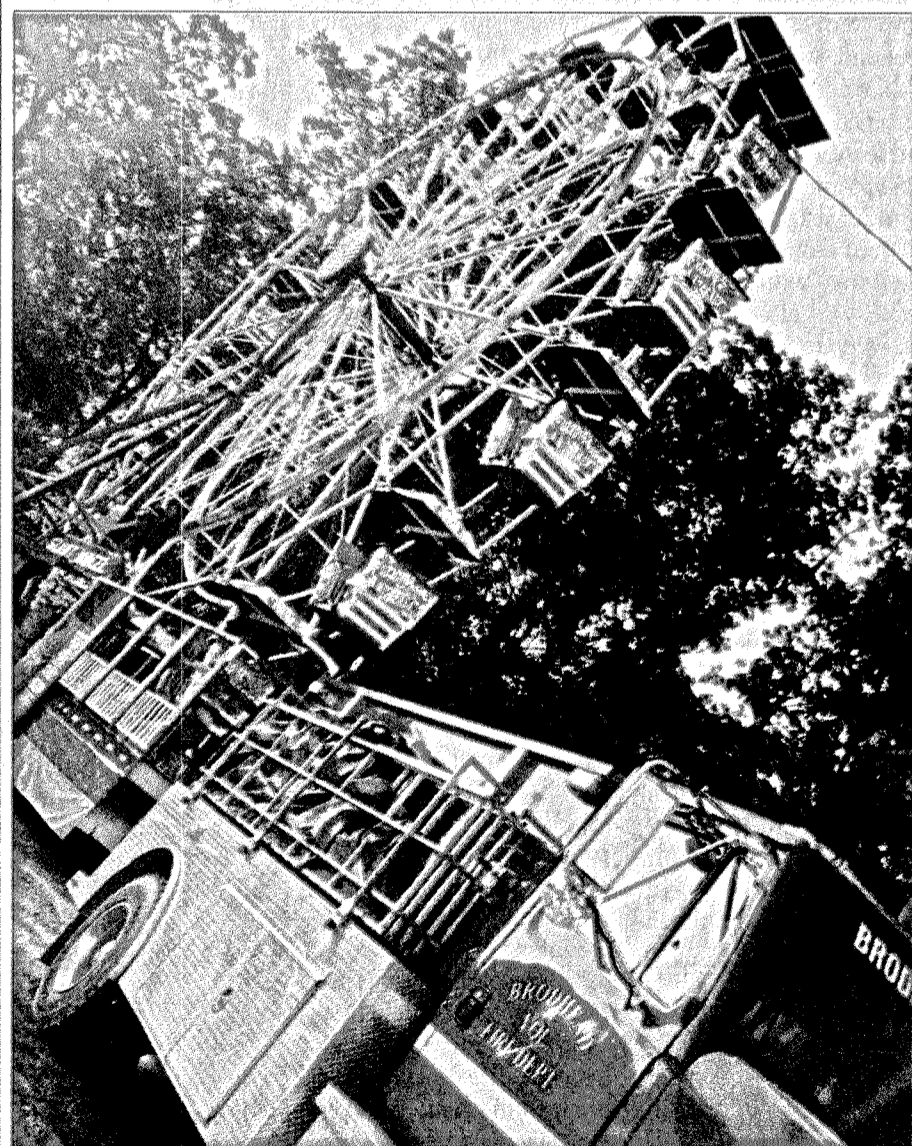
also and this helped keep the department alive over the pandemic year.

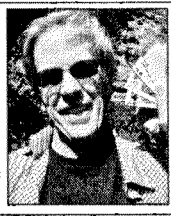

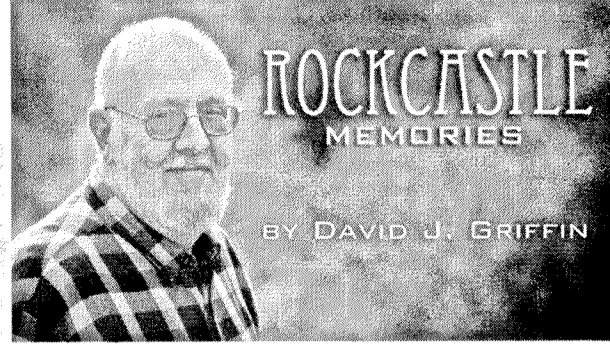

My Car's Trunk

In 1960, when I was sixteen-years-old, my grandfather (Pop) made it possible for me to have my own car. It was a black, 1958 Chevy and that car became my all-time favorite.

In those days, I found myself spending a great deal of time in my vehicle. Several of my friends and I would stay overnight at each other's homes. Sometimes these evenings would be spontaneous, so I thought it would be convenient to keep a change of clothes in my car's trunk. I acquired a small duffel bag to hold my change of attire, a shaving kit, a towel and a wash rag, a bar of soap, and a bottle of cologne.

