
Car Show & concert

Man shot with SKS after fishing on Sand Hill Road

According to a Kentucky State Police (KSP) Report, Jackie L. Blackburn, 22, of Sand Hill, has been arrested on charges related to the shooting of Donald Abney, residence unknown, Thursday, June 8.

According to the report, police received a call around 9:15 p.m. that Abney had been shot. Upon arrival, police performed interviews to determine that Abney had been fishing with Jesse Mason in a pond in Sand

The report said Mason and Abney were fishing when Blackburn arrived at the pond and talked with the two men for a short time. The report does not say if an argument ensued but does say that Blackburn then returned to his residence, apparently near the pond, and shot an SKS style rifle in the direction of Mason and Abney four times, reportedly...

According to the report, Abney and Mason

then got in their truck and attempted to drive away when another shot was fired. The report does not say if Abney was injured from the first round of shots or while in the truck but it does say that the two men were not on private property when driving away in the truck. Abney was airlifted to the University of Kentucky Medical Center for treatment of the gunshot wound.

Shortly after the incident, KSP troopers located Blackburn at his residence on Sand Hill Road at about 11 p.m. and interviewed him after he was read his Miranda Rights.

Blackburn admitted to firing shots with the SKS in the direction of the two men, and firing again after they had entered their truck and were driving away. Blackburn also admitted to drinking alcohol throughout the day and police smelled the odor of alcohol, the report says.

According to Blackburn's admission,

MCClure Street in Livingston is now a oneway street and some parking spaces in town have been removed and turned into No Parking Zones.

Members of the Livingston City Commission held their regular monthly meeting last week finalizing the changes.

Commissioners had

discussed public parking that blocks some roadways in town and McClure Street becoming a one-way street at earlier meetings. But the commission voted last week to make the changes offi-

Mayor Larry Davidson said signs will be clearly placed so that everyone will know of the changes.

and environmental experts, the two officials discovered the cause of the bad taste and smell, according to Bray and Bryant.

Apparently the problem stems from a seasonal algae bloom which releases geosmin into Lake Linville where Mount Vernon gets it water supply.

More experts were called from the Division of Water and environmental companies to find a way to correct the issue and it was determined that a new 100,000 gallon power activated carbon reactor basin would remove the taste and smell from the local water system.

Bray and Bryant then went about raising the funds for such a project that was estimated to cost slightly over \$1 million in 2018. Bray was able to receive approval for a \$250,000 matching grant from the Department of Local

Government and a \$750,000 grant from the Army Corps of Engineers. There was also a \$165,000 federal ARC grant set aside for the project. The project was

underway and meetings were held at the site as plans were made for the new basin.

Winds cause some blocked roadways in Rockcastle Co.

Rockcastle County joined most of the Southeastern United States Sunday evening as high winds and heavy rains blanketed the area.

The National Weather Service issued a severe wind and potential flooding threat Sunday helping resident prepare but officials say heavy winds damaged several large trees blocking roads and driveways scattered around the county.

Volunteers of the Brodhead Fire Department say they spent several hours Sunday

evening and Monday morning working to clear debris including broken limbs and fallen trees from roadways in the county.

Rockcastle County Judge/Executive Howell Holbrook, Jr. said local road crews began clearing trees as residents reported fallen limbs near their homes. Holbrook said crews worked through most of Sunday evening and Monday making roads passable and safe for motorists.

Constables trying to help in ongoing deputy shortage

Last week, the Mount Vernon Signal reported a severe shortage of manpower in the Rockcastle County Sheriff's office. While Sheriff Shannon Franklin and the fiscal court are working on ways to solve the issue, Rockcastle County Constables say they are working hard to answer calls for service throughout the county but, new laws have them greatly restricted.

"There are times that there are no deputies on duty and only one city unit on the road. It is up to the that city officer and constables to have the county covered and keep the people safe," said District 2 Constable Steve Griffin. "We are out and about trying to help the sheriff and the state police. But myself and Brian Wynn (District 5 Constable)

are the only two constables with full police powers, thanks to HB239 which limited the powers of constables across the state this year." Griffin and Wynn were "grandfathered" into

their positions since HB239 allows constable who were already in office to maintain the same authority they had prior to the passing of the new bill. However, police powers were removed from constables' authority if they are newly elected. Not all constables agree with the bill. "I'm going to

keep doing whatever I need to do," said Rick Brummett, District 3 Constable. "They aren't going to do anything to me and the bill is very weak. It will be overturned by next year anyway." According to Griffin, he and Wynn have the

same authority as police officers to write citations, cuff suspects and make arrests. "The biggest difference in police/deputies and constables, who are certified or grandfathered in, is that we are elected and we don't get paid," he said. "Our equipment, gas, vehicles, uniform, insurance and all other expenses for doing our job comes out of our own pocket."

