Lack of quorum forces city council to stop mid-meeting

The Mount Vernon City Council's special called meeting was cut short last Tuesday night. Only four members of the six member council showed up, constituting a quorum but, during the meeting. Councilman Cifford Mullins received an emergency phone call and had to leave, leaving only Jim Bowman, Shelley Raines Lewis and Wayne Bullock. The meeting was then shut down due to a lack of quorum. The regular monthly meeting had been postponed from the previous making Thursday, Tuesday's meeting a special called meeting. However, this meeting was not completed, though the only items left on the agenda were the department reports, which are on file at City Hall.

To open the meeting, Mayor Mike Bryant presented plaques of recognition to the council members who had served under his mayorship. Each multi-term council member was presented with a plaque listing their years of service. "These people are basically volunteers. I would advocate for more money for each of the city council members and the next administration can pursue that if they wish," said Mayor Bryant focusing his attention toward Mayor-Elect Tim "Duck" Roberts who was in attendance at the meeting.

Under old business, Councilmember Lewis addressed the idea of live streaming each of the city

council meetings so the public may watch each meeting live. "The school board does this," she said. "I know we approached the subject before but COVID and other things happened and it sort of got dropped. Maybe we can revisit that issue." City Consultant Josh

Bray said the subject is a complex issue involving the video equipment, sound equipment and the software and hardware training in-

volved in utilizing the

ARPA funds about to be put to use

By: Mike French Editor Many cities and counties across the nation received funds as part of the ARPA (American Rescue Plan Act) as the government response to the COVID-19 pandemic damaged the economy, many businesses, education and local budgets. Some of those funds were

distributed locally. Most counties held the money in a separate account awaiting guidance from the federal officials concerning how the money could be used.

Rockcastle County received close to \$3 million in total while the City of Livingston

got around \$55,000, the City of Mount Vernon received \$322,688 and the City of Brodhead received slightly over \$150,000.

The amount provided was based on population. Jefferson County received \$148.933 million while the City of Louisville, in Jefferson County, received \$280 million.

There have been many suggestions to the fiscal court about how the \$3 million should be spent but, since local officials were told the use of the funds would heavily restricted, Judge/Executive Howell Holbrook, Jr.refused to allocate the funds until it became clear how the money was

allowed to be used. "There are some cities and counties using the money for unapproved projects and they will most likely be forced to pay all that money back." he said. "We have to know how that money can be used before we can allocate it."

So for Rockcastle and many other counties,

Firefighters still battling new forest fires in Rockcastle

Local firefighters are still battling new forest fires even after five forest fires were reported last month and over 2,000 acres burned.

Warnings were issued against creating fires outdoors violating the burn ban that is in place, but new fires continue.

On Thanksgiving Day the Livingston Volunteer Fire and Rescue were called to a forest fire on Sand Hill. Once again due to winds and the extremely dry season, the fire continued to grow in size until the United States Forestry Service was called in to battle the blaze.

Livingston volunteers also battled a fire in the woods on Lower River Road the same day.

City Clerk Amanda Thomas said the two fires were close to her home in Livingston. "Smoke was coming from both directions around my home at the same time," she said. The second fire was contained. 👘

Firefighters at the Brodhead Fire Depart-

ment were called to a forest fire on Slaty Branch during the Thanksgiving week as well. This fire was quickly extinguished but firefighters continue to warn local residents that it is illegal to burn any materials outdoor from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. The ban is in effect until December 15.



Hopefully Thanksgiving was Happy I can breathe a little sigh of relief now that Thanksgiving has come and gone. Here at the



Dr Chism served our country in the United States Marine Corp. Both shared the name James. Dr Wright served as a veterinarian for 50 years, a goal of Dr Chism before his untimely death this year. Marcia said he often said, "I love what I do! I hope to practice for 50

years." Dr Wright was quoted as saying, " I wouldn't give up being a vet if I had a million

Cook till tender. Stir in both cans of soup. Add olives; simmer 30 minutes. Allow to cool. Spoon some mixture onto bun halves. Top with cubed cheese. Toast in oven till cheese melts, about 10 minutes at 350°. MEXICAN STUFFED

SHELLS 1 pound ground beef (or ground turkey) package low-sodium taco seasoning 4 ounces cream cheese 16 jumbo pasta shells

1 1/2 cups salsa 1 cup taco sauce 1 cup cheddar cheese 1 cup Monterrey jack cheese 3 green onions Sour cream Preheat oven to 350°. Brown the ground beef; add taco seasoning and prepare according to package directions. Add cream cheese, cover, and simmer until cheese is melted. Stir together and mix well. Set aside and cool completely. While ground beef is cooling, cook the pasta shells according to package directions; drain. Set shells out individually on cutting board or baking sheet so that they don't stick together. Pour salsa on bottom of a 9 Å~ 13 baking dish.
