Probable cause found in local double murder

Grand Jury action next

A preliminary hearing was held Wednesday morning for Chris Evans who is accused (along with a juvenile co-defendant) of the double murder of Henry Bryant and Chara Bryant on June 8th in Rockcastle County.

Detective Ryan Loudermilk of the Kentucky State Police was called by Rockcastle County Attorney Jeremy Rowe as a witness for the prosecution. Loudermilk testified about his investigation, while court-appointed defense attorney Andrew Long and his team waited to cross exam-

Loudermilk testified that police found bullets at the scene and inside both victims.

Loudermilk stated that he interviewed Evans three times but that during the first two interviews, Evans was not a suspect or a person of interest. Police simply wanted to interview him as an acquaintance of the family. In fact, during cross examination Loudermilk said the suspect had been Cody Witt, a relative of the family from the beginning the investigation.

During a trip, when Loudermilk was taking Evans to the police station to take his statement, police pulled over a car that they believed to be Witt but they were mistaken. Loudermilk

said Witt has not been found milk, six shots were fired and has never been interviewed by police.

However, Loudermilk said that Evans made a couple of statements that caught his attention and he kept them in mind for the next interview, looking for contradictory statements.

Loudermilk said Evans was very cooperative during the interviews but he did detect some deception.

According to Louder-

and that, according to Evans' earlier admission, Evans entered the bedroom of the home and shot Chara Bryant in the head as she slept in the bed.

This shot apparently woke Henry Bryant who Evans' said he shot in the face as the victim was leaping towards Evans.

Berea woman arrested for taking meth into jail

Merissa Seals, 28, of Berea, was arrested July 12th for criminal trespassing and several methamphetamine charges were later lodged against her.

According to Chris Pruitt of the Kentucky State Police, when Seals was arrested she had two small bags with her. Pruitt asked Seals if there was anything illegal in the bags and Seals told him "there should not be."

Pruitt then took Seals to jail and, when he and other officers searched the bags, they found a "loaded" hypodermic needle (meaning drugs were inside the needle and ready to be injected) and a baggie containing crystal meth.

Pruitt also found a cut straw (which is used to snort drugs) with a white sub-

On Saturday, July 15th, Renfro Valley Entertainment Center recognized Pete Stamper for his 65 years of service and dedication in the valley.


In-house emcee Doug Smith, presented Stamper with a piece of the historical Old Barn Theater, which had been painted, for his dedication.



As a matter of fact, Clinton lived in the house just across US 25 from our house during the 1950's. Nearly ten years later, my best friend at the time, Kenneth Hansel, would live there.

In those days a fairly large group of grown men, split up into groups of 4, often spent their Friday and Saturday nights, from just after dark until nearly daybreak running breakneck, helter-skelter, through dense woods and overgrown fields, chasing a pack of baying hounds and hop-

ing to see a pair of reflecting red coon eyes high up in a big oak or name your favorite hardwood forest

It would take more space than I normally use for three columns to explain all the rules and scoring procedures involved in competitive coon hunting.

I can count, on my fingers, without using them all or more than once, the number of raccoons I "treed" in Garrard County during the 1980s and early 90s. We often drove 30 miles or more into surrounding counties to deep woods where we might encounter coons. More than once, I can recall spending the entire night "hunting' and never having a dog bark at anything we thought might be the critter we were seeking.

But now that the sport seems to have lost its allure (At least don't know a single person still involved in it.) raccoons seem to be everywhere. The only critter, from my observation, that outranks them as road kill between Paint Lick and Richmond or Berea is skunks. I've actually seen more dead coons on 52 and 21 over the last couple of years, than possums.

In the meantime a group of them have recently decided that my sweet corn is the best thing they have ever tasted. They went through about 2 dozen ears in one night last week. I say they because they left tracks in 3 different sizes in the expensive "Repels-All" pest repellent I had scattered on both sides of the 100 feet row. I had about as much money invested in the repellent as the corn would be worth.

