

City Attorney Bobby Amburgey has been organizing such an ordinance since that time and after several delays, it was presented to the city council

at their regular monthly meeting last Thursday night. The first reading of the ordinance and the municipal order were passed unanimously.

# Record drug **bust in Laurel** helps locally

An arrest announced last week, at a truck stop at Exit 49 just over the Rockcastle County line, has resulted in a record seizure of crystal

methamphetamine, and other deadly drugs, according to a report released by the Laurel County Sheriff's Department.

Last week the Mount Vernon Signal announced the arrests but few details had been released and the Laurel County Sheriff's office didn't return phone calls requesting information.

The investigation led police to the truck stop where a hostage situation unfolded and patrons were hidden in a back room while police deescalated the situation outside. The incident ended with no injuries and three arrests.

Later in the week, the department posted a press release on social media stating that the arrests resulted in the seizure of 1.25 pounds of Crystal Meth, several hundred Fentanyl pills, a small amount of co-


But I do believe that 99% of Americans would simply die if the national computer grid went out for a month. Of course the power grid going down is inevitable. There is no doubt it will happen eventually.

No Polyester For Me My subject this week again once beenprompted by my favorite columnist, Rick Bragg. His article, "It's Just Not Natural," from the latest edition of Southern Living, caught my attention in a big way. He is on the search for natural fibers in clothing, and I, too, have a reaction to polyester against my skin.

As my mother (Bee) aged, we determined that she had developed an allergy to all forms of polyester clothing. Because man-made fibers caused Bee to break out and itch, we had to replace her entire wardrobe. She could tolerate natural materials such as linen, cotton, silk, and wool, and substitutes of all kinds were readily available. Her demeanor changed drastically after we replaced her polyester clothes.

A few years after we diagnosed Bee's allergy, I began to notice certain pieces of clothing were irritating my skin. I developed the same allergy to virtually all kinds of manmade clothing materials. Any polyester clothing next to my skin makes me itch, and sometimes to break out with a rash. I loved Bragg's assessment of polyester clothing. He said, "It (polyester) is part of an evil plot designed to make us sweat and suffer."

Bragg further explained his reaction to cotton and man-made clothing. "I learned a long time ago that cotton is a precious gift from God – a blessing that springs forth from the earth – and that polyester, especially in the summertime, is an invention conceived by the forces of darkness by the global petrochemical conglomerate."

After determining my clothing allergy, I had to give away my polyester clothes and replace them with natural fibers. At first, I thought this process would be easy, but I found out that 100 percent cotton clothing is hard to find and is expensive as well. Too many companies tried to overcome the problem by making clothes that are 50 percent cotton and 50 percent polyester. That still puts the man-made fibers next to your skin. Fifty percent cotton is no better for me than 100 percent polyester. My skin requires a fabric that is 100 percent natural.

After I discovered my allergy, I passed on the information to my family members concerning my need for only natural fibers next to my skin. Nevertheless, I still consistently receive gifts of clothing that contain polyester. I put them in my closet and remain silent.

Rick Bragg discussed how hard it is to locate 100 percent cotton clothes. He explained, "I search for the words -100 percent cotton - as if I were looking for an 8-track tape." I am sorry to say that I reside in the





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

# Dr. James Chism

James Swift Chism, a.k.a. "Doc" or "Swift", depending on how one knew him, died July 22, 2022. He was born April 7, 1956 in Tompkinsville.



As a teen, he was an Eagle Scout and an athlete, participating in football, basketball, and track, and later volunteered for the U.S. Marine Corps. It was

in a middle school classroom in Tompkinsville that he acquired the nickname Swift during a bout of youthful shenanigans, and the name stuck.

During childhood summers. James helped his uncle. Levi Bailey, mow local cemeteries, and while they worked, Levi would tell him stories of those whose graves they were tending. This, along with stories passed down from his father and other elders in the community, inspired James to become an avid collector of family lore, genealogy, and local history.