Some of my friends and I often hunted small game and fished together. Because my automobile had a huge trunk, I could keep my fishing gear and shotgun secured in my car.

In those days, I was fanatical about keeping my car washed and clean. I purchased a 5-gallon

bucket with a lid and filled it with all the necessary items needed to wash and dry my auto. I used that bucket every week.

Buddy Cox and I loved to spend time together customizing my car, so I always kept a small tool box in my trunk. At the time, I was a sophomore in high school, so I needed a place to keep my school textbooks and supplies. I acquired a plastic milk carton container and it became my in-car book-storage box.

No one else, beside myself, knew that I also kept a Bank of Mt. Vernon money bag locked in my car's glove box. In that bag, I kept what money I could set aside for dating, food, and gasoline for my ride. In my memory, I think I could have up to \$25 in that bag. In 1960, that was a lot of money for a teenager. Keep in mind, gasoline was only 29 cents per gallon, and you could get into the Vernon Theater for 50 cents. A burger at the Dinner Bell Restaurant was approximately \$1.50. A boy could purchase a lot of gasoline and food for \$25.

The last items that I remember being in my trunk was a quilt and a small cooler. These were available if I wanted to share a picnic with my

Frankfort Update

Economic update:
Recovery is tentative



We will be telling the story of when the world shut down amid growing cases of COVID-19 for generations to come, much like our great grandparents talked about the Spanish Flu and World War II. Particularly since almost overnight the state shut down schools, businesses, medical services, and nonprofit services. As a result, our state's economy changed drastically.

Just one month after the first confirmed COVID case, Kentucky's gross domestic product (GDP) - the total value of goods produced and services provided - fell 35 percent. This dealt an extreme blow to consumer confidence. According to the Kentucky Annual Economic Report, from January to April, Kentucky lost over 325,000 jobs or 16.7 percent of its total nonfarm employment. This is nearly three times the number of jobs lost during the Great Recession we experienced between December 2007 and June 2009.

While economic output improves, Kentucky continues to lag behind the national average in employment to population ratio and labor force participation. In fact, according to the Kentucky Chamber, the gap between Kentucky's labor force participation rate and the national rate is almost a full percentage point wider than it was before the pandemic. The labor force participation rate is basically the number of people who could be working.

Almost overnight, hundreds of thousands of Kentuckians lost their jobs at the start of the pandemic. While some of these jobs have been recovered, we still have more than 90,000 open positions across sectors. A national trend that is evident in Kentucky also shows an uneven recovery across urban and rural areas. Urban areas have recovered far faster while rural areas continue to struggle. As we look at recovery, we must remain mindful that the policies we adopt promote recovery in all of Kentucky, from Ashland to Paducah and all points in between.

To everyone's delight, the 2021 fiscal year ended with a \$1.17 billion dollar revenue surplus. While we are relieved to have a historic surplus, those that see this as a green light to go on a spending spree are seriously misled. In the past year, the federal government has infused trillions of dollars into Kentucky's economy through the three

stimulus payments, enhanced unemployment benefits, and seven federal acts that appropriated money to and through state government.

We were intentionally cautious when we passed a continuation budget earlier this year, and as we invested the COVID-relief dollars into one time projects. I am also proud of the fact that once again we stipulated in the budget bill that any revenue surplus goes directly to the rainy day fund. This brings the rainy day fund balance to \$1.92 billion dollars. When we talk about the rainy day fund, we think of it as the emergency fund and savings account for the state. As we continue to navigate the effects of the pandemic, it is pivotal that we are prepared for unexpected emergencies and future opportunities.

By investing more money in the rainy day fund, we increased our operating reserve, or the number of days the state can function without outside money. At the start of 2021, before we passed the 2021 budget bill, Kentucky had an operating reserve of just four days. After a historic \$608.5 million dollar deposit during the 2021 legislative session, and another historic investment of \$1.17 billion dollars, Kentucky now has an operating reserve of 30 days. This brings Kentucky up to par with surrounding states and stands to increase Kentucky's credit score, which has long been bogged down by a pension crisis.

However, we already know that costs are creeping up. Just a few weeks ago we learned that the Kentucky Teacher's Retirement System will need an additional \$3 billion and we anticipate criminal justice and Medicaid costs to rise as well. While we do not want to use our rainy day fund to cover these costs, we may have no other option.

While we continue to navigate economic recovery amid a growing workforce development issue, we must remain mindful of the lingering effects of the pandemic. While the temptation to spend public money is strong, we must remember that this is the taxpayer's hard-earned money. As your legislator, I am obligated to keep expenses low and continue to build a reserve for the inevitable day when crisis demands action.

