
According to my grandson, most all students were very disappointed their family couldn't be there, just as many parents I know expressed disappointment they couldn't be there.



## **Used Tire** disposal

For farmers and business owners, as well as residents of Kentucky, one of the most difficult items to get rid of are old, used tires, according to Solid Waste directors. In fact, according to Kentucky Statues, it is illegal to burn or bury tires along with other items that emit pollutants.

Kentuckians can't throw them away, can't burn them and can't bury them.

However, Rockcastle County Fiscal Court, in conjunction with the Kentucky Division of Waste Management, has announced a 2023 waste tire collection event. on Thursday, June 22 from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. and Saturday, June 24 from 8 a.m. till noon.

The event will be held at the State Highway Garage at 293 Maintenance Road in Mount Vernon.

Tires accepted will include truck, light truck, passenger, implement, lawn tractor, bicycle, mortorcycle, golf cart, tractor, and more. Tires with rims will be accepted. Tractor tires must have a bead thickness less than 1-3/4 inch.

Tires not accepted will include foam, calcium or otherwise filled tires, sheet rubber, large off road tires, off road construction equipment tires and solid tires.

Tire retailers, agriculture tire retailers, scrap yards, junk/salvage yards and recycle businesses are not eligible to partici-

Any individual with more than 1,500 tires in one location must call at least 14 days prior to the collection event to arrange for special pick up.

Anyone with a very large load of tires may need to unload themselves or wait until staff can assist, according to Solid Waste Coordinator James Renner.






The Honor Guard stood in silence as the Roll of Honor was ready during Monday's Memorial Day celebration on the Courthouse lawn.







resources of Lincoln County and Garrard County with Rockcastle County and the Garrard/ Lincoln/Rockcastle Regional Industrial Park was born. "Now we suddenly have a workforce of 60,000 people, natural gas service and an interstate highway right through it all. We also have a lot more services available to offer in the KPIP grant application and to potential industry," VanHook said.

So the three local officials began coming up with ideas and soon, the Rockcastle/Lincoln/ Garrard Regional Industrial Park had massive potential to attract industry from all over the world, according to

VanHook.

The State of Kentucky agreed and soon the new collaborative effort between the three counties had become one of only 54 projects approved for a portion of the KPIP money.

"When you have people working together to get things done, much bigger, better things get done," said VanHook. "We had been looking at purchasing the site already because it was such a strong commercial location for so many potential uses. A huge county park or any of a hundred other uses came to mind. But when this KPIP grant came along, it was the perfect place for this project."

The three counties have now purchased the 165-acre site, located on the corner of US-461 and KY-150, for \$1.6 million which will be reimbursed through KPIP for \$801,000 of that. "With all three counties involved. Rockcastle County only has to involve one-third of the \$801,000. So Rockcastle County basically got that 165 acres for \$267,000," he said. But that's not all of the story. "When we reinvest that \$800,000 that we get reimbursed, we get reimbursed for half of that again. We are basically getting returns on the same money twice," he said.

VanHook says there are many financial benefits to owning such prime commercial property. Not to mention that the 165 acres will be available for some massive industrial develop-

ment potential. "There is no doubt that such regional approaches provide development opportunities that we simply could not offer by ourselves," said VanHook.

As part of the arrangement, all three counties will share in the revenues generated by the park but VanHook said this park will be developed with massive industry in mind. "Our other local park has a road down the center of it, dividing up the property," he said. "This greatly limits what the space can be used for. An industry needing a bigger footprint than either side has, cannot locate there. We will keep this regional space open until we know who is needing the property and what they require." VanHook said there

has already been interest in the new regional park but a soon-to-be created regional park board will report to all three fiscal courts with any new developments. "This board will oversee the regional park and work with all three fiscal courts to move forward with potential industrial development," he said. "Also, we can afford to take our time with this one. We can just wait until we get just the right hit to suit this area. Such proper placement of the proper industry would also be a benefit in attracting other industry to the region, he said. It all works very closely together and I have to keep all this in mind with every new development. The right kind of business locating here can provide us with leverage for federal grants and for even bigger industry. It's a puzzle and every piece has to

VanHook said he and Bray and Holbrook work with Garrard and Lincoln officials every week. "We have to stay on top of things but one tning has proven true time and time again," he said. "Whomever controls the land, controls the economic development and growth in the region."

