But to say the Mount Vernon event went well is an understatement since this week the Kentucky State Senate and Kentucky House of Representatives designated the upcoming Second Annual Food Truck Championship in Mount Vernon as the official State Championship event.

Kentucky State Representative Josh Bray and State Senator Brandon Storm, presented officials of the event with both the House and Senate version of certificates naming the local event as the premier food truck event in the state of Kentucky, Monday afternoon at the Hall of Fame.

Officials say about 18 trucks entered the contest last year during the first event held in Mount Vernon, but organizers say more than that have already signed up for this year's event planned for September 10.

The first time the food truck championship was held in Mount Vernon, it was the biggest tourism event in our county," said Bray. "This year will be much bigger still. This is a really big deal for Rockcastle county."

Neil Sluder, organizer of the event, said the championship will be held in the Renfro Valley RV Park this year which will be more convenient for each participant. "The electric is ready to go and there

All my weight wouldn't push the clutch in, so mom knew I was safe and could never go rolling off. That tractor provided my mother with a free babysitter for hours every day.


I must have been about five years old but I remember it like it was last week. Wait, I can't remember what I did last week anymore. I guess I remember it like it happened yesterday...well,




Question?... Dear Editor,


put some hamburgers, hot dogs, chicken and steak on the grill. Add a few friends and a good location like the lake or a park and there you have the

But, never fear, the Biden administration is looking out for the transgender portion of our prison population. The DOJ has invested almost \$1.5M of taxpayer dollars in a contract for a "transgender programming curriculum" focused on transgender inmates needs. The program helps inmates receive new identification documents and hormonal treatments and safe housing options, within the prisons, will also be made available to transgender inmates.

Of course, it wasn't so safe for everyone inwhen volved transgender woman (biological male), in April, received an additional seven years for raping a female inmate in the women's section of a New York prison.

The Washington Free Beacon first reported the existence of the contract Saturday.

And the dreaded vaccine mandate (which is now up to four shots) has again reared its ugly head. The Army has cut off more than 60K unvaccinated guard and reserve soldiers from pay and benefits. The long-term impact may mean many soldiers will be forced to leave, a devastating outcome especially in the middle of a recruiting crisis as Defense Department officials struggle to fill the ranks.

However, Senator Marsha Blackburn (R-Tenn) said this week that protection for these Guardsmen and Reservist has been included in the National Defense Authorization Act bill and it has strong support and hopefully the matter will be resolved in favor of the unvaccinated servicemen.

We'll see. Biden's approval rating has fallen to 29%, the lowest for any president ever, despite his constant attempts to blame everyone, from Putin, Republicans, oil companies and service station owners, for the rising oil prices and the highest recorded inflation in history.

Their stated attempt to wean Americans off fossil fuels and force them to buy electric vehicles makes no sense whatsoever since, especially with the rise in prices (\$3.19 for a loaf of bread Monday that I paid \$1.99 for in January of 2021) makes it virtually impossible for anyone in the middle class to save enough money to buy an (at a minimum) \$60,000 electric vehicle.

Then, of course, you have to take into consideration the price of updating your home's electrical wiring to be able to recharge said vehicle and the fact that there is a dearth of recharging stations available makes the administrations efforts an effort in futility and aggression against its own citizens, the likes of which we've never seen before.

I'm a little concerned about the premier of the 988 system, recently announced by our local government and reported on in this week's Signal.

The service is a federal program and is reportedly for anyone contemplating suicide to call and, hopefully, be talked out of it. It is also for anyone to call and report someone they know who may have sui-

cidal thoughts. My concern is that someone could use the latter part to report someone who actually has never contemplated suicide but such a reporting will result in their gun/s

being confiscated so they cannot, in theory, hurt themselves or others.

I'm sure there would be some legitimate reportings like this but this also sets up the possibility of abuse of the system by someone with a grudge against someone else. And, it's a little surprising that the system was up and in place before the county government was even notified of its existence. Remember, Biden recently asked that the public turn in "radicalized" Americans which sounds just a little Nazi Germanyish to

Please remember the J/6 political prisoners being held in reportedly hellish conditions in a DC Gulag. As far as I can tell, no Republican congresspersons are demanding that these hundreds of prisoners be treated as the country has supposedly always treated those accused, of being innocent until proven guilty, except for Marjorie Taylor Greene and Matt Gaetz.

It was a dream come true. I still have the old black and white, stainedged photos of myself on that tractor. I pretended to ride that tractor every day without fail. It turns out Mr. King had seen me sitting on his tractor as he drove by each day.

'Can I mom? Can I, can I? Please mom? Can I please?

Sure enough, he fired up that old "Popping John" as he called it, and I sat on the edge of the seat with him. My feet wouldn't reach the floor board so he had to hold onto me.