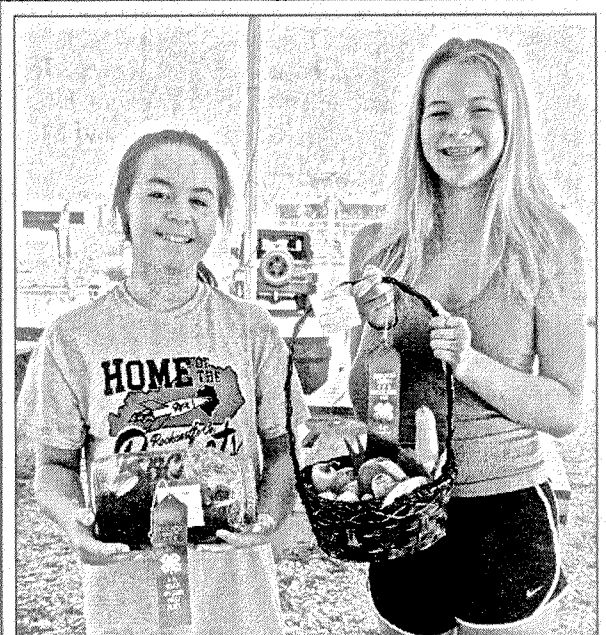

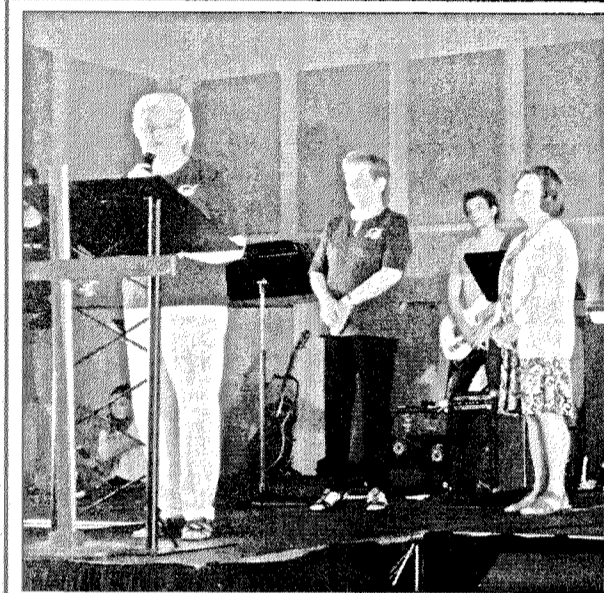

Hurst receives NSDAR Classroom Grant

Stephanie Hurst, a fifth-grade teacher at Roundstone Elementary School is a recipient of the 2021 NSDAR sponsored Helen Pouch Memorial Fund Classroom Grant. Fifty-one \$500 grants are awarded each year to classroom teachers impacting more than 10,000 students nationwide.

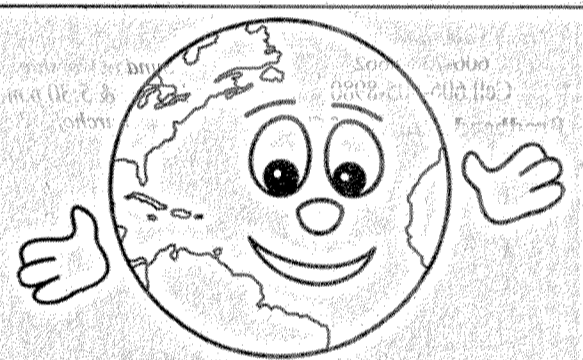

A Memorial: Part 2

As I wrote last week would look at the emblems used in the communion, because these are very important because this is what our Lord instituted, shortly before he left this earth.

1 Peter 2:21 Because Christ suffered for us, leaving us an example, that we should follow in his footsteps. 1 Corinthians 11:2 remember me in all things, and keep the ordinances, as I delivered them to you.

Many want you to believe that the cup and the fruit of the vine are the same thing. Luke 22:20 Likewise also the cup, after supper. Saying, The cup is the New Testament in my blood, which is shed for many. It is easy to see what the cup is a symbol of and also easy to see what blood is a symbol of, how man has twisted these emblems to mean something completely different, than what Jesus instituted is a shame, and as Christians, we need to get back to the teachings of the Bible. For 1900 years, there was one cup and one loaf on the Lord's table.

Thayer says: Luke 22:20 This cup containing the fruit of the vine, an emblem of blood, is rendered by the shedding of my blood an emblem of the New Testament. Hence the cup stands for the New Testament. As the New Testament and the blood of Christ are connected, so the cup, an emblem of the New Testament, and the fruit of the vine, an emblem of the blood of Christ, are connected to the communion.