After completing his service with the Marine Corps, James began attending college and soon met his sister's college roommate, Marcia. The two were smitten. James was, by that time, planning to attend vet school at the end of his undergraduate degree, and the couple decided that they would be married after he finished his D.V.M. degree. They later pushed this deadline back to after his B.S. degree, and, in the end, the two married after their freshman year, eager to begin their life together.

During the first several years of marriage, James and Marcia welcomed two daughters, Amanda Jean and Hannah Marie. The family had moved back to Kentucky after his graduation from Auburn College of Veterinary Medicine in 1987, and in December 1989, James and Marcia purchased a practice in Rockcastle County, near Marcia's home community of Ottawa.

What followed was a 32 year labor of love for the people and animals of the area. "Doc" worked tirelessly, with his wife and often children at his side, to serve the needs of the community he quickly knew as well as his own. His love for genealogy grew to include the family lineages of Rockcastle County, and clients were often astounded to find he knew their family connections as well as they did. He genuinely cared about his clients, and no visit to the clinic was complete without a check-in about any recently ailing relafives or friends.

He answered calls at all hours of the day and night, often making middle-of-the-night farm calls or leaving holidays mid-meal to see a patient in need. Even in recent weeks, when he was ailing badly himself, one could find him operating on injured, abandoned kittens to alleviate their suffering. He did not fail to step in for his patients if it was within his power and ability, often regardless of the personal cost.

In addition to his service as a United States Marine, James's career was his proudest achievement. His goal in recent years was to work until age 81, at which point he would be able to say he had a 50 year career. Sadly for us all, he was unable to reach that goal, but no one could reproach his service to the community in the 35 years he was in practice.

In his limited time away from work, James could often be found enjoying Scottish Highland Games and Festivals with his family, visiting relatives, researching genealogy, or riding horses with members of his Rockcastle Veterinary Clinic family. He counted many of his employees among his closest friends.

Doc, Swift, James, Jim, Dad, Uncle or Cousinwhatever appellation he carried from each individual who is mourting him now, he leaves behind an example of dedication and caring rarely matched and a void impossible to fill.

However, officials with the department say they "will never call anyone asking for money." If you receive such a call, it is not the Brodhead Fire Department and you are urged to hang up. Under no circumstances should residents give the callers any personal information over the phone.

Rockcastle County Sheriff Shannon Franklin says this isn't the only scam underway locally at this time. "There have been scam calls reported recently throughout the county," he said.

Franklin said one of the callers identified themselves as part of the sheriff's department and another caller claims to be with a cell phone company. "These are scam calls," said Franklin. "Never give your credit card numbers, social security numbers, passwords or other personal information over the phone," he said.

Similar stories appear in the Mount Vernon Signal nearly every year. Yet each year some local residents fall for such scams. Typically, older residents.

Officials warn that scam callers can be very convincing and sound very legitimate. But they advise that legitimate cell companies already have your personal information and fire and police organizations do not solicit for money over the phone.

"Just hang up and let local law enforcement know about the call," said Franklin.

(Continued from front) prises in the budget that Bray says is a positive sign for the city. "We always try to overestimate expenses and under estimate revenues," said Bray. "It's better to have it and not need it than to need it and not have it."

Some of the positive impacts include the budgeted general fund revenues. According to the budget, the city expected to collect about \$13,000 in vehicle taxes but actually collected \$27,194 to provide 209% of the budgeted amount for that category. In privilege licenses the city collected 215% of expected revenue which was budgeted at \$15,000 but ended at \$32,312. Some areas were less than expected such as the alcohol license fee which was budgeted at \$7,500 but only \$2,700 was collected, but some of that discrepancy is due to when licenses were issued and due dates of

fees and payments. The second biggest increase came in the category of miscellaneous income which was budgeted at \$25,000 but actually reached \$95,909 for a 384% increase. The biggest increase came when the Microfoodery plant paid off their building bringing the year-todate revenues to \$1,457,220 instead of the budgeted \$330,740 or a 464% increase.

In all, on the revenue side of the general fund budget, the city received 148% of the budgeted revenues \$3,388,606.