It seemed as though we went for miles back through the field to a creek that I didn't know was there. It was actually about 300 yards but I had never been that far from mom in my life and had never sat so high above the world on anything

moving. He let me sit in his lap and steer for a bit. I thought I was the most important person on earth.

We came upon a rather scraggly-looking tree with small little fruits hanging from it. They were sort of brownish and smaller than a green apple but bigger than a blackberry.

The old farmer spit his tobacco over the side of the tractor and pulled the Popping John up under the sparse shade of the tree. Mr. King stood on the back tire as I watched him reach up into the tree and pluck off a few of the fruit.

When he sat back beside me, he spit out his tobacco chunk that splatted on the dry, hard dirt, and started eating the little jewels. "Would you like one?" he asked. 'Okay. Thank you sir.'

I took the first bite very cautiously. More of a nibble actually. But I didn't get anything except the peel. So on the second nibble, the juice flowed out and down my chin and the soft pulp practically dissolved in my mouth. It was pretty good. Not as good as the candy, but pretty good.

The old fellow put a few of them in my shirt pocket and we headed home.

"How was your trip?" mom asked the moment the loud tractor motor finished slowing to a stop. 'Look what we found mom. There is food out there.' She seemed happy with them and ate two of the three that I had brought to her. She left one for me, as always.

Just a few years ago, nearly 60 years later, I went looking for that tree. Mom and Dad and Mr. King are all gone now,

and the tree was gone too.

Noticing that a lot of the people on our obituary pages are my age now, and facing health issues since the day I was vaccinated for COVID, 1 have started thinking a lot more about those younger days.

The fruit was a persimmon and such trees are rare anymore. There are a few around, but not as many as there used to be.

At the time I ate that first one, I remember thinking it was okay. Nothing special but just okay.

But right now a good, ripe persimmon would be like a small taste of Heaven to me. It was one. of those childhood days I never forgot.

strengths. 1. Excitement: John 20:1-9



Upon his return home, he began the career of his dreams as an auctioneer and real estate broker. He founded Ford Realty and Auction Company, and was joined a few years later by his brother, Danny. They began with the mission of improving the lives of their clients, staff, and community. Their strong work ethic and determination, which was instilled in them at an early age, was the driving force behind the growth of their business. In typical brotherly fashion, they may not have always seen eye to eye, but there was no doubt they always had each other's back.

Dad's love for his community and profession does not go unnoticed. He has served his local community by serving numerous positions, including little league baseball coach, deacon at his church, Jaycee club, and many other organizations. His leadership expanded beyond his local community as evidenced by his election as the National Auctioneer Association president and his induction into their Hall of Fame.

I do believe my dad's greatest contribution to this community is simply his love for people. He has a gift of connecting with anyone that crosses his path. Currently, he still holds the record as the longest serving Republican in Kentucky. He served as house minority leader and later as Director of Surplus Properties. He was influential in securing funds for; new Hwy 150, Rockcastle County Vocational-Technology Center, Kentucky Music Hall of Fame, several of the volunteer fire departments. He has said though that one of his greatest accomplishments was to secure insurance coverage for people needing Cochlear implants specifically a young child from Somerset who needed one.


Danny and Sammy

(Continued from front) money there and we would only be eligible for about \$350,000 of that money."

Chairman Corey Craig said he is frustrated that the local census numbers fell by 1,000 people. "That is how important the census is," said Craig. "People who didn't want to bother to answer simple, impersonal questions just cost their county money. They limited what we can do for everyone in the county."

VanHook said there are many aspects of economic development and a failure in one area has a ripple effect on the entire county. "It is all tied together," said VanHook. "The only source of disposable income the county has comes from the occupational tax, which comes directly from providing jobs, which can only increase if we develop the area, which we can only do if the funding is there and it will only be there if everyone does their part. All these things play a part in the big picture and refusing to fill out the census cost everyone."

Craig said newspaper headlines should read "if you didn't fill out the Census, you cost your county funding."

In other action, VanHook provided the July 12 Budget Summary which shows revenues at \$10,002 and appropriations at \$6,763 for a surplus of \$3,239.

VanHook also said the Exela Plant is still looking for workers. "There are still about 200 to 400 job oneninos at Exela " he said. "They are having trouble filling those positions and they are extremely flexible with hours. They are willing to work with most anyone and have part time or full time or weekend or most anything someone would want and they pay about \$16 per hour. Anyone that wants a job should apply there."

The meeting then entered closed session to discuss contract negotiations.

The next regular meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, August 2 at 8:30 a.m. in the third floor conference room of the courthouse. The public is invited to attend.

