



I have Big John's, acquired from Kyle Whitaker in Winchester in 2014 just now blooming. The "Babe Beans" were a gift from Mrs. Tannie Campbell Cornett of Ulvah in 2005 and Loretta insists that she doesn't understand why I bother growing anything other than "The Babes" which have been grown by Tannie's family for over a century. Ditto, for the "Big Johns" and Letcher County's Whitaker family. Loretta changes her mind based on whichever one she's eating at the time.

My Dad was growing Lazy Wife fall beans commercially more than 50 years ago. We had lost seed of them for several decades but brother Keith (Keeter) found them in Shumway's catalogue last spring, listed as "Lazy Housewife" beans and the seed has proven to be the same bean I remember from over 50 years ago. (Google "Shumway's Seeds" for the online cata-

logue).

The taste is not quite as distinct as most other fall beans but the seeds are the same, nearly pea- shaped and size, as a regular white fall bean. They get their name for being stringless and because the pod is well over twice as long and bigger around than other fall beans. According to lore, a "lazy wife" could break up a mess of them far more

Persimmon Trees

I have a lone persimmon tree, and I am quite fond of it. It stands proudly on the edge of the woods adjacent to my home. While walking there recently, I noticed that the persimmon tree is looking very healthy. Every time I notice that particular tree, I am reminded of my grandfather (Pop), because there were two persimmon trees in his backyard. I am proud to report that mine is tall, strong, and full of small fruit.

My first personal experience with persimmon trees occurred when I was a very young boy. Pop showed me the fruit from one of his trees and began to teach me, saying "David Joe, you must not eat persimmons until after the first hard frost." He went on to explain, "If you bite into one before that time, your mouth will draw."

What Pop was describing is the astringent nature of the fruit's pulp. The effect of the frost is what makes it palatable.

After Pop's warning, Kenneth Hansel and I decided to find out what he meant. You know what happens to young boys in just such situations.

We took a few persimmons into the woods in order to "perform an experiment." We both bit into a green persimmon, only to discover that our lips and tongue felt like they were shriveling up. We began to spit, cough, and gag-and quickly thereafter to run as fast as we could to get to the house for a drink of fresh water. Upon reaching the desperately needed water, we were horrified to discover that that only made it worse! The next hour was

spent with us gagging and spitting and making faces.

Needless to say, we never tried that again. (And, by the way, did Pop set us

The teacher which ever resides inside me insists that I inform you that the American Persimmon tree is native to the eastern United States and that they grow wild, but have been cultivated for their fruit and unique wood. There is evidence that Native Americans grew these trees. The wood is very hard, heavy, strong, and dark, like ebony. The fruit is sweet and luscious – when ripe.

Neither my mother (Bee) nor my grandmother cared for persimmons. Pop and I would share a few under his trees in the late fall every year when I was a boy. I can see us both now, spitting the seeds as we sampled the fruits.



All of this was before she got a new-fangled wringer washer that grandma didn't really like. She said it didn't get clothes as clean as scrubbing them.

How about television antennas? We first had those that sat on the TV itself and you would have to turn them very slowly until the picture got clear.

A little later we got that huge antennae that my dad mounted to the roof. Reception was much better but a windstorm would turn it and dad would have to go on the roof and turn it while mom yelled from the doorway when the picture was clear again.

That happened so much at our house, that dad just left the ladder in place so he could skip up there any-

I also remember foot pedal sewing machines.

I would sit and watch grandma use her feet to pedal the machine and I wanted to pedal it so bad.

I snuck and did it a couple times just to watch it go but I messed up all the thread she had on it and I had to stop. But one day she cleared the machine and it had no thread on it and she let me sit there and pedal for hours.

Though there are hundreds of other memories that have gone away, I'll end with S & H green stamps.

Everytime mom bought groceries, or most anything,

she got some of those little stamps and some books to stick them in.

That was my job, to lick the stamps and place them in the proper location in each book.

Then, once a lot of the books were full, mom would take them and get something free like a table lamp or other household

Oh, that was exciting. "Let's go see what we can get with this many green stamps" she would say.

Days gone by. I miss a lot of things from those days. Pop bottle openers nailed to the wall, dirt piles to play in, creeks you could drink from, and most everything from those days.

easily, In less than half the time it takes to work up regular string beans and have a better tasting dish at the same time. On the other hand, if Loretta is the person preparing them, I have learned, for good reason, to refer to them as the 'Keeter Bean" in our household.

In the meantime, my brothers Andy and Keeter are mostly responsible for the fact that I've had such a great garden because, without them, I would not have had a tiller I could use to work it several times a week.