On the expense side of the general fund budget there were also increases with contract lawyer expenses at 529% more than budgeted and repair and maintenance to city equipment at 806% more than the amount budgeted. But over all, many areas of the general fund's estimated expenses were much lower than expected with Parks and Recreation at only 5% of the amount budget and retirement costs were only at 42% of the budgeted amount. The total expenses over all were seven percent lower than budgeted with total general expenses of \$1,023,574.

For the police and fire departments, expenses were less than budgeted and the water fund expenses were 13% less than expected while sewer fund expenses were 53% less than bud-

"Overall, this is a very good budget (for 2022-23) and we are looking good," said Mayor Mike

In other action, the council approved the first reading of a new ordinance (see related story in this issue) and accepted the \$150 per-ton bid from Five Star Asphalt for road repair in the city. The council also accepted Valley View Lane into the City maintenance schedule as city maintenance Superintendent Frank Baker explained the road currently meets required standards.

The city also heard the monthly Mount Vernon Fire Department report from Chief David Bales who reported 32 runs in June. Of those, seven involved vehicle accidents, two searches, four structure fires or smoke calls and two search and res-

Police Chief Brian Carter reported that his department had 370 calls for service in June, which included 24 vehicle accidents, 26 arrests, 26 traffic violations and 17 warrants served.

Wayne Bullock, All American Club Coordinator reported his organization picked up 14 bags of trash in the city.

(Continued from front) caine, heroin and marijuana "during a delivery to Laurel County."

The press release says Justin Cooper, Travis Johnson, Christopher Brown were arrested and each was wanted for various warrants and firearm charges.

Following the arrests, the Laurel County Sheriff's Department partnered with the DEA, the FBI and the Lexington Police Department to further investigate and identify the source of the supply as part of an ongoing investigation

The following day, executing a search warrant in Lexington related to the investigation, police discovered 43 pounds of meth, 4.7 pound of cocaine, 19,000 doses of Fentanyl, 30.9 grams of heroin and three firearms. Arrested at the Lexington raid were Ariadna Lemus-Fuentes and Jose Alberto Valles-Espinoza (a Mexican native) who were charged with federal drug trafficking and lodged in the Laurel County Detention Center.

According to the release, the confiscated drugs hold a street value of more than \$2.5 million.

Though the bust took place in Laurel County, within yards of the Rockcastle County line, Rockcastle County Sheriff Shannon Franklin said quantities of the drugs confiscated may have been in Rockcastle County within hours.

"It is very probable, with that much meth, that some of it would have been sold here in Rockcastle County," he said. "When there is that much meth in neighboring counties and so much more ready for transport from Lexington, it is pretty probable that some of it would have ended up in the hands of Rockcastle Countians."

Franklin said he was very pleased to see the work done by law enforcement in Laurel County which helped all surrounding counties as well. "That kind of bust helps everyone and this perfectly demonstrates the importance of interagency cooperation," he said. "It took a lot of agencies working together to get that 43 pounds of meth and

19,000 pills off the streets and permanently out of the hands of our youth."

All suspects are lodged in the Laurel County Dertention Center under a \$10,000 cash or property bond.

meeting. For example, the compensation for those on the board and the Codes Enforcement Officer is blank. After discussion among council members and Amburgey. the amount of compensation may or may not be zero, but it is expected to be filled in by that meeting.

According Amburgey, the new ordinance replaces a similar one the council approved in 2015 "almost word for word," except it clarifies some areas and definitions as well as "provides a much more streamlined process" for issuing citations and/or locating problem areas.

The board, which would decide on appeals and take other actions, was formed in 2015 but no longer exists, according to Mayor Bryant. "We formed the board but nothing ever really happened from it," he said. "Everyone worked very well together and tried to correct problems and they never really had a reason to meet. I guess we need to contact those original members and see if they are interested in serving on this new board before we appoint other people."