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Frankfort Update

With billions of taxpayer dollars budgeted to



state programs, agencies, and cabinets, accountability is one of the most

important functions of our budget committees. This week members heard updates on how the money we allocated in HB 1 is being spent in order to determine what we need to adjust when we come back into session in January. While we received some good news, we also heard some things that concerned us, I hope you will take a few moments to read this week's update and let me know if you have any questions or would like further information.

Expanding Broadband to the Last Mile: \$300 million budgeted in 2021

High speed internet access is growing more and more important to our daily lives and I am committed to working with other legislators to ensure every rural community has access. After all, broadband is important to the economy, healthcare, education, and overall quality of life, Over the past several years, the legislature has created a

special fund to help deliver broadband to what some refer to as "the last house at the end of the last mile of rural road." I am reminded of how electricity was delivered to rural communities by cooperatives and public/ private partnerships a century ago. It takes a commitment and it takes a strategy to ensure we get the most out of every dollar. Last year, we committed \$300 million to the Broadband Deployment Fund. Very little of the money has been spent, so this session the legislature approved a bill that creates an office dedicated to making sure the expansion happens. Committee members heard an update on efforts to speed it up, including the first round of \$89 mil-

It has been decades since our state has made a significant investment in our water and wastewater infrastructure and it shows. While we can still access clean water with the turn of a faucet handle, many cannot and we are far too dependent on aging water and wastewater lines. Last year, we committed \$250 million to help local communities replace and upgrade that infrastructure. The program has proved successful, with projects in the works across the Commonwealth. Because of the progress we

are seeing, we invested another \$250 million in this year's budget. We directed the administration to allocate funding to counties based on population, so Pulaski County is eligible to receive \$3.95 million. According to the state's budget director, the administration is preparing for round two of funding to be awarded based on applications from local governments.

State Employee Raises: 8% raises as of July 1, 2022

Not all news was good news. As I have shared in the past, the budget we passed earlier this year also included an 8% raise for state workers, but required the Personnel Cabinet to perform a study to determine if the state's pay scale and classification system are appropriate for today's market. It has been more than 20 years since state employees received a pay raise as required by state law. While it has been a priority for us over the past several years, we had limited funds and we had to deal with the public pension liability first. This year's pay increase is the next step in a strategy to rebuild the state's public workforce to effectively and efficiently deliver necessary services to Kentuckians. The first step is to receive a detailed compensation and classification plan from the Personnel Cabinet, something we have been waiting for more than a year to receive. Because the cabinet failed to meet earlier commitments to submit a plan, the budget also included a July 7 deadline and a \$2 million penalty for every month it is late. Members of the Budget Review Sub-Committee on General Government, Finance, Personnel, and Public Retirement met to discuss the plan this week, and instead the cabinet's representatives gave members an eight page summary for a 45 page document that contained no data, nor any information about how Kentucky stacks up against other state governments, public or private employers. It was disappointing and frustrating as we are looking for this information to determine what can be done going forward.

Impact of Suspending the Two Cent Gas Tax

Increase

executive order that sus-

pended a two cent per gallon increase in the motor fuels tax. The Governor's order expires when we return to session in January, so we are watching closely to determine if it actually helps Kentucky families. I know it seems like any relief is good, but this one may be penny wise and pound foolish. With so many interstate miles, this move helps a lot of folks driving through our state and commercial companies hauling products across the state. According to testimony, Kentucky drivers will only save an average of 94 cents per month. However, funding for road maintenance and improvements on the state and local level will decrease by \$35 million. That essentially means that county road budgets are going to take a more than \$15 million hit and the state road fund will lose just over \$16.5 million. In Laurel County, that two cent gas tax freeze translates into a loss of \$66,423. That money has to come from somewhere or the maintenance gets deferred, something that will eventually cost drivers and the government more as projects get more expensive and drivers incur car repairs and accidents caused by dangerous roads.

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Electric safety is as important on the water as it is on the land. It's important to stay at least 10 feet away from electric power lines and other electricity sources when you are out on a boat. Remember, water and electricity are a deadly combination.

OTHER MARITIME MUST-DO'S

- If your boat accidentally comes in contact with a power line, whatever
 you do, don't jump in the water. Stay on board and don't touch
 anything made of metal. Don't leave the boat until it has moved away
 from the power line.
- If you notice a tingling sensation while swimming, the water could be electrified. Get out quickly, avoiding metal objects like ladders.
- When fishing, check for overhead power lines before casting your line.
- Equipment leakage circuit interrupters protect swimmers nearby from potential electrical leakage into the water around your boat. Consider installing them on both your boat and dock.





988 mental health hotline now available in Rockcastle

Nearly all Americans are familiar with 911 but the new 988 may not be so familiar.

Just as 911 was created for emergency service, the new federally mandated 988 emergency hotline is established for mental health crisis.

The new hotline was mandated across the country and over 200 mental health crisis centers have been established.

