Man escapes burning truck on W. Main St.

A local resident survived a harrowing escape at the last moment last Friday

morning when his truck exploded into flames while driving west down East Main Street in Mount Vernon. The large flames shooting

from under the hood, under the front bumper and around the front tires, of the Dodge Pickup truck disabled the brakes making it impos-

sible to stop the vehicle, as it burned according to investigators.

The quick-thinking of Rockcastle County's Ronnie McKinney, who was driving the truck, may have saved him from serious injury, officials say.

Once he spotted the flames and realized the brakes were not working, McKinney began searching for an inclined area to stop the vehicle and get away from the flames that were burning near the cab of the truck.

Fortunately, at that moment, Mount Vernon Fire Chief David Bales was headed east on East Main and passed the truck with flames shooting out. Bales' truck is equipped with a dash camera that provided a video of the truck on fire as it passed his vehicle. Bales immediately turned around and chased the burning truck until he saw the driver find the inclined area on West Main. Once the vehicle stopped, the driver leaped out as the flames were reaching inside the truck.



Yards to Paradise

By Max Phelps Selecting New Trees, Maintaining Existing Trees

It's not unusual to buy a new home with no trees, as it's quite rare for real estate developers to save good quality trees and build around them in a development. Perhaps if you owned the lot and hired your builder, you got to do it more to your liking. And many a homeowner buys a place with more mature trees that have been planted by a former owner, and wonders if they should be kept and how would they know how to care for them.

Let's take a moment to look at these situations and see if we can come away with more confidence in selecting and maintaining trees in our landscapes.

If you have the luxury of having a wooded property that you plan to build a home on, you have choices to make. Which trees will need to go, and which can stay? There is not one perfect answer, of course. (Just don't do like

a neighbor of mine who cleared a tract and removed a native, naturaloccurring pink dogwood that would have been 20 feet from the spot he chose for building. That was a bad selection of what needed to go or



For those with a house having few or no trees, you have the luxury of choosing what you would like. What are your favorite trees? Will they look good with this home? And will they grow well under the conditions that are present? It is still not as simple as going shopping for the trees you happen to like and planting them.

Right tree, right spot. That is a good rule to follow. If your yard has bedrock or compacted clay soil just under the surface, will the tree you prefer do well in that spot? If the spot you need a tree stays wet all the time, do you go ahead and plant a tree that needs good drainage? Does your favorite tree need some shade; and if so, do you plan to put it in the front yard in full sun? Sometimes you need to

> think natives, or at least think what would do best in my spot-not go with the tree with pretty blooms or because you had one where you lived as a child.

When selecting trees, consider the various pros and cons, and be willing to consider trees you'd not thought of or haven't seen in other people's yards. Let your spot, including location and soil and mature size help choose what would work well. Try to avoid impulse decisions, and get professional advice if you need to.

The homeowner who wants a lovely dogwood might ought to consider putting it on the shady

side of the home away from midday sun. The one who wants an oak tree might want to consider the acorns, the roots, and how much space it will take up 40 years from now. The folks who live by a busy street that gets treated by salt trucks several times every winter when it snows might ought to ask the nursery some questions, such as "what is the salt tolerance of this plant" if they want to plant it near the street, or where highway runoff will be flowing across their property.

As real estate changes hands, so do the trees and other amenities. Often a new homeowner will have no idea if a tree is healthy, if it presents a hazard in a windstorm, or should they accept and love it even if not one of their favorites.

Ouickly, some trees with disease or fungus issues that perhaps you should avoid, would include: Ash trees, walnut trees, native dogwoods, hemlocks, to name a few. But what if you have these trees and they are healthy?

Usually I would ad-

first sign of trouble. But, if you have badly diseased trees, prompt removal may be the bestwith selection of something different and tough and disease resistant. Problem soils, wet or rocky or dry locations,

are all problems that can probably be solved with some good soil trucked in and plant in that. erized trees, even little ones dug from the forest or fallow field often per-

Smaller trees, containform better than balled and burlapped large trees.

Unless you're the impatient type, or have a terminal illness and want to enjoy trees right away, planting smaller sizes will be way cheaper, and within 5 or 10 years will probably catch and pass the growth of the bigger trees.