When asked why he does the job for no pay, Griffin said, "I do it because I want to help people. I have been a firefighter and EMS for 25 years before being elected constable. I just want to help those in need. We all do."

According to Griffin, the new statutes greatly (See "Help" on A5)

Oh no! It is 3:00 a.m. and so dark outside. I was sleeping so soundly until I was rudely awakened by this urge. Maybe if I lie here under this old quilt, the urge will go away. Maybe I will go back to sleep till morning and forget about this nagging urge. But alas, sleep will not come back and the urge isn't going away. In fact, it is getting stronger. Yep, I gotta go.

I remember those emotions very well. When nature called at 3 o'clock in the morning there wasn't much one could do except answer the call.

"Mom, I gotta go. Will you go with me?" It never failed. "Yes honey. I'll walk with you. Let me get the light."

It seemed like a mile away but was actually only about 40 yards from the back door of our home to the outhouse. The walk took forever and I could sense wild animals watching me and mom going to take care of business. Mom always set the flashlight inside the outhouse so that I could see. I never really thought about her having to stand outside the old wooden outhouse at 3 a.m. in complete darkness while I took care of business, but she never complained.

I always had to look very closely before I sat down because splinters had a way of working their way to pointing straight up and sticking in my butt cheeks when I sat down. But that wasn't the big worry. I will never forget that my biggest concern in life was the huge wasp nest in the upper corner. I would sit there the entire time watching what looked like a thousand wasps angry and moving around

because I had interrupted their evening.

Thank God I was never stung while sitting there but it was a constant worry. Dad had told me that if I left them alone. they would leave me alone. But my thought was "I didn't leave them alone. I am bothering them by coming in here at 3 in the morning. This is not fun."

Once I was finished, mom would walk me back to the house and tuck me back into the bed under my quilt with Butch (my stuffed dog).

First thing in the morning I would usually want a drink of water (I was a needy child). So mom would hand me a silver, metal bucket with a wire handle and send me outside to the well. We had a pump handle that I would have to pump five or six times before water would start coming out. Then after I stopped pumping, water kept coming for some time, so I had to plan that out just right or I would be wasting water. Wasting water was a big negative. Water was a precious commodity in those days and every drop was measured out and used for specific purposes.

Some of the water would go into a pan that sat on the stove. That water got heated for washing hands and face and dad shaving in the morn-

I've spent most of this rainy, stormy Sunday afternoon at home by myself. Stanley was running some errands over at London. It has been one of those days you just want to curl up with a cup of hot tea in a blanket and let the world go by.

Today, I let my mind wander back to childhood stormy days, before I was school age. My mom was deathly afraid of storms. When there would be a storm blow through, she would put chairs in the closet for us to sit on until the storm passed, just like there was a tornado watch. This was at our little house. It is little wonder that I didn't turn out the same and have a fear of storms like she did. However, it must have worked just the opposite in my case. Maybe I was curious and wanted to see the power of the storm. In my adult years I find myself going to the porch as the wind is beginning to pick up and hear the thunder and see the lightning in the distance. I usually stay out there until it gets so intense, it drives me inside. The power and intensity of it is so exciting but yet humbling at the same time. This is the unbridled power of God's hand at

Maybe I got the call of the porch from my

grandpa. He would often go to the porch when storms arose in the summer. He sat on a porch glider and took in the sights. I was just a little girl, about three or four years old when I would visiting my grandparent's house who lived next door often when the storms came though. One of the best memories I have is being out there on the porch with Grandpa Norton with him on the glider and I had wrapped myself up in an old quilt and snuggled over next to the house with my doll and went to sleep. It may have been the best sleep I ever had. I must have slept for hours. It was a Saturday afternoon and I woke up just in time to watch a circus program

Another time when I was visiting, our whole family was there when a storm came along. We had gathered in one room and were telling stories until the storm passed. In those days it seemed that families gathered together and got rather quiet during storms right after one or two of the family ran around through the house unplugging everything electrical, starting with the TV. You didn't dare use the phone or the lightning would run in on

on the TV



Trimming and removal of trees can be dangerous work

Consider these common dangers before attempting a tree trimming project on your own:

ELECTROCUTION: You can be seriously injured or killed if you come into contact with an electric line. If there's a chance power lines might be involved at all, always call your electric utility first and its experts will come out and advise you.