Bonide, the company that makes the stuffpproclaims, in bold print on the side of the gallon jug I pur-

"SATISFACTION GUARANTEED." But so far I have not been able to determine how they intend to back up that guarantee. If it did anything to my garden it may have attracted the coons. Repels-All might have actually been useful back in the days when I was an avid coon hunter.

My daughter, Genny, was visiting the day after the coons struck and I was showing her the numerous ears they had pulled off the stalks and gnawed off the immature kernels in such a way that the cobs looked almost like a human had eaten them. However all human sweet corn lovers I know discard the shucks after they pull them back to reveal the edible delight. My garden was littered with clean cobs with the shucks still attached.

Genny remarked, "Well coons have to eat too, Dad." "So do coyotes," I told

her. "And if I can get one or more of these thieves sighted over a 12 gauge shotgun barrel, the coyotes that often come within 100 yards or less to my house to "serenade" us are going to find a very easy meal. If the coyotes don't find coon tasty, I guarantee the buzzards

will". As of this writing, it's been three days since the raid. I've been getting up throughout the night and setting off bottle rockets in hopes of discouraging them. I figure that if I can keep them away for another 5 days my sweet corn will be ready for human consumption. Stay tuned.



told him there was an altercation between the two men who fought for some time and then Evans hit Henry Bryant in the head with the gun and eventually the pair fell into the bathroom where Evans shot Henry Bryant in the head.

A gun was brought into interest after Loudermilk found a revolver under the bed of one family member inside the home on the day of the murders, which was not confiscated at that time by police.

The revolver was later found in Evans home and is being tested by laboratories at this time. Loudermilk said that when Evans admitted to the murders, he drew a map of the crime for detectives showing exactly what had occurred at the scene. "No one should have had that information or known exactly what had happened in that house that night," said Loudermilk..

Loudermilk discussed details, including an alleged pregnancy of the juvenile co defendant, that was apparently Evans' child, and fact about Evans being warned, by the parents, to stay away from the juvenile daughter and the home.

When Long began cross examination, Loudermilk said one of the juvenile daughters said she had gone downstairs that morning and found her parents and went back upstairs to tell her sisters that their parents were dead.

It was also revealed, by Det. Loudermilk, that Evans changed his story again and is now claiming that Cody Witt, Mrs. Bryant's brother, actually committed the crime.

Loudermilk said Evans told him that he didn't make this statement earlier because he was afraid for his family's life.

Long also asked many questions about dogs in the area and dogs owned by the Bryants suggesting that this will somehow be part of the defense during the trial.

Other testimony, by Loudermilk, indicated that the juvenile co-defendant ked Evans to kill her parents because she was afraid of them. However, Loudermilk said interviews with the other daughters and neighbors, and the fact that the family had just returned from vacation the day before the murders, indicated that this claim could not be substantiated.

Loudermilk told defense attorneys that he had found a "history between Witt and the Bryants" and that physical altercations had occurred between them. This is one reason why Witt was the original suspect, Loudermilk said.

Defense also pointed out that neighbors claim to have not heard the vehicle approaching the house and heard no shots.

Loudermilk said there were a total of six shots, four of the bullets were found. One by the door, one in the floor, one in Henry Bryant and one in Chara Bryant. The other two bullets were not recovered but two bullet holes were found in the glass windows in the bed room.

When asked if he found the clothing Evans would have worn during the murder, Loudermilk said he found a place where something had been burned in the area where Evans had told him that he burned the shoes to get rid of evidence.

Cell phones of Evans and the co-defendant were taken to labs for investigation hoping to find text messages between them but no results are available yet from the lab. Many swabs of blood and bodily fluid was also taken from the scene and are being checked for DNA. Blood and bodily fluid are also being analyzed on the gun taken from Evans' home.