Keeter talked me into buying a 6HP Predator engine to replace the nonfunctional 8.5HP Kohler on my old Troybilt Horse tiller that needed well over \$100.00 in engine repairs but would still have weighed more than Mr. Parkinson would allow me to maneuver if it had been

I confess to being very skeptical that the new engine would be strong enough to power the tiller but I had a coupon that allowed me to purchase it for \$99.99 at Harbor Freight in Nicholasville back in May. Keith and Andy came down and it took them less than half an hour to switch the engines out. An hour or so later, Andy had my 50'x120' garden tilled to a depth of 15 inches and I

was in business.

Not only is the engine more powerful than the old one, but it reduced the weight of the tiller by well over 50 pounds. It is also far easier to crank and almost always starts with one pull and never more than two. The tiller runs far better now than it did when I purchased it, used, in 1986. I have no idea how China managed to make and market the same motor that Honda sells for nearly 3 times as much but the only difference I could find between the two is the name painted on the cowl. I know, for sure that mine represents the best use I've made of a hundred dollar bill in this century.

My old tiller is a 1977 model but I promise you faithfully that I would not swap it for brand new one that costs around \$2000.00 these days simply because they don't make them like this anymore. It has taken Mr. Parkinson and me most of the summer to learn and get used to running it with one hand but we've put upwards of 150 hours on it, 20 minutes at a time every day since mid May if the ground was dry enough to

I have no idea how much longer Parkinson is going to allow me to raise a garden but I can tell you that the new motor on my

old tiller is worth far, far more than I paid for it in the pleasure I've already gotten from it, not to mention the Lazy Wife, Big John, Babe Beans and the Bodacious sweet corn yet to come between now and cold weather.

We did not create this mess, and to place the burden of correcting the situation on our retired and current teachers is beyond be-

Furthermore, the proposed changes to teachers who have yet to begin their career will cause a good many to reflect on their chosen career path and they may abruptly change course.

Many of us chose teaching as a career for many reasons. Not for the yearly income but because we had a passion for teaching and caring for children, to give everyone in our community a chance to chase their dreams so that their future could be asbright as possible. cludes the basic and necessary priorities of state government, including education, law enforcement, infrastructure, and other key services.

It is no longer an option for us to "kick the can" down the road, as has been done for so long. As your State Representative, I am committed to developing real, long-term solutions to this pension crisis, so that we can continue providing retirement security for those who teach our children and keep our communities safe.

As a member of legislative leadership, I have spent the last several weeks in various meetings regarding this difficult and complex issue. No one disputes the fact that we as a state cannot financially sustain the current system, and that changes are needed. 

Family Court Judge in Pulaski, Lincoln and Rockcastle Counties. She was then elected and served on the Family Court bench from 1999 until 2006. Following her time as Family Court Judge, she returned to private practice until her election to the Kentucky Court of Appeals. been abandoned.
On Wednesday, August 23, Bryant arrested Josh Sowder, 32, of Mount Vernon who was taken to the Rockcastle County Detention Center and charged with robbery.

The investigation also shows that the female was Courtney Duff, 26, of Berea. An active arrest warrant was issued for Duff but she was already in jail on unrelated charges when the warrant was served.

Police determined that the couple knew the victim and picked him out because of personal reasons instead of randomly picking a car to criack.

Bryant says carjacking is very rare in Rockcastle County but this particular event may be considered a bias crime as a motive and during sentencing the couple may face charges including a hate crime which includes much stronger sentencing.

(Continued from front) mately \$329,000 to start the non-profit facility.

Loudermilk's goal is to start the facility this size but quickly grow into another facility that will have 40-50 beds and offer an eightmonth program.

The reason for starting small and building, according to Loudermilk, is state regulations that private insurance and Medicaid will not pay if there are more than 16 beds in a facility.

The new organization plans to purchase property in Rockcastle County that will allow for the growth

and the additional facility within six to eight months.

The mission of the organization is "to utilize a Christ-centered foundation, twelve step, and holistic approach to help each person gain their freedom from addiction in a safe, judgement-free environment."

Loudermilk said everyone admitted into the facility will learn valuable life skills and how to be accountable.

Gibson discussed some funding possibilities and possible grants the organization may get, along with planned fundraisers and public events to raise the needed funding. "By law, we have to be completely ready to open the doors and have a fully-functioning facility, before we can actually open the doors," she said.

The duo spoke to the crowd and then took questions from those attending.

Gibson said there will be an alumni program and the new facility will have onsite nurses and doctors on call, along with programs to help those who graduate the program to find work immediately after they graduate.

Once the facility is open, Gibson said that will open avenues to even more government grants that may help the program to grow.