FALLING: Pruning branches or trimming out dead or overgrown limbs sometimes requires getting into the tree. Always make sure you are using appropriate safety harnesses and ropes. Before climbing, inspect the tree to make sure no power lines run through

BEING STRUCK: Cutting large limbs and trees can be tricky. Improper cutting can cause the tree to fall where you hadn't planned. Always have two escape routes planned in case the tree starts going the wrong way. Never turn your back to a falling tree, and always wear a hard hat when trimming and cutting.

OVERESTIMATING: You can be seriously injured or killed if you overestimate your abilities.





the SKS in question contained eight rounds before he began firing and contained three after the shooting.

Blackburn was arrested and transported to the Rockcastle County Detention Center where he was charged with assault in the first degree. The investigation is ongoing. The condition of Abney was not known at press time.

"Help"

(Continued from front) limit the authority of constables who are not certified. "I am certified because I worked with the sheriff's department. But. I let it expire," said Brummett. Griffin agrees certification is a difficult task. Going through the academy for certification takes 20 weeks and costs \$15,000. What constable out here can afford to miss 20 weeks of work and pay that kind of money?

According Brummett, the certification will not be needed if the new bill is eliminated. "It (the bill) will go away soon enough," he said. "In the meantime, we just show up to help and back up police and deputies," he said. "If you call 911 and no one else can be there, you don't care who shows up as long as someone in authority arrives to help. That's what I am here for -- to help."

Griffin says there are only four types of elected peace officers in any county. "We have the coroner, the jailer, the sheriff and the constables," he said. "Each of them are considered peace officers with full police powers, But now a constable has to be certiful fied to maintain police powers. Any of those can arrest, perform traffic stops, write citations or whatever is needed Rut now, suddenly dulyelected constables can't do those things without certification. I think that is bunk."

Griffin says the only time constable receives pay is when they are serving papers for an attorney. "We get \$50 or \$60 for serving papers. Sometimes I make eight trips to a house 20 miles away and can't catch them at home. So I make nothing for trips such as that," he said.

The sheriff and county judge/executive say police/sheriffs' departments are losing personnel to SRO (school resource officer) positions throughout the state. However, Griffin says constables cannot typically be an SRO because of the cer-

tification process. "We can do civil work and can take care of several things but right now, we are basically in a support role," said Brummet. "I ran for this office to help people and make our citizens feel secure. I show up with a police officer it is more of a deterrent to the bad guy than if the officer were by

himself." While the sheriff's department is searching for qualified, certified deputies, constables agree that they will provide any support they can to help the citizens of Rockcastle County. "There is only so much that some constables can do thanks to HB239. But we will do all we can. That's why we are here," said Griffin. Rodney Adams is Constable of District 1 and

Donnie Cope is Constable of District 4. Both are uncertified. Their contact information is as follows:

"Water"

(Continued from front) Bray, the project was stalled. "I have never worked with anyone with as much red tape as the Army Corps of Engineers," he said in an interview in 2020. The project was on hold for countless reviews and inspections and other potential documentation as well as reams of paperwork. "I've never seen anything like it," he said.

For the next several years, the water system continued to service 85% of Rockcastle County with the bad taste and odor in the water system. As the project continued, Bray ran for the office of Kentucky State Representative and won his race against incumbent Travis Brenda. Once in office, Bray resigned as City Administrator but continued to help the city as a contractor consultant. Bryant then retired from his political career and is no longer Mayor of Mount Vernon.

However, Bray has not let the project go and says he is continuing to work on getting the help that Mount Vernon water customers seek.

Current Mt. Vernon Mayor Tim Roberts and newly-appointed City Administrator Jim Bowman, have both stated that they intend to focus their attention on the issue until it is resolved.

The latest delay came when the Department of Rural Development asked for a lengthy check list to be completed by the city before the project could move forward. Bray says the checklist is now complete and the Corp of Engineers are slated to meet with the Mount Vernon City Council in the June regular meeting scheduled for this week.

Meanwhile local residents are still dealing with the issue.

Dale Whittaker, member of the Rockcastle County Industrial Development Authority, said the issue is a constant complaint of local citizens. "It is really bad right now," he said. "You can't even get a drink at a local restaurant. You smell that awful odor as you raise the drink to your lips. Something needs to be done about this."

Many other citizens and officials continue to call the Mount Vernon Signal concerning the is-

According to Bray, the Corps of Engineers, who are expected to meet with the city this week, is expected to have some information about the progress of the project.

However, officials agreed at a recent meeting that the cost of the basin project is expected to be much higher than originally estimated due

to inflation and other issues raised throughout the planning process.

The money that has been raised through grants is not expected to be enough to cover the cost of the new basin, since the estimates were done several years ago.