Bray agreed. "I'm happy to see the regional industrial park take place," said Bray. "For too long we've looked at invisible lines on a map and tried to compete with other counties for economic development. Instead of fighting, we are working together for the betterment of the region."

The three officials agree that all counties will benefit from the arrangement. "A rising tide lifts all boats," said Bray. "What's good for Rockcastle is good for Lincoln and Garrard as

\$43 million budget the school district has allot-

It was an arduous task to raise the \$43 million and took Kentucky State Representative Josh Bray pushing legislation, worth a total of \$14 million, to get it done. The district used programs, and funding avenues and contingency funds to make up the remaining \$30 million and let the project out for

Last Thursday, those bids were submitted and opened with some of the sealed bids handed to the construction manager seconds before the 1 p.m. deadline.

The complex bid package, as let by Codell Construction Company of Winchester and Decco Architects of Somerset, included 19 bid packages and each bid package contained seven alternate bids. The complete bid package also contained several addendums but all were recognized by the 28 construction companies who took part in the bid process.

Each bid was opened and read aloud as anxious company owners and workers waited to hear if their bid was the apparent low bid. However, with the amount of alternate bids, additions, deductions, potential changes and the negotiations that are underway between project managers and low bidders, it is impossible, at this time, to know if the total bid prices are within the \$43 million estimate until such negotiations are complete, according to Superintendent Dr. Carrie Ballinger.

"The numbers are very complex at this point," she said. "We are negotiating with bidders and making decisions about what is needed and what is wanted. We expect to have a final number and a decision by the June board meeting." If all the details can be worked out, the board may be asked to vote to begin the project by that meeting, according to officials.

A bid for the drywall work included three separate bidders while the bid for the required wood athletic flooring included four other bidders and the bid for food service equipment included three other bidders.

One of the alternate bid packages removed proposed Gymatorium from the project so that each bid included a deduction from their base-bid if the Gymatorium is not part of the final project. There was also an additional bid to the base-bid if the final project includes renovating the existing locker rooms. Another alternate bid included a potential road path around the bus garage.

Other than the general trade bidding at slightly over \$14 million, the highest bids came in the plumbing department with bids averaging just over \$10 million for plumbing, but those bids too are being negotiated.

There were also some alternate packages that had no bidders. According to Ballinger, those packages will have to be rebid.

Ballinger said she and the board will be working closely with bidders in an attempt to bring the total estimate within budget and will have final numbers in June.

Between the bid opening and the June meeting, Ballinger says she ex-

pects all to be complete.

"We will add all this together and perform our due diligence, keeping in mind what's best for our students and our community, and hopefully we

can roll it all out at the June meeting," she said.

The May 25 special meeting to address the budget and the salary schedule was postponed to June 1, according to

## Portion of \$6 million in **Mental Health funding** to reach Rockcastle

Lieutenant Governor Jacqueline Coleman came to Rockcastle County recently to announce \$6 million over the next five years that will be disbursed among 76 schools in the southeastern part of Kentucky.

According to a press release from the Southeast South-Central Educational Cooperative (SESC), the money will be used to assist in the mental health arena throughout the chosen schools.

The money is expected to be used to identify and treat mental health issues in about 16.000 students in the region. Those with SESC say the funding will be used to provide students with better access to mental health resources.

Rockcastle School Superintendent Dr. Carrie Ballinger told WYMT she is excited about the grant. "Often times our region is overlooked, and it is important to know that we can be on the cutting edge and we are making sure that our students are receiving all of the services they need and deserve as well," she said.

The funding will be allotted for five years but officials say they aim to help as many students in that time as possible.

How much funding will be distributed to each district or each school will be determined by need but Coleman praised the U.S. Department of Education for the fund-



Social Security's campaign strives to reach people in their communities to tell them about the eligibility criteria for SSI, and how to contact us online at www.ssa.gov/ssi or by phone for more information or an appointment to apply." The campaign supports President Biden's Executive Order 13985, Advancing Racial Equity and Support for Underserved Communities Through the Federal Govern-







## UNITE will expand Service Corps next school year

Operation UNITE will expand its UNITE Service Corps initiative to 62 AmeriCorps members during the 2023-24 school year thanks to a nearly \$1 million grant announced Thursday,

May 18.

"Team Kentucky is building a better Kentucky with the support of AmeriCorps and 20 sponsor organizations, such as nonprofits and education agencies," said Kentucky Governor Andy Beshear. "We thank them for their support and hard work as they help us improve the lives of our Kentucky families and communities."