Amburgey agreed. "We really didn't have a problem with anyone back then," he said. "People just fixed the problems and worked very well with the city and no action had to be taken. Unless there is a dispute, there is really no reason for the board to meet." Mayor Bryant said he plans to look through the minutes of the 2015 meetings to find out who served on the original

board and contact them. Council member Jamie Bryant said she hopes for the same results this time. "That is the goal after all," she said. "We aren't doing this to issue citations, we are doing it to help everyone and make our town safer for citizens."

Council member Shelley Raines Lewis said she wants to "point out that a Building Inspector and a Codes Enforcement Officer (the newly created CEO position) are two very different things."

As the rough draft was presented, the municipal order, which adopts property maintenance codes, deals with duties and powers of the CEO and details what is considered an unsafe structure and the required demolition of unsafe property that is beyond repair. In the order the CEO's right of entry is defined as is notices and orders and liabilities and leaves the CEO not liable for costs in an action or suit initiated against them. In the order, a "danger-

ous structure" is defined

as a building that is "damaged, dilapidated, unsecured or abandoned so as to become an unattractive nuisance to children who might play in the building" or becomes a "harbor for vagrants, criminals or immoral persons."

The section also allows the CEO to close a building deemed unsafe or a nuisance and the cost shall be due from the owner. Once a property has been deemed unsafe by the CEO, it may not be sold or transferred until such issues are repaired.

The new city ordinance has only a few changes from the 2015 nuisance ordinances, according to Amburgey. The ordinance creates the Codes Enforcement Board with three members to be appointed by the mayor and approved by council members. The members will be appointed on staggered terms so that one member will be up for reappointment each year. No member may work or volunteer for, or be an elected official for the City of Mount Vernon.

There is also a conflict of interest clause and citations must be answered within seven days.

One of the additions to the original ordinance includes an addition to the fine schedule by adding "Construction Code" violations with fines up to \$1,000. The ordinance also includes a lienholder notification system and a section that provides for immediate action by the CEO and the board if the discovered violation presents a serious threat to public health, safety and welfare.

"There really isn't much different about our original ordinance," said Amburgey, "This new ordinance simply defines things more clearly and streamlines the process."

Mayor Bryant said he expects and hopes that all property owners will make every attempt to work with the city's updated ordinance and the board's recommendations. "We don't want to impose any fines," he said. "This is designed only to improve the quality of life and increase safety for everyone in our community. We hope our property owners continue to work with us as they have in the past. If everyone works together, our city will be safer and more attractive."

After some discussion, at the recommendation of council member Raines, Amburgey said he will combine the municipal order with the ordinance for the second reading so that the one document will contain all the information. "I think it will be less confusing for us and for the community if there is just one ordinance replacing the 2015 ordinance and it is all together," said Raines. Mayor Bryant and Amburgey agreed to combine them for the August meeting.

The second reading is expected at the August 18 regular monthly meeting at 6 p.m. in city hall. The public is invited to attend.





The Five B's Of Baptism

There is much confusion in the religious world today about baptism. Many believe today that one does not have to be baptized to be saved. Others say baptism is necessary for salvation. There is but one way to settle the confusion on this subject. We must go to the New Testament which is the law for all men today. What does the Bible tell us about baptism? Let us notice the five B's of Bible baptism.

FIRST: BAPTISM IS A BURIAL. (Rom.6:3,4) Know ye not, that so many of us as were baptized into Jesus Christ were baptized into his death? Jesus did not say that he who believes and is saved and should be baptized. One cannot be saved without baptism. (Acts 22:16) And now why tarriest thou? arise, and be baptized, and wash away thy sins, calling on the name of

FOURTH: BAPTISM IS THE BIRTH OF A CHRISTAN. (John 3:5) Jesus answered, Verily, verily, I say unto thee, Except a man be born of water and of the Spirit he cannot enter into the kingdom of God. To be born of the water and of the Spirit, involves being baptized in water in obedience to the teaching of the Holy Spirit. (1Cor.12:13) For by one Spirit we are all baptized into one body, whether we be Jews or Gentiles, whether we be bond or free; and have been all made to drink into one Spirit.

# Matthew Whitaker named 2022 Teacher Mentor

"I would have never made it in this profession without encouragement and guidance from many mentors who helped ensure my success," said Whitaker.