Landscapers and nurserymen may try to sell you on the instant gratification. In practice, if a customer has me designing a landscape on a fairly small budget. I will often recommend one big, pretty tree, plus several much smaller ones. That way they get one lovely

Still time to respond to the 2022 Census of Agriculture

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) is reminding Kentucky farmers that the window is closing on the opportunity to participate in the 2022 Census of Agriculture. To date, NASS has received over 52,000 completed questionnaires from Kentucky producers for a return rate of almost 48%. NASS is encouraging producers who have not returned their completed ag census ques- product in 2022, or nor- policymakers, trade asso- for a complete picture of

"Thank you to those who have returned their questionnaire, we appreciate your response. If you haven't completed your Census, there is still time," said director of the NASS Eastern Mountain Regional Office in Kentucky. "By responding, you are helping your county publish reliable statistical data. The more responses received the better the data quality."

NASS is reminding producers that if they produced and sold \$1,000 or more of agricultural tionnaires to do so as soon mally would have pro-ciations, researchers, the health of the industry.

duced and sold that much, they meet USDA's definition of a farm. However, federal law requires everyone who received the 2022 Census of Agriculture questionnaire complete and return it, even if they do not currently meet this definition.

"If you received the ag census but do not fit the definition of a farm, are no longer farming, never farmed, or are a landowner who leases your land to a producer, please write your status on the form and mail it back," said Knopf.

The Census of Agriculture remains the only comprehensive and impartial source of agriculture data for every state and county in the nation. Census data are used by

agribusinesses, educators, and many others. The information helps inform decisions on farm policy, rural development, the development of farm technologies, and more. It also aids in the creation and funding of loans and insurance programs and other forms of assistance.

The ag census differs from other NASS surveys. Beyond being conducted just once every five years, it provides important demographic information and data on certain commodities, such as horses, bison, and Christmas trees, that would not otherwise be available. The Census of Agriculture collects information on nearly every aspect of agriculture




RCHS **Music Department** receives high marks in Nashville

Mamaw's Kitchen

BUTTERSCOTCH CAKE WITH CARA **MELICING**

- 2 cups brown sugar 1/2 cup butter 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 2 eggs
- 2 cups flour
- 1 teaspoon baking soda 1 teaspoon baking pow-
- 1/2 teaspoon salt 1 cup buttermilk Preheat oven to 350°.

Grease and flour (or line with parchment) two 9" or three 6" round pans.

Cream the butter and 1/4 cup milk sugar with an electric mixer on medium until fluffy. Add vanilla, then add eggs one at a time, beating on low just until they are mixed in. In a separate bowl, sift together the flour, baking soda, baking powder and salt. Starting with the flour mixture, add the flour and the buttermilk and add in the vanilla and

(alternating one then the other) into the sugar/egg mixture on low speed. When everything is mixed in, scrape down the bowl by hand. Pour batter into the pans and bake for 25-30 minutes, until a toothpick inserted in the middle comes out clean. Cool before frosting.

CARAMEL ICING: 1 and 1/2 cups brown

1 tablespoon flour 1/4 cup butter (plus 2 tablespoons for later)

1 teaspoon vanilla


In a small saucepan, mix all ingredients except the vanilla and the extra 2 tablespoons of butter. Heat over medium and bring to a boil. Stirring frequently to prevent burning, let the mixture boil for a good one minute. Take off the fire

the 2 tablespoons butter. Cool the mixture, occasionally giving it a vigorous stir, until it is still warm (but not HOT) and has thickened enough to spread. Spread it over the cake, moving quickly because it will set as it cools. It will be a thin coating, not a thick layer. Let it set completely before cutting into the cake.

BUTTERSCOTCH PUDDING

- 1 cup packed brown sugar 4 tablespoons flour
- 2 eggs 2 cups milk
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 4 tablespoons butter or margarine

Mix brown sugar and flour. Stir in eggs until combined. Stirring constantly, slowly pour milk into egg and sugar mixture. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until mixture starts to bubble and thicken. Don't turn up the heat to make this happen sooner! After it thickens, remove from heatand stir in vanilla and butter. Stir until butter has melted. Pour into serving bowl or individual cups.