Loudermilk said that the organization is not going to homes or businesses asking for donations. Donations will be gathered at fundraising events. "If someone comes to your door claiming they are collecting money for the My Brother's Keeper facility, do not give it to them and call the police."

Loudermilk said this new facility will treat each person as an individual and will devise a program for that individual rather than treat the symptoms of addiction.

Gibson pointed out that this will not be a Suboxone or Methadone clinic, but a facility that will treat each person according to their addiction.

"This can and will work in Rockcastle County," said Loudermilk. "We will have more meetings once we work out more details and get closer to starting up."

Loudermilk said there will be a board of directors and the organization will be completely transparent, placing all their funding and costs on line on their Facebook page which is part of the "My Brother's Keeper" site, as well as on its own website that is not up and running as of yet.

Loudermilk publicly thanked those who support the program and listed senators and representatives as well as Judge/Executive Doug Bishop, the *Mount Vernon Signal*, the fiscal court and many individuals who are playing a part in getting the new facility started.

More meetings will be announced as the organization gathers its board members and addresses more detailed issues concerning the









September is quota hunt application time

Each year, the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources administers quota hunts for deer, upland birds and waterfowl on state wildlife management areas and other public lands.

September is the month to apply for these opportu-

Hunters can apply through the department's website at fw.ky.gov or by phone at 1-877-598-2401. Either option is available 24 hours a day. Applications for these quota hunts are not open until Sept. 1.

The minimum charge to apply for a quota hunt is \$3. Last year, the department received more than 11,000 quota hunt applications.

There are 35 quota deer hunts this season. The dates and number of slots available for each hunt are listed in the "Quota Hunts" section of the Kentucky Hunting and Trapping Guide and on the department's website. Click the "Hunt" tab on the homepage and choose "Quota Hunts"

from the dropdown menu. This year, there are sevwith the addition of seven state park hunts and a shotgun only, youth-mentor hunt scheduled Nov. 18-21 on West Kentucky Wildlife Management Area (WMA). The new state park quota deer hunts are scheduled Dec. 9-10 (youth only) and Jan. 6-7 at Dale Hollow Lake State Resort Park, Nov. 3-5 and Nov. 10-12 at Greenbo Lake State Resort Park, Nov. 9-12 at Kenlake State Resort Park and Dec. 14-17 and Dec. 21-24 at Kincaid Lake State Park. The hunts at Kenlake and Kincaid state parks are archery and crossbow only.

Small game hunters can apply for pheasant quota hunts scheduled Nov. 17, 18 and 19 at Green River Lake WMA, Dec. 1, 2 and 3 at Clay WMA and Dec. 1, 2, and 3 at Yellowbank WMA.

Quota bobwhite quail hunts on Peabody WMA are scheduled Nov. 28 and Dec. 19, 2017 and Jan. 6, 13 and 23, 2018. A youthmentor hunt is scheduled Nov. 25. Quota upland bird hunts on Clay WMA are scheduled Nov. 8, Nov. 19,

eral new quota deer hunts Dec. 16 and Dec. 26. Hunters may take bobwhite quail, ruffed grouse and woodcock during the upland bird quota hunts, when the seasons for all three species are open. Woodcock season is open Oct. 28-Nov. 10 and Nov.

13-Dec. 13 this year. Hunters may apply for quota waterfowl hunts at Ballard WMA and Sloughs WMA. The hunts at Ballard WMA are Wednesdays through Sundays (excluding Christmas Eve, Christmas Day and New Year's Day) from Dec. 6 to Jan. 28, 2018. Waterfowl quota hunts are Thursday-Friday and Saturday-Monday from Nov. 23 to Jan. 28, 2018 at Sloughs WMA but hunters must apply for a block of dates.

The application period extends through Sept. 30 and results should be available in early October. Applicants can check to see if they have been selected by accessing the "My Profile" feature on the department's website. 

Deadline to Enroll in Agriculture Risk Coverage (ARC) and Price Loss Coverage (PLC) Kentucky Producers Have until Aug. 1 to Enroll in

ARC/PLC U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Kentucky Farm Service Agency (FSA) Acting State Executive Director (SED) Robert Finch reminds farmers and ranchers that they have until Aug. 1 to enroll in Agriculture Risk Coverage (ARC) and/ or Price Loss Coverage (PLC) programs for the 2017 crop year. These programs trigger financial protections for participating agricultural producers when market forces cause substantial drops in crop prices

or revenues. "Producers have already elected ARC or PLC, but to receive program benefits they must enroll for the 2017 crop year by signing a contract before the Aug. 1 deadline," said Finch. "Please contact your local FSA office to schedule an appointment if you have not yet en-

rolled." 