Officials say new estimates will have to be made and funding will be the next issue.

Officials agreed that citations won't be issued for a short period while residents get use to the changes. "I will just be informing people of the changes for a while," said Police Chief Travis Davis. "I will give everyone time to get use to the changes. People have been driving north on that street all their lives so some may just forget for a while. We aren't doing this to write tickets. We are doing it for the safety of our citizens."

The commission also agreed that all city streets will have a speed limit of 15 mph. Main Street is a state highway and will remain at 35 mph in the city limits. Davidson said the speed limit of 15 is already the case but there is no signage and it has not been enforced. Signs will be ordered and enforcement will begin soon, according to city officials.

City officials also met with Devin Shelton, of Crab Orchard. Shelton is seeking a position with the Livingston City Water and Sewer Department. Shelton had been licensed but says he let his license expire. However. he claims he can have it renewed with minimal

difficulty. The city is required to have a certified water and sewer department supervisor and Davidson said he expects to talk with Shelton at length concerning the requirements of the position. Davidson said there will be a special called meeting of the commission to discuss

the issue soon. Shelton said he has worked with the Crab Orchard and the Brodhead Water and Sewer departments and is confident he can be certi-

fied soon. Davidson also addressed the destruction of a city-owned house and recommended the house be donated to the Kentucky Fire Commission. According to Davidson, a firefighter and member of the fire commission, the commission would burn the home in a very strategic method using each room, the roof, and other parts of the home as it burns to teach firefighters about the behavior of fire and smoke in a home. "A public burn like that provides invaluable experience for training

firefighters. We learn new

things at every burn and it is the best of teaching tools," he said.

Davidson said the asbestos siding will have to be removed along with doors, windows, carpeting and more. "The house will be down to wood natural materials before the burn and the EPA will have to be involved since there is asbestos present," he said.

According Davidson, the city removing the house would cost in excess of \$5,000 but the fire commission would cover those expenses for the training opportunity. "This way it won't cost the city anything except some sweat equity in removing carpet, roofing, doors and

windows and such and removing the foundation afterwards," he said. "But then we will have a nice clean lot for whatever use decide. and firefighters will have an experience that can save lives."

The commission voted unanimously to donate the house to the fire commission.

There were also seven names submitted for the new Codes Enforcement Board. The commission chose Becky Bullock, Sherri GoForth and Donald Durham, via silent vote. An alternate will be chosen at a later date in the event one of the board members is unable to perform their duty for any reason.

Davis then provided the police report stating that the department is "running very well." Davis said the cruiser is now fully equipped and the department has everything it needs to operate properly. Mayor Davidson said he has heard from citizens that there is a clear difference in unwanted night time activity. "We thank you for what you do," said Davidson. "Our citizens are taking notice of the progress you have helped create," he said.

Nearly \$2 million total

CBDG money funds may be released for more growth

Members of the Rockcastle County Industrial Development Authority (RCIDA) held their regular monthly meeting last Wednesday with Chairman Corey Craig and Executive Director Jeff VanHook, along with three members present and one participating via facetime.

VanHook told the board that auditors were expected to begin this week with the audit that will ensure that the Microfoodery plant has met the requirements of the revolving CBDG loans provided by the City of Mount Vernon and by RCIDA. Each loan was nearly \$1 million and once certain requirements are met, each entity may then use the money that has been paid back for other economic development investments.

According to the RCIDA financial report. the City of Mount Vernon has received \$200,882 in payments towards their loan while the RCIDA has been repaid \$258,354 of their loan amount. Both include interest payments. The plant has paid back a total of \$459,240 of the two \$1 million CBDG loans, according to the statement.

If the audit finds that requirements of the loan have been met, then each entity may then dip into that fund if another economic development project is presented to

VanHook says there are certain requirements for any potential development which may apply to borrow some or all of the funds available. "We are basically using the same grant funding several times," said VanHook. "We get to use the same money for more than one economic development in our county."

According to the Cumberland Valley Development District, after the funds have been used to help create a certain amount of development within the county and/or the city, each \$1 million grant will then be available for the city and the RCIDA to use for any project they desire. "Eventually, we get to keep the \$1 million for any project we want and

Happy 88th **Birthday JOHN HOLBROOK** the city has the same opportunity," said VanHook.