However, though the new system is available for Rockcastle County residents, the system is not tied to Rockcastle 911. "We didn't have to add or change anything and the new 988 mental health crisis hotline does not affect our 911 system," said Judge/ Executive Howell Holbrook. "The line is

working and anyone can call, but it is routed through a national network and has nothing to do with the county, other than Rockcastle County residents may now use that number. It is working now."

There were nearly 500,000 suicides reported in the United States between 2010 and 2020, according to the Suicide Prevention Lifeline. According to statistics gathered by federal agencies, Native Americans commit suicide more than any race but Caucasian people run a close second.

Officials urge anyone who may have suicidal thoughts, or if you know someone who may be having such thoughts, you may dial 988 at any time for help.

Officials expect 12 million calls per year.

Livingston plans Homecoming and special projects

Cameras were recording the regular monthly meeting of the Livingston City Commission meeting Monday night. After recent disagreements between some citizens and some city officials and the police department, investigators with the Kentucky State Police recommended the city install a camera in the meeting chambers, according to Melissa Hahn, Homecoming Coordinator and daughter of Mayor Dwane King.

Recent disagreements

at official meetings appeared to become physical and threatening and an investigation by the KSP and the Rockcastle County Attorney's office is ongoing.

However, a peaceful and productive meeting ensued Monday night with Mayor King requesting "volunteers and helpers" for the upcoming Livingston Homecoming as well as for other events and beautification projects in the city. "We could really use some volunteers to help us organize the homecoming," said King before the

meeting. "Our city can really use this event and we need to have lots of things for the kids to enjoy and make it a good, clean family event,"

Hahn said she expects

the 2022 Homecoming event to be among the best ever. "We are scheduling live music, a veterans' memorial, inflatables, who volunteered to help us for free, and we have a very nice fireworks show planned. We are planning the devotional and the Saturday morning breakfast for the entire community, our Grand Marshal is set, we

have people volunteering and helping and we need more volunteers. Things are coming together and we believe the parade will be beautiful. Mostly, we want the kids to have a great weekend."

However, the city is still in need of financial support for the event. "There is a little money left from last year's homecoming and we can only use that money for this event. But, we still need money to support some of the things we want to do for our community. We are taking donations now and anyone willing to help their community with time or finances should contact me or city hall," said Hahn.

The Homecoming event is planned for September 2, 3 and 4 and King asked for any suggestions. "If there is anyone who has any suggestions or ideas to make this homecoming a better event, speak up," he said. "We want to concentrate on the kids and make this a special event for everyone."

In other action, Mayor King said he is working on some property the city owns in attempts to raise funds to pay for a city audit. "Many years ago the city bought some property from a bank for \$1 and I am cleaning it up so the city can sell it and make enough money to pay for the city audit," he said.

The 80-year-old mayor showed visible scratches, cuts and bruises to the commissioners. "It is a mess in there but I am cutting briars and brush and cleaning the place up," he said. "It could make a nice property for someone and the city doesn't need it as much as it needs the audit."

King said there is FEMA money coming but those funds may only be used for the storm damage repairs nearly two years ago.

King also recently

asked the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court for a loan of \$13,000 to repair the roof of the Livingston Depot Building. The court said they would consider the issue. If the loan is granted, current plans would add the \$13,000 to the \$14,900 already owed to the fiscal court for purchase of the building.

Monday night, King asked the commissioners for support to borrow that money from the county if approved. "I have already applied for the money and I just need to know the council approves it if they give it to us." The commission voted unanimously to accept the funding if it becomes available. The city is currently paying \$300 per month to the county by leasing the building to Jason Medley, past mayor and local resident, to hold special events, according to City Clerk Amanda Thomas.

In other action, Thomas said the city is planning to open individual bank accounts for money expected from FEMA.

"The money from FEMA has to be used specifically for the one purpose

that we got it for," said City Clerk Amanda Thomas. "In other words the money we get to repair the sewer can only be used for the sewer and the same with each fund," she said. "It has been suggested that we open an account for each project and use only that money for that project." The projects include some damaged storm drains, damaged paving, damage to the sewer plant and other projects, according to officials. The suggestion was approved by the commission.

Thus far, the city is expecting about \$65,000 in FEMA funding for several different projects after flooding in 2020, according to Thomas.

After the meeting Hahn said the new camera system is working well. "That was a nice, peaceful, productive meeting," she said. "We should have installed these cameras long ago."

Having no further action, the meeting was adjourned. The next regular monthly meeting is scheduled for Monday, August 8 at 6 p.m. at City Hall. The public is invited to attend

On Thursday, August 18 a truck pull is planned and will be presented by the Brodhead Volunteer Fire Department.


On Friday, August 19, the fair will host the KITPA Truck Pull and on Saturday there will be the annual mud races presented by Hall Motorsports.

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

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

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
