Three indictments were handed down by a Rockcastle County Grand Jury on Friday, May 26.

Tabitha Marie Tompkin, 27, of Brodhead, was indicted on one count of criminal abuse of a minor.

According to the indictment, a grand jury charged that in April. Tompkin committed the offense of criminal abuse in the second degree by wantonly abusing a person less than 12 years old. causing serious physical injury and placing the

minor in a situation that may cause serious physical injury or cause torture, cruel confinement or cruel punishment.

According to the indictment, Tompkin's bail was set at \$10,000 cash or property.

Williams Robert Stanley, 41. of Emmalena, Kentucky, was indicted on May 26 of 2023, on one count of theft by unlawful taking.

According to the indictment, on or about December of 2022 in Rockcastle County,

Local writer publishes first book on flowers



The citation said the minor had been admitted earlier that night for seizures.

> The citation continues to say that upon arrival at the scene, a social worker was present and tests were shown to the officer indicating the child had tested positive for amphetamines.

The officer said the parents claimed to be unaware of how the child would have come in contact with the drug. However, according to the citation, Tompkins then tested positive for methamphetamine and marijuana in a drug test. Another child belonging to Tompkins tested nega-

Call None "Father"

The Catholic church has a multitude of religious titles to address their officials.

When Catholics address their priests and bishops as "Rev erend and Father", they are using titles which belong only to God. Protestants who likewise label their clergymen as "Reverend" are doing the very same thing. The term "Reverend" means basically worthy of reverence, revered, and is used in the Bible "to revere, respect, to regard the name of God' (Psalms 111:9) He sent redemption to his people: he hath commanded his covenant forever: holy and reverend is his name. God alone is to be reverenced, revered and worshipped. (Matt.4:10) Then saith Jesus unto him, Get thee hence, Satan: for it is written, THOU SHALT WORSHIP THE LORD THY GOD, AND HIM ONLY SHALT THOU SERVE. Men ought not seek the glory that belongs only to God. They should not accept it nor endeavor to give it. Men commit a grave error when they take the titles and designations which belong to Almighty God and place them on mere men.

(Matt.23:9-10) And call no man your father upon the earth: for one is your Father, which is in heaven. Neither be ye called masters: for one is your Master, even Christ. Thus, we are forbidden to call men "father" in a religious sense. We cannot openly defy this command and still please our 'Father" who art in heaven.

In the religious world some say that we have "interpreted" these words literally. However, in the context of Matthew 23, Jesus is condemning the religious leaders of his time (vs 5) who did all their works to be seen of men, (vs 6) loved the marks of distinction (vs 7) craved the flattering titles given by men. The writer of Hebrews used the term 'father' for our earthly parent. (Heb.12:9) Furthermore we have had fathers of our flesh which corrected us, and we gave them reverence: shall we not much rather be in subjection unto the Father of spirits, and live? In view of the scriptures, when Jesus said, "call no one father in a religious sense on this earth", he doesn't mix words. No man deserves that tile but "THE HOLY ONE".

All preachers and teachers of God's word should boldly refuse to be called by titles belonging to God. They should not be desirous of vain glory (Gal.5:26), but should walk humbly before God (Micah 6:8) We should not address any preacher with the name Father or Reverend or any other flattering titles. (Job 32:21-22) Let me not, I pray you, accept any man's person, neither let me give flattering titles unto men. For I know not to give flattering titles; in so doing my maker would soon take me away.





Donate Life Kentucky supports living donor employees

The Donate Life Kentucky leadership, which encompasses two nonprofit organizations, Kentucky Organ Donor Affiliates (KODA) and Trust For Life (Trust), are proud to announce they have joined the Living Donor Circle of Excellence. This program is an initiative from the American Society of Transplantation (AST) with support from strategic partner the National Kidney Foundation (NKF). It celebrates employers who implement internal policies that provide salary support to their employees who choose to be living organ donors.

"Our employees are already dedicated to ending the wait for those on the national transplant waiting list. We educate our state on the importance of organ donation and how living donors can make such a difference," said Shelley Snyder, Executive Director of Donate Life Kentucky. "It only makes sense that we would provide financial support to those very employees should they choose to be living donors themselves. It truly is an honor for us to join the Living Donor Circle of Excellence."

Since the new policy has been implemented, Donate Life Kentucky has already had an employee step up to use the benefits and save the life of someone else. Jessie Nutgrass, a KODA Donor Center Supervisor, became the first person in the organization to use the program when she became a living donor this spring. Nutgrass and her recipient - a father, grandfather and family friend - had their surgeries performed at UK Healthcare's Transplant Center, and both are doing well post-surgery.

