A Hillbilly Christmas



To new agriculture program

RCMS receives grant from **Kentucky FFA Foundation**

The Kentucky FFA Foundation has awarded a \$1,000 Rising Sun grant to the agricultural education program at Rockcastle County Middle School, which just opened this school

Thanks to the new program, all 6th and 7th grade students, and about 2/3 of 8th grade students at Rockcastle County Middle School will have the opportunity to take an agriculture class as part of their coursework.

"We have a lot of students who are excited about the classes, and about the opportunity to be in FFA," said Hillary Whitaker, the agriculture teacher at Rockcastle County Middle School.

Whitaker plans to use the grant for things like hands-on instructional materials and FFA jackets for students.


"We've definitely had a lot of community support," she said. "Our administrators agreed to do

the flat middle school FFA registration dues, so every student who takes an agriculture class get to be an FFA member. We are thinking about how to partner with 4-H, and of course our high school agriculture teachers have been willing to help us in any way they can."

The Rising Sun initiative is an effort by the Kentucky FFA Foundation to support the expansion of agricultural education in Kentucky, and is funded through its project LEAD endowment.

"Our main goal at the Kentucky FFA Foundation is to remove barriers for students and improve access to agriculture classes and FFA," Sheldon said McKinney, Executive Director of the Kentucky FFA Foundation. "Helping offset some of the start-up costs for new chapters does that."







By Max Phelps Home Grown Holiday Greenery

Traditions of decorating with greenery about the time of the winter solstice go back to ancient Mesopotamia and evidence of such is abundant in Assyrian and Egyptian history. Decorating homes with evergreen boughs and trees was prohibited in the first American colonies in New England. Gradually, Irish plantation owners in the South and German settlers in the North began to popularize the gathering of seasonal greenery and decorating their homes around the 1840's. In 1848, British Queen Victoria first used a tree at Windsor Castle, Public tree decorating in America didn't really catch on until the Great Depression. Today, it seems to begin by the time the leaves turn colors in the fall and last until early January.

With that introduction

to the topic; I want to bring to the attention of the reader that you can grow a lot of your own greenery for decorating, and you can collect from the wild (or your yard if you have a lush green one) and save green (your money) and also have the freshest and most unique when it comes to decorating for the holidays.

Decorating with greenery is more prevalent today than ever. And fresh greenery seems much preferred. Greenery such as ivy, cedars, firs, pines and hollies all add a fresh look and natural scents to our homes.

Spruce trees, hemlocks, rhododendrons, boxwoods, evergreen viburnum and laurels don't hold up well in indoor heated situations, but these and many other items can be turned into outdoor decorations.

Home grown greenery is cheaper, fresher, more environmentally friendly, and you can customize it rather than be like everyou lone else. Finding greenery can begin with your own landscape. And from there, expand to the neighborhood. (Just resource)

own landscape. And from there, expand to the neighborhood. (Just remember to select carefully, and get permission if you're going to harvest from private property that doesn't belong to you.) What can you find?

Well, let's see—what do you have growing in the yard? Hollies? A pine tree? Junipers? Arborvitae? Laurels? False cypress such as gold thread and saybrook gold? Maybe ligustrum or rhododendron? How about some large green magnolia leaves, or some trailing ivy or winter creeper? Nandina, too.

Since yard plants are part of your landscape, consider, harvesting some greenery as "pruning" of your bushes! You want to take off evenly or remove limbs that won't make it look odd, while at the same time collecting a whole box or basket of green clippings, from which you can make wreaths, sprays or garland, or a table piece.

Adding seed heads, fruits, nuts, grass plumes, pine cones, magnolia pods, rose hips and the like can enable the personalized touches not obtainable form store-bought decorations.

Keep your trimmings out of the sun as you collect. Soak in water for awhile if they appear dried out. Same for a Christmas tree, you can cut off an inch of two from the trunk and put it in water for a few hours to extend it's life.

A precaution or two as you harvest for your home decorating. Holly berries may be harmful if eaten. Mistletoe berries are definitely deadly poisonous. Juniper berries can be harmful and yew is certainly poisonous. Bittersweet is poisonous. Laurel and ligustrum berries are poisonous. This isn't a complete list-so do your homework if children or pets might get at your decorations and might put them in their mouths.

Even though you collect your own greenery, or maybe go to a local farmer or Christmas tree grower, after a few weeks even the freshest and most long lasting greenery won't stay fresh forever. So, delay collecting and decorating, or be prepared to throw away items that are going bad and replace with fresh new ones if you wish to keep your decorations on display for more than two or three weeks.

Another word of caution would be that an open flame such as a candle burning, or possibly a short in wiring of electric lights, could turn pretty decorations into a fire. Evergreen boughs that have been dead for long will burn fast and hot if they should ever get on fire. Be especially vigilant with the use of candles or open flames around old and dried greenery.

Growing or making your own decorations is definitely a smart idea if the budget is tight and you can find a bit of time. All the more so, if you have artistic flair for

decorating. But, you don't have to be broke from buying gifts or whatever, you may find it is actually emotionally satisfying to create fun and lovely wreaths, sprays, garlands, etc. Don't forget harvesting your own tree from the forest or from the Christmas tree farm.