It's this support and encouragement that has compelled Whitaker to become a mentor himself.

Whitaker helps newer agriculture teachers by listening to their concerns, sharing his experiences and supporting them with technical advice and teaching materials. In the often overwhelming first few years of teaching, the support of a mentor can help teach-

ers feel more confident in their work – creating a more fulfilling experience and hopefully encouraging them to stay in the profession.

Whitaker has mentored colleagues in a variety of ways. Whitaker has also had three student teachers during his career, and has continued to support them as they gone into their own classrooms. Three of Whitaker's former students have chosen careers as agricultural educators, and he also stays in regular contact with each, helping with questions or concerns as they arise.

Whitaker and his coteacher at Rockcastle County High School were asked to host a workshop for new agriculture teachers from across the state. As a result, he has created close connections with many of them, and has shared resources about FFA, classroom instruction, experiential learning and much more.

He also has participated in several curriculum and FFA contest revision and update projects through the Kentucky Department of Education, serving his colleagues in yet another capacity.

Despite his role of mentoring others in the profession, or perhaps because of it, Whitaker continues to take his own professional development very seriously. Whitaker resides in Mt. Vernon with his wife Hillary, who is also an agriculture teacher, and their son, Jackson.


As the 2022 KAAE Teacher Mentor, Whitaker is now in the running to be named as one of the top six teacher mentors in the United States.

Clean used motor oil may also be dropped off at the Rockcastle County Road Department.



# **UNITE** coordinates pilot

An innovative program designed to help curb opioid misuse was announced July 12th in Kentucky and four other states by the Partnership to End Addiction.

Operation UNITE (Unlawful Narcotics Investigations, Treatment and Education, Inc.), with support from Walmart, has been selected to coordinate this pilot program across the Commonwealth of Kentucky. UNITE, a non-profit organization based in Southeastern Kentucky. is a collaborative model striving to prevent substance misuse and facilitate recovery.

Prevention is the most effective tool to avoid problems resulting from opioid misuse," said Nancy Hale, President & CEO of Operation UNITE is pleased to take the lead for this project in Kentucky."

RxAware is a personalized text messaging program that educates parents, caregivers and individuals on opioid medication safety and non-addictive pain relievers. After texting RXAWARE to 55753, participants will answer a short series of questions about their own - or a loved one's - pain management needs. Following the assessment, the participant will receive personalized messages vetted by health professionals that provide educational information, resources, and actionable support.

The KY HELP Statewide Call Center-1-8338-KY-HELP (1-833-859-4357) - staffed by Operation UNITE, provides personalized, compassionate assistance and resources to Kentuckians seeking help for a substance use disorder. In addition, staff members offer comfort, support and guidance to family members confronted with a loved one's addiction. KY HELP specialists provide crisis management and guide clients in making informed decisions about treatment. Outreach services are pro-

vided for up to one year. Screening and Referral Specialists are available Monday-Friday from 8:30 am to 10 pm (EDT) and Saturday-Sunday from 8:30 am to 5 pm (EDT). Since December 2017, the KY HELP Statewide Call Center has responded to 17,738 calls from residents in 119 of Kentucky's 120 counties.

# Student Worship at 6 pm BOATING SAFETY

Stay safe when setting sail

Electric safety is as important on the water as it is on the land. It's important to stay at least 10 feet away from electric power lines and other electricity sources when you are out on a boat. Remember, water and electricity are a deadly combination.

- **OTHER MARITIME MUST-DO'S**  If your boat accidentally comes in contact with a power line, whatever you do, don't jump in the water. Stay on board and don't touch anything made of metal. Don't leave the boat until it has moved away from the power line.
- If you notice a tingling sensation while swimming, the water could be electrified. Get out quickly, avoiding metal objects like ladders.
- When fishing, check for overhead power lines before casting your line.
- Equipment leakage circuit interrupters protect swimmers nearby from potential electrical leakage into the water around your boat. Consider installing them on both your boat and dock.




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


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
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# The Lions Minute