In closing arguments, Long told the District Judge Katie Wood that since no clothing was found and

nothing was missing from the residence, that the charge of tampering with evidence and burglary should be dropped.

Long also told Wood that Evans had stated Witt killed the couple and that the codefendant had confirmed that story so the charge of murder should be dropped as well.

However Rowe disagreed. "I don't know what evidence or testimony he was listening to but I think it's clear that there is evidence of all charges," said

Rowe reminded the judge of the accurate map of the murder drawn by Evans with information no one knew except investiga-

He also reminded the judge that Evans had admitted to burning his shoes to hide evidence and the burn pile was found exactly where Evans had said it would be.

Judge Wood then paused while considering evidence and then decided Evans "admitted to washing his clothes and burning his shoes so that's probable cause in tampering," she

Wood continued to say that Evans knew he was not supposed to be at the residence so even if he was let in by the juvenile co-defendant the burglary charge also shows probable cause.

As for the murder charge, Wood said testimony shows Evans admitted to the murders so probable cause clearly exists.

Wood was then addressed by Long who requested that Evans bond be lowered to a level that his family could pool their resources and get him out of

However the judge denied the request and left Evans' bond at one million dollars cash or property and sent the case to a Rockcastle County Grand Jury.

which would effect the baliffs' hours available for the extended hours of her office.

The five baliffs will each work 99 hours a month. They cannot work 100 hours because this would make them full-time employees eligible for retirement and insurance

York, told the court that the AOC had already gone overbudget because of installing extra cameras in the stairwells and an intercom system.

No timeline for beginning the system has been given at this time.

The court also heard a request from Larry Davidson, CEO of Rockcastle Outdoor Company, to open county roads in the Livingston area to off/on road all terrain vehicles

Davidson said that the Livingston City Commission was getting ready to open city streets to these vehicle to bring in riders which would help the economy of Livingston and that he was working with the state to open state roads in the area.

He told the court that the City of Evarts had passed such an ordinance, along with the county of Harlan, which has greatly enhanced their tax revenue, both city's and county's, in the last couple of year, according to statistics compiled by the state of Kentucky's travel and tourism departments and the U.S. Census Bureau.

Magistrate McKinney expressed concern that some of the all-terrain vehicles would not have liability insurance coverage to protect other motorists in case of an accident.

The court took Davidson's request under advisement, pending further study of the ordinance they would be required to pass.

In another matter, Judge Bishop told the court that 195 of the 200 road signs, bought in October of last year by 911, had already been used, due to the high rate of the theft of these

Bishop said that improperly marked roads created a dangerous problem for emergency services getting to people in the county. Stiffer penalties and a reward given by the county for information regarding the theft were discussed, along with an education program in the schools, emphasizing to students the problems incurred by the theft of road signs.

Magistrate McKinney pointed out that there was already an ordinance on the county's books dealing with the problem but said that the penalties might need increasing for the crime.

During the meeting, Rockcastle County Jailer Carlos McClure asked the court to consider a pay increase for detention center employees. "It's been five years since they have received a raise," he said.

Judge Bishop told McClure that the court had a workshop scheduled for this month and the matter would be discussed then, along with health insurance costs and changes to the administrative

It was also noted during the meeting that a grand opening for the newly refurbished Livingston School gym will be planned for a

The court also tabled the signing of a contract with Binswanger Southern Company, for marketing of the Anchor Packaging building since the building has been shown twice recently and the court wants to wait and see if anything develops from these showings.

The court also lowered the speed limit on Freedom School Road to 25 mph during the time that work is being done on the road.

As a final item of business, the court authorized the transfer of \$200,000 from the occupational tax account to the general fund. From that amount, \$25,000 will be transferred to the fairgrounds account and \$50,000 to the detention center.

ber can receive. Just under 3500 Medals of Honor have been awarded since it was conceived in 1861. "David M. Smith gave his life defending fellow Americans and is a true hero. We are honored to forever link his name to our Post and feel it is our duty, as military veterans, to keep his memory alive," said Commander Bobo.