John Gill, MD, Founder of the Living Donor Circle of Excellence, said, "Living donors are heroes amongst us; their gift is life-saving for patients in need of a kidney or liver transplant and has a huge positive impact on society. Patients facing lifethreatening diseases are able to live normal lives, raise their families, and participate in their communities. By supporting living organ donors, we are also building stronger communities."

Today, more than 100,000 patients are waiting for a life-saving kidney or liver transplant. Of the transplants performed in 2021, living donors accounted for 24% of kidney transplants and 6% of liver transplants. Financial disincentives are a barrier for many potential living organ donors. Living organ donation typically includes a four to six-week recovery period, and many will use their vacation time or take unpaid absences during this pe-

"Every day, people die on the waitlist," said Kevin Longino, Chief Executive Officer of the National Kidney Foundation and a kidney transplant recipient. "We need to rip down every possible barrier to becoming a living donor. Members of The Circle are doing just that by supporting those willing to help others struggling with a lifethreatening illness and helping to reduce any financial burden from living donation."

Kentucky American Water is proposing to reset the QIP surcharge to zero and incorporate the investment costs into base rates. The average monthly bills shown in this notice include the QIP surcharge in the current average bills and a \$0 amount for the QIP surcharge in the proposed average bills.

Kentucky American Water is also proposing modifications to its QIP and is requesting: a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity ("CPCN") to deploy Advanced Metering Infrastructure ("AMI"); addition of an AMI opt-out fee in the amount of \$28.00; an alternative level of reasonable unaccounted-for water loss under 807 KAR 5:066, Section 6(3); approval of a Universal Affordability Program; and certain regulatory and accounting treatments for Production Costs, Pension and Other Post-Employment Benefits, and Tax Expenses (excluding Sales Tax). Modifications to the QIP surcharge tariff would be applied to Residential, Commercial, Industrial, Other Public Authority, Sale for Resale, Public and Private Fire Service classifications for qualified infrastructure investments. The QIP surcharge would be calculated annually based on forecasted qualified infrastructure costs and applied to each customer's monthly bill. The QIP surcharge would then be updated annually until the next rate case, at which time the investment costs would be incorporated into base rates and the surcharge reset to zero. The AMI opt-out fee tariff would apply to all customers electing to opt-out costs, including meter reading costs. The Universal Affordability Program would reduce the 5/8" meter monthly service charge by \$12.00 and the consumption charges rate by \$4.69494 per 1,000 gallons (\$0.469494 per 100 gallons) for qualified Residential customers with household incomes at zero to 50-percent of the federal poverty level and would reduce the 5/8" meter monthly service charge by \$4.00 and the consumption charges rate by \$1.56498 per 1,000 gallons (\$0.156498 per 100 gallons) for qualified Residential customers with household incomes at 50-percent to 100-percent of the federal poverty level. Kentucky American Water is proposing to revise the definition of "current estimated cost" of main extensions in new subdivisions by utilizing current material costs and bids received instead of the preceding year's costs. 

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
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Mamaw's Kitchen

HAM AND CHEESE DIP 8 slices smoked ham, finely chopped

finely chopped 1 block (8 ounce) cream cheese, softened

1 cup shredded cheddar cheese

1 cup shredded Swiss cheese

1 pinch cayenne pepper 2 tablespoons freshly chopped parsley

Mini toasts, crackers, or freshly sliced bread, for serving

Preheat oven to 350°. Combine the ham, cream cheese, 3/4 cup each of the Swiss and cheddar cheeses, and the pinch of cayenne in a glass bowl. Microwave for about 45 seconds to soften the cheeses. Mix until smooth and transfer to a shallow baking dish. Sprinkle the remaining cheese over the

dip.
Place in the oven and bake for 10 minutes. Switch the oven to broil and cook 2-5 minutes longer, or until the cheese is browned and bubbly. Garnish with parsley and serve with toasts, crackers, or bread.

NACHO CHEESE BALL 2 boxes (8 ounces each) cream cheese, softened 1/3 cup salsa
2 tablespoons chopped
parsley or cilantro

parsley or cilantro 2 to 3 tablespoons chili powder

2 tablespoons lemon juice 2 cups Mexican Blend shredded cheeses

2 cups sharp Cheddar, shredded

Mix all ingredients. Let chill for 3 hours. Roll into a ball or mold into desired shape and place on large serving platter. Pour some salsa around the cheese mixture and serve with tortilla chips. OR place cheese ball in a premade large taco salad tortilla bowl. Drizzle with salsa. OR make into bite size appetizers by placing a teaspoon of cheese mixture on a tortilla. Put a small amount of salsa on each and serve.

8 ounces cream cheese, room temperature

1/3 cup granulated sugar Pinch of salt 8 ounces (1 small tub)

Cool Whip
About 3/4 cup strawberry
pie filling, divided