If you've read this far, you probably are going to take up the idea of creating some decorations yourself. And if you don't have any trees or shrubbery in your yard that will work-I'm guessing that would make you a red maple and Bradford pear person like a huge number of other people—perhaps you want to figure out what to plant in your yard so you have the option of doing your own next time.

Spruce trees and holly bushes are easy to grow, at least in a temperate climate. From there, you have junipers, arborvitae, cedars, firs, pines, hemlocks, cryptomeria, false cypress and more. There are broadleaf trees such as magnolia grandiflora, tinus or Prague viburnum, pittosporum, distylum, euonymous,

ligustrum, English laurel, mountain laurel, Japanese laurel, and there are citrus trees.


Think of how much nicer your yard might look if a few of it's trees or bushes didn't change colors and drop leaves in the fall and winter. This might be the notion that incentivizes you to tear out a landscape that wasn't working very well and redo it. Or just that you will plant a big spruce tree in the front yard this fall or next spring, maybe you'll plant some arborvitae or euonymous to screen some utilities or a view of the neighbors you don't really enjoy, make-overs of the yard come in small adjustments for some and major transformations for others. If planting some evergreen trees and shrubs or vines would make your place look better, then why hesitate. You'll also be able to use some "prunings" for seasonal decorating with your own home grown greenery.

Streamlining How You Find Information on

If you've been to farmers.gov before, things may look a little different from the last time you were here. We've made some changes, to improve how you find information so that you can find what you need even more easily and efficiently.

The big, green navigation bar near the top of every page - it's different now. It opens up, to show descriptions and subtopics, making it quicker and easier to figure out what's where and reduce guessing. Why? Two reasons: First, farmers.gov has grown a lot over the years and the old navigation wasn't designed for the load. Second, because you asked for it. We analyzed your comments through the "Feedback" button on the site and tested our new designs and information organization with real farmers and ranchers through surveys and live testing ses-

Along with the new website navigation, we restructured how our pages and topics are grouped and organized to help you easily access the information you need. We also relabeled some of our existing pages using nore direct language. This means that pages or information you've used before may have different labels or be in new places.

Important changes: The old Fund page is now called Loans. The Loans page has information and resources about USDA loans, including the Farm Loan Programs. The Recover page is

covery. This page has information to help you Farmers.gov prepare and recover from natural disasters, and to mitigate risk for your operation.

The Conserve page is now Conservation. This page hasn't changed much and still has information on how to implement conservation practices, improve and preserve natural resources, and address conservation

concerns. The Manage page is now Working With Us. This page connects you with resources that tell you how USDA can help you start, expand, enhance, or improve your agricultural operation.

The Connect page has been replaced with Your Business, a guide to USDA resources that cater to your specific opera-

Information that was on the Connect page has been moved to the Contact Us page and the Get Involved page.

We are always updating farmers.gov based on your feedback and to stay up-to-date with important USDA announcements. We've recently created some new webpages, and updated some existing ones, to better equip you with the vital information you need. There are even more new pages coming soon, so stay tuned!

For farmers.gov, we don't guess what farmers and ranchers want from a website. We start by asking, then test our designs with volunteers who are also farmers and ranchers.

There's a feedback button on every page of farmers.gov. Based on 8642 (Relay voice users).

your feedback, we looked for ways to make our site easier to use and to build the information that you're looking for. Live user testing sessions provide data, such as this heatmap, showing where testers tended to click during an exercise.

You helped us create the new navigation design, the new information organization, and told us how to speak using your words, and not legalese.



Farmers encouraged to apply for new ag exemption number

Kentucky Commissioner of Agriculture Dr. Ryan Quarles is reminding agricultural producers about the upcoming deadline to apply for Kentucky's new agriculture exemption number. The deadline to apply for current farmers is Jan. 1, 2022.

"As the new rules take effect next year, we don't want our Kentucky agriculture producers to be caught off guard," Commissioner Quarles said. "With inflation and supply chain issues affecting farm input costs, now is the time to get for farmers to get their new exemption number so they can protect the sales and use tax exclusions available to them."

While the statutory provisions for agriculture sales and use tax exemptions have not changed, the Kentucky Department of Revenue (DOR) now requires agricultural producers to pre-qualify for a new tax identification number to claim exemption from taxes. The DOR is now accepting applications from eligible farmers for new agriculture exemption numbers.

Under the provisions of SB 148, enacted by the 2020 General Assembly and signed into law by Gov. Andy Beshear on March 27, 2020, all eligible farmers exempt from sales and use tax for the purchase of certain items must apply for and use their new agriculture exemption number when claiming applicable tax exemptions under KRS

139.481. The Application for the Agriculture Exemption Number, Form 51A800, is available at www.revenue.ky.gov under Sales Tax forms. Completed applications should be submitted by

email DOR Webreponesalestax@kygov or mailed to DOR's Division of Sales and Use Tax, Station 66, P.O. Box 181, Frankfort, KY 40602-0181.

Applicants must verify their engagement in the type of farming eligible for sales and use tax exemptions included in KRS Chapter 139. These exclusions include certain items purchased for the purpose of raising livestock as food for human consumption or producing crops. To expedite the application process, DOR advises applicants to supply the IRS Schedule F, Profit or Loss from Farming form, if possible.

The agriculture exemption number is valid for three years from the date issued by DOR.