The citation associated with David's "Medal of Honor" reads:

"Pfc. Smith, distinguished himself by conspicuous gallantry and outstanding courage above and beyond the call of duty in action. Pfc. Smith was a gunner in the mortar section of Company E, emplaced in rugged mountainous terrain and under attack by a numerically superior hostile force. Bitter fighting ensued and the enemy overran forward elements, infiltrated the perimeter, and rendered friendly positions untenable. The mortar section was ordered to withdraw, but the enemy had encircled and closed in on the position. Observing a grenade lobbed at his emplacement, Pfc. Smith shouted a warning to his comrades and, fully aware of the odds against him, flung himself upon it and smothered the explosion with his body. Although mortally wounded in this display of valor, his intrepid act saved five men from death or serious injury. Pfc. Smith's inspirational conduct and supreme sacrifice reflect lasting glory on himself and are in keeping with the noble traditions of the infantry of the U.S. Army."

Yards to Paradise

By Max Phelps Advantages of Gardening in Containers

Gardening in containers is done for differing reasons, often it has to do with showing off a lovely pot full of pretty flowers, or an unusual tropical looking tree, perhaps. But there are so many more ways to container garden. And there are various potential benefits to doing so.

It's not too late (or too early) to plant in a container. Soils in a container warm faster in spring than regular gardens, so plants can begin growing sooner that they would in the cold ground. And if there's a cold snap, the containers can be covered or moved indoors until danger is past. Similarly, in the fall, those flowers or vegetables that are not finished can be moved or covered to prolong the growing season. As we begin to come upon the end of planting season, putting seeds in a container might be the way

One advantage of containers is they are child friendly. Getting the kids excited about seeds or plants is a good way to get them to try things, including eating vegetables "their little pot" grew. These are invaluable experiences they will not forget, and someday it may lead them into gardening in a

Container gardens and also raised beds are easier for the elderly and handicapped to plant, tend and harvest. And not having to bend so far might be nice for the rest of us also.

Containers allow for planting many different things near each other, and putting just the right type of soil in each pot to go with each variety of flower or vegetable we may wish to grow in each one. This would be much more difficult in a traditional garden. Plus, we can rearrange the containers to our heart's content. Perhaps you want not just to

rearrange pots, but maybe you live in a rental house or apartment and might actually need to move your garden during the growing season. (Can't do that very well if the plants are growing in the ground in the backyard.) Portability is an advan-

There is less chance wildlife will eat or destroy your garden. Especially if it's on the porch or patio.

Treating for pests or isolating diseased plants will be significantly easier.


Nice decorative pots may be best at the front entry. But, there are lots of different containers and pots that can be reused or re-purposed to grow things in. Used pots from the garden center, five gallon buckets with a hole in the bottom, a broken bird bath, even cinder blocks filled with dirt. I suppose you could count "straw bale gardening" as container gardening.


Apartment balconies, the edge of the walk. windowsills-there are many places one can grow things, and this might be especially true if there is no yard or garden space you can otherwise use. Peppers. tomatoes, carrots, herbs, cucumbers can all look nice in pots, as can the herbs and any number of combination of flowers. And don't forget some flowers are edible, not just pretty. Nasturtiums, daylilys. are just a couple to mention. I think I'll try peanuts one of these days in containers-but they require a long growing season to bear nuts success-

I'll conclude with the mention of indoor plants, and moying plants back and forth. Plants growing in the house add oxygen and remove pollutants from the indoor air, and are good for our health. You just have to consider the needs of the plant. some require some sunlight. others a cool place such as an unheated garage. Surely, we could add more advantages, but I'll let you dream up some on your own.

Kentucky Afield Outdoors

Use the Kentucky Fish and Wildlife website to help find a place to fish

Two employees of the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources recently used the department's website at www.fw.ky.gov to glean information on catching saugeye.