Jesus told us also how we are to divide it. Luke 22:17 Take this and divide it among yourselves. Jesus also explains how we are to divide the contents of the cup. Matthew 26:27 He gave it to them, saying drink ye all of it. Mark 14:23 And he took the cup and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and they all drink of it. Once again, a very simple command that was very easy to obey and I believe the disciples of Jesus, sitting at that table did exactly as Jesus commanded. They understood the meaning of each emblem and the importance of doing exactly what Jesus commanded.

We find the early Church in Corinth not many years later following this command by our Lord. 1 Corinthians 11:23-25 for I have received of the Lord, which I have delivered unto you. That the Lord Jesus the same night, in which he was betrayed took bread. After the same manner he took the cup, when he had supped saying, This cup is the new Testament in my blood, this do ye, as oft as ye drink it, in remembrance of me. For as often as eat this bread and drink this cup. Ye do show the Lord's death till he come.

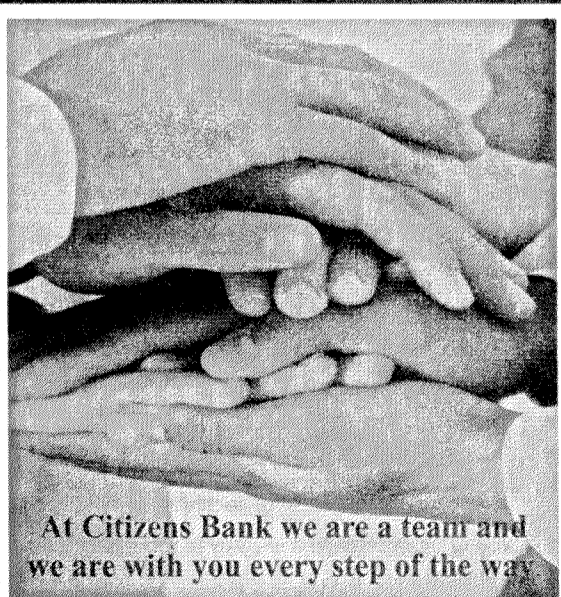

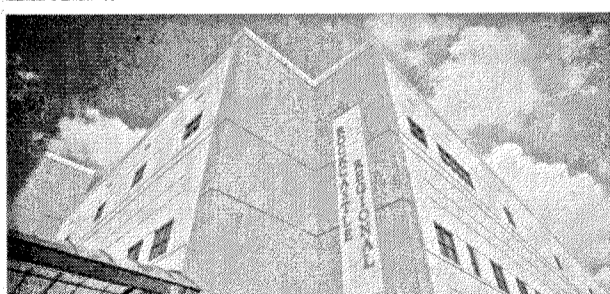

around Main Street and Wilderness Road.

The testing is required by the Environmental Protection Agency who have been concerned about the underground tanks that were removed at an old gas station on Wilderness Road above Main Street years ago but not before they had deteriorated and allowed gas to seep into the ground.

One building on Main Street has already been condemned and torn down, since it was in the direct path of any possible soil damage or toxic gasses from those fuel tanks. Concerns about possible fumes have caused testing in the area since the station closed many years ago.

In a letter from the Environmental Manager of Retro Tower, Greg Secrist asked the city to agree to 12 wells reaching as deep as 50 feet around the site of the previous B&F Gulf Station on Wilderness Road, at the corner of Hwy 150. After receiving agreement to the wells, the company began drilling the holes through blacktop parking spaces and roadways around the site.

The company will then return to the wells to test for possible harmful gasses or any type of contamination from the old tanks, according to Secrist.

The letter also says the company will seal the wells when testing is complete.

residence. The warrant says Dooley had placed \$100 on his wife's jail account and he told an inmate that he was going to post his wife's bond. However, Dooley had admitted he had no job and had received no stimulus checks.

Police received permission to search Dooley's residence and no weapons were found. However, during the search, police found a headlamp similar to the one seen on store video during the robbery. Police also noticed a security system had been installed in the residence.

The following day, Loudermilk received a warrant for the security system at Dooley's home. Footage from the security system showed Dooley, and his father, removing firearms from the residence. The footage also showed Dooley entering the nearby woods with a backpack and returning later without the backpack.

After locating the backpack, police discovered a headlamp, gloves that match those worn at the robbery, boots that match prints at the scene of the robbery, and other items that implicated Dooley in the burglary/robbery.

Police also listened to a recorded call between Dooley and his wife in jail and the suspect was heard to tell his wife that her security system is going to “cost him 50 years.”

According to the complaint, there was about \$2,000 in damage to the sporting goods store and about \$24,000 worth of items were taken.

Dooley was charged with burglary in the first degree, possession of a

firearm by a convicted felon, theft by unlawful taking, tampering with physical evidence and criminal mischief. He is being held on a \$40,000 cash or property bond.

Dooley had only been released from the detention center eight days before the burglary on an unrelated charge.