"AmeriCorps members serving with Operation UNITE serve a dualpurpose role: Provide math tutoring and drug prevention education to elementary school students," said Crystal Smallwood, Director of the UNITE Service Corps. "Lessons introduced through the 'Too Good For Drugs' curricula help students develop social and emotional skills for making healthy choices, build positive friendships, communicate effectively, and

Operation UNITE will resist peer pressure and pand its UNITE Serinfluence."

This fall term will mark the 16th year of the UNITE Service Corps program.

Next school year, UNITE will engage 62 Kentucky AmeriCorps members at elementary schools in 21 counties: Bell, Boyd, Carter, Floyd, Harlan, Johnson, Knott, Knox, Laurel, Lawrence, Leslie, Letcher, Lincoln, Magoffin, Martin, Owsley, Pike, Pulaski, Rockcastle, Whitley, and Wolfe.

"Ensuring youth have strong, fact-based drug prevention and avoidance skills is essential if we want them to stav substance free," said Nancy Hale, President & CEO of Operation UNITE. "The reach of AmeriCorps members with the UNITE Service Corps extends deep into our service region. They become actively engaged within their schools by sponsoring anti-drug UNITE Clubs, joining their UNITE Community Coalition, and recruiting adult volunteers. AmeriCorps members foster relationships that broaden their impact well beyond the classroom. They are helping to change the culture across southern and eastern Ken-

In all, 21 operational programs across Kentucky will receive \$14.7 million in AmeriCorps federal grants, combined with \$5.8 million in private and public matching funds to provide tutoring, teaching, and other educational services for students in all grade levels through post-secondary education, as well as provide help with housing, clothing, and food to Kentuckians in need.

The AmeriCorps federal agency will make available nearly \$4.8 million in education awards for program participants. After completing a full term of service, AmeriCorps members are eligible for \$6,895 for college, postsecondary education, or to pay back student loans.

Through the Cabinet for Health and Family Services, Serve Kentucky currently administers 23 AmeriCorps program grants with more than \$14 million in federal funds, along with supporting

other statewide Community service programs.

Cabinet Secretary Eric Friedlander praised AmeriCorps for its support. Program funding, he noted, impacts Kentucky's quest to build more resilient communi-

"As Team Kentucky moves forward with building a better commonwealth following the pandemic, natural disasters, and other impacts, the programs supported will play a significant role in making Kentuckians and the places they live more resilient and ready for a brighter future," Friedlander said.

AmeriCorps funding also helps provide services to aging Kentuckians, disaster relief, environmental education, support for public health, and food support services, said Joe Bringardner, Executive Director of Serve Kentucky. "AmeriCorps members use their talents, their vision, and their boundless energy to establish immediate and long-lasting change."

## Mamaw's Kitchen

CASSEROLE
12 ounces bacon
2 cups cubed Texas toast
1/2 cup melted butter
6 large eggs
2 cups milk
1 and 1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
2 ounces finely shredded
parmesan cheese

breast
1 cup fresh tomatoes, diced
2 tablespoons fresh parsley,
chopped

10 ounces chopped turkey

Cook bacon in large skillet overmedium heat until crisp. Remove bacon, reserve bacon grease. Crumble bacon. Toss bread cubes together with melted butter on a baking sheet. Bake at 375° until toasted, about 15 minutes. Remove from ovenbut leave oven on. Lightly grease an 11 x 7 baking dish. Whisk eggs, milk, salt, and dry mustard together in a large bowl. Add cheese, turkey breast, 1/2 cup crumbled bacon, 3 tablespoons reserved bacon grease, and toasted bread cubes. Pour mixture into prepared baking dish. Bake at 375° until golden brown and set, about 45 minutes. Shielding with foil the last 10 minutes to prevent excess browning, if needed. SAUCE:

2 tablespoons butter 2 tablespoons flour 1 cup milk

4 ounces finely shredded parmesan cheese

To make the sauce, whisk together the butter and flour in a small saucepan over medium heat until smooth, about 1 minute. Gradually whisk in milk; cook until thickened and mixture just begins to bubble, about 4 minutes. Remove from heat and whisk in parmesan cheese until blended. Spoon sauce over casserole. Top with fresh tomatoes, parsley, and remaining bacon.

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
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