They used the 5-foot contour maps on the "Find a Place to Fish" to study the bottom of Guist Creek Lake in Shelby County and determine a place to fish. They later fished those areas and caught their first saugeye.

"We trying to provide information on our website to make it easier for anglers to find places to fish and be successful," said Mike Hardin, assistant director of fisheries for Kentucky Fish and Wildlife. "The "Find a Place to Fish" page allows anglers to sort by county, city, waterbody, access type or even species of fish."

Many of the waterbodies detailed in the "Find a Place to Fish" page contain important fishing information, such as the 5-foot contour maps. "When you pull these waterbodies up, many of them have the location of fish attractors, species assessments as well as the contour maps. We have the contour maps

for most of our smaller state-owned lakes as well as the Fishing in Neighborhoods (FINs) lakes."

Hardin said the large reservoirs operated by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers have commercially available maps at tackle shops near the lakes or for sale online. Many of the large outfitters also sell these maps.

"Each entry contains driving directions to all of the ramps on that waterbody," Hardin said. "They also contain a link to the Fishing Forecast, detailing the fishing for many species in waterbodies across the state."

Planning a float trip on a stream can be daunting. The "Canoeing and Kayaking" page contains loads of information to help select a place to paddle. You may click on the "Stream Fisheries" tab for detailed information on access sites, lengths of floats and recommended floating levels for streams across Kentucky.

This page also contains photos of each access point and a description of the access. This is invaluable information to paddlers floating a stream for the first time. This page also shows the abundance and size structure of the population of the desirable fish in the stream such as rock bass or smallmouth bass.


The "Canoeing and Kayaking" page also contains a link to the award winning Blue Water Trails series of articles detailing more than 30 different floats across Kentucky.

These articles also contain fishing tips for the species in the waterbody as well as a printable map.

"If you are trying to figure out a place for the coming weekend, our website has many resources to help guide you," Hardin said. "We want people to enjoy our water resources and catch some fish."



Agricultural News By: Warden Alexander, FSA Director

Eligibility for Nominations for the 2017 County Committee Elections

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) county committees are a critical component of the day-to-day operations of FSA and allow grassroots input and local administration of federal farm programs.

Committees are comprised of locally elected agricultural producers responsible for the fair and equitable administration of FSA farm programs in their counties. Committee members are accountable to the Secretary of Agriculture. If elected, members become part of a local decision making and farm program delivery process.

A county committee is composed of three to 11 elected members from local administrative areas (LAA). Each member serves a three-year term. To be eligible for nomination and hold office as a committee member or alternate, a person must fulfill each of the following requirements: (1) be a producer with an interest in farming or ranching operations, (2) participate or cooperate in any FSA program provided for by law, (3) be a U.S. citizen, (4) be of legal voting age, (5) meet the basic eligibility requirements, and (6) reside in the county or multicounty jurisdiction in which they will be serving.

All nomination forms for the 2017 election must be postmarked or received in the local USDA service center by Aug. 1, 2017. Permitted Revision of Intended use After Acreage Reporting Date:

July 17, 2017 New operators or owners who pick up a farm after the acreage reporting deadline has passed and the crop has already been re-

ported on the farm, have 30 days to change the intended use. Producer share interest changes alone will not allow for revisions to intended use after the acreage reporting date. The revision must be performed by either the acreage reporting date or within 30 calendar days from the date when the new operator or owner acquired the lease on land, control of the land or ownership and new producer crop share interest in the previously reported crop acreage. Under this policy, appropriate documentation must be provided to the County Committee's satisfaction to determine that a legitimate operator or ownership and producer crop share interest change occurred to permit the revision

blended. Remove dough from bag and put onto a lightly floured surface. Knead for 5 to 10 minutes or until smooth. Place each loaf in a greased


loaf pan. Cover with a towel and allow to rise for about 30 minutes.





Somerset junior tennis tournament announced

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
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