VanHook also reported that he met last week with those involved. in the new regional industrial park and a ninemember steering committee has been formed to oversee the project and prepare it for development. Representatives from each of the three counties involved will serve on the committee and help orchestrate how the park will operate and how the funds generated will be properly and fairly disbursed once industry begins to locate

VanHook said archeologists are currently on the park property at HWY 461 and HWY 150, performing studies that are required for such development. VanHook said other agencies must also complete studies, including the EPA before development begins.

of VanHook's

goals as the executive director has been to communicate with the general public as well as businesses and industry across the region, he says. "Everyone will benefit if we are able to greatly increase the RCIDA visibility and awareness," he said. "Part of my job is to be a resource for business and industry throughout Rockcastle County and the region. We need to increase awareness and the RCIDA following throughout the community and let everyone know what we are trying to do. If we are all on the same page, and working to support each other, our county's economic development will grow exponentially."







ing? We live what we believe.



6 ounces bacon, chopped
8 ounces Mexican
chorizo or hot dogs,
chopped
1/2 cup chopped white

onion

1 to 2 green chili peppers

seeded, finely chopped
8 ounces cored and
chopped ripe tomatoes
5 cups cooked pinto
beans or canned beans
1 cup water

Salt, to taste. Cook bacon in large skillet over medium-high heat until it is lightly browned and starting to crisp, 3 to 4 minutes. Add chorizo and cook, using a wooden spoon or spatula to break chorizo into smaller pieces; cook for 4 to 5 minutes until brown and crisp. Add onion and chilies mix well, and cook until they soften, 2 to 3 minutes. Add tomatoes and continue cooking for 4 to 5 minutes more, stirring occasionally, until they are thoroughly softened. Add beans and water, stir well, reduce heat to medium. Cook until the beans are moist but not very soupy, 8 to 10 minutes. Taste; salt if necessary.

Yards to Paradise

By Max Phelps Keeping Abreast of Landscaping Trends

Sometimes it is good to take a pause and look at things currently happening (or not happening) in landscaping. In this column let's look at some of the ideas I think worthy of mention—and in future columns some of these ideas will be getting their own complete story.

Homeowners are making maximum use of their space, and personalizing it. Folks are staying put in their existing home at this time, except for some that are relocating for job or for retirement purposes. And instead of concentrating on things that add the most value to the price or that help a home sell faster, owners instead are making their space fit their needs as well as their personalities. Higher interest rates have curbed home buying; folks are making their present home more livable.

Bold materials, and bold colors (for 2023 the 'color of the year' is "Viva Magenta"), are trendy. Steel, stone, fire, water, black and grey, eco-friendly and low-maintenance are in demand.

According to plant giant Monrovia, raised beds and gardening in pots is being replaced with mixing ornamentals and edibles among the trees and shrubs in the overall landscape.

It's trendy to have larger plants indoors—and more of them. Also bringing the lawn and patio furniture to an indoor location is increasingly a thing.

Taking the indoors outside is still popular though. The kitchen, the fireplace, the eating table or seating around a firepit have definitely not gone out of style.

Building cost so much more to put up than they used to. So, prefabricated sheds have grown in popularity both due to competitive pricing and to many custom options and purposes. It's not just garden tool sheds and gazebos. Could be a garage for the car or ATV. Could be a greenhouse/potting shed. Could be a 'tiny home' or guest cottage. Instant gratification in this area is growing.

Defining space. Walls, partitions, bed edging, small personal patios or outdoor rooms-these are things in demand. Yet, the formal garden with it's immaculate patterns and plants is not popular with the new homeowner these days. So, cottage gardens that require less organization or maintenance are gaining in that space. Especially if they are 'bee friendly' and such.

Built in seating, such as a bench or flat rock built into a retaining wall or against the house, large stones to sit on—in other words, going to a big box store and bringing in the ready to set up table, umbrella and chairs is encountering a new customer looking elsewhere for unique and often more affordable options.

Native plantings, and water-wise plantings are in demand. And 'no maintenance' is also asked for. (Though most anything does require a bit of attention...even

paver patios or green Astroturf.)

And in closing, a blank slate may not be in your best interest in landscaping a new home. You might wish to avoid a new builder-landscaped spec home in a development with a Homeowners Association. You may find your dream landscaping ideas running up against a committee of HOA


members that give you a hard time with permitting your choices. In these situations, buy a home that has a landscape that is acceptable for your requirement. Somebody else has already been through the hoops of design approvals and all of that. At least inquire if there is such a HOA before you buy. In some communities, regulations

can be strict, and violations expensive. Sometimes shopping for the home that's already the way you want it is worth some extra looking and negotiating.

A list of trendy landscaping cues and tips could be much longer, for sure. Let me just leave you with this thought, expect some sticker shock if you're not purchased a home or made improvements to one in awhile. Inflation is more real than the paltry 6 or 8 percent the government touts. This information can be encouraging to some...the ones that decide to do some new landscaping "before prices go even higher".
