Those near a district line, may change districts

Some citizens of Rockcastle County may find themselves in a different magisterial district in the coming months.

Members of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court held a special called meeting Monday to deal with the reapportionment requirements, after the 2020 Census determined that the county population had deceased by more than 1,000 citi-

Kentucky law re-

quires each district in all counties to contain within 10% the same number of citizens. After the 2020 Census, Rockcastle County Judge/Executive Howell Holbrook, Jr., was notified that three of the districts in Rockcastle County had changed population in such a manner that district lines must be moved in order to maintain the equal bal-

According to Census data, district 2 (William) Denny) needs 129 more citizens, district 4 (Shane Thacker) needs 57 more citizens and district 5 (Mike McGuire) has 63

Race to November underway Rockcastle beats state turnout by nearly 5 percent

Unlike the past election, there was no doubt who was favored in the May 2023 Prima-

ries last Tuesday. While the previous election saw candidates win by two and three votes, this election was much easier to call, according to officials, since most races were won by huge margins.

Rockcastle County

voters were on the winning sides during the May Primaries as all but one candidate that won in the state, also won in Rockcastle County.

The new system of four voting locations proved to be accepted overall by voters, according to Rockcastle County Clerk Danetta Ford Allen. "It was a rather quiet election," she said. "The system worked well and people seem to like the flexibility and convenience of early voting and voting centers."

In the state, 500,902 voters cast their ballot for a 14.4% turnout.

There are 3,468,537 registered voters in Kentucky. Rockcastle County did much better with a 19.12% voter turnout with 2,380 of the 12,441 registered voters,

casting their ballot. Of the 2,380 Rockcastle County residents who voted, just over 20% voted early

New business may be coming to City of Livingston soon

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court a thon are located. held a special called meeting Friday with 12 issues on the agenda.

One discussion focused on the sale of county-owned property in Livingston beside the Family Dollar Store. Judge/ Executive Howell Holbrook, Jr., said the \$1,000 sale price for the lot is the same price as the previous lots sold by the county where Family Dollar and Mara-

Officials could not make public the name of the company involved until the sale is complete. Holbrook said the company interested in the property also wishes to discuss using fill dirt from the county-owned 40 acres in Livingston. Holbrook said the company would provide all the equipment and labor to take

Beginning July 1

Sewer rate increase set at 6.5 percent

The City of Mount Vernon will be raising the cost on sewer bills beginning July, 2023.

According to the Mount Vernon Water Works, the rate is being increased by 6.5%, due to the Consumer Price Index that is set by the Department of Local Govern-

For those inside city limits, the first 2,000 gallons will increase from \$17.01 to \$18.12 and all over 2,000 gallons will increase by .45c from \$6.89 to \$7.34.

For those outside the city limits the first 2,000 gallons will rise from \$24.46 to \$26.05 and all over 2,000 gallons will rise from \$9.70 to \$10.33

The rate increase will cost consumers \$6.50 more for every \$100 on their bill.

Josh Bray, City Consultant, said the increase will not provide the city with more funds since the increase is tied to the consumer price index. Bray said that rather than provide more funds, the hike keeps the city from losing funds. "The increased cost wont generate extra funds," said Bray. "It is designed to go up as expenses go up based on the consumer price index."

Now, in 2020, according to Google, there were 154.6M registered voters in this nation. So, that year, there was an historic turnout of 155,502,000 or 902,000 more voters than were registered or, another way to look at it, OVER 100% turn-

We also checked the Census site, for registered voters in 2020, and their number was the exact same Google that 154,600,000.

It is beyond comprehen-

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sion why this was not the catalyst for a complete redo of the election, with much more stringent rules for voting than were employed in the first one.

Democrats on Twitter like to bring up that Hillary Clinton won the popular vote (by 5,500) in 2016 but still lost the election. Well. too bad. Our founders knew exactly what they were doing when they put the Electoral College into effect to keep 'flyover states' vote meaningful and not letting our two biggest states (by population) in the country decide every national election. Biden only took 527 counties in the 2020 election and Trump won 2,586, But, counties are not created equal you see. Kalawao Co. in Hawaii has 88 people and LA County in California has more than 10 million and with the new mail-in ballot system instituted by many blue states, because of "COVID", Democrats had no trouble taking LA County, and the state of California big.

Aces Over

In 1968, it was a-big deal when we found out we were going on a truck

It was typically a Sunday after church. We vounger fellows would run to the truck as soon as church was over and climb into the bed getting mad at the adults because they wouldn't stop chatting.

Dad was the talker in the family and used to tell stories to guys that gathered around in the front vard after church. So when it was a free day, with no specific plans other than a truck ride, he would start telling some story and church men would gather around and listen for an hour at a time.

The scene is still burned into my memory like a video game onto a computer screen. Dad stood just over 6 feet tall and was always a thinner man. Not skinny, but no fat anywhere on him. He was a worker and a tough one at that. His skin was darker because he worked out in the sun every day and had a red cast to it partly because of his Indian heritage. He always kept his hair slicked back and used some orange stuff they called "Butch" to keep it in place. He had on his Sunday best and as bragging as it may sound, he had a definite "James Dean" look about him with deep-set sky blue

Sitting on the tailgate of the truck in the gravel parking lot of Viney Fork Church, waiting for him to move past the crowd that had gathered to hear his latest tale, I sat in patience. He stood with one leg kicked out slightly and one hand in a pocket with the other controlling the cigarette hanging from his lips and helping him describe his story. He had pearl white teeth and a big smile but his lip curled slightly more on his right side when he laughed.

Children were playing and running around the adults as seven or eight men were gathered around my dad and they were almost always laughing or saying "goodbye" to those who were walking towards their car with their Bible in hand.

We had blankets and pillows gathered up in the back of the truck so that we would be more comfortable on the ride and when we saw dad's audience breaking up, we began gathering them into our favorite spot to ride. We always had one of those 99-cent styrofoam coolers with Pepsi on ice and mom had a basket filled with bologna, mustard, bread, lettuce and some kind of potato chips. More often than not, there was also some pork and beans hidden in mom's arsenal.

I never knew where we would be going but the wind on our face and our tangled hair were our only thoughts. Troubles were nowhere to be found. I would watch the road go by over the tailgate and drop little rocks or sticks out of the bed of the truck to watch them roll behind us.

We had a game we played throwing small rocks directly backwards as the truck was moving. If you threw it exactly the same speed that the truck was traveling, the rock would fall to the ground and not roll just as if you were standing still and dropped it straight down. If you threw it faster than the truck was traveling it. would roll backwards and of course slower meant the rock would follow the truck until it stopped rolling. The goal was to

of living memorial... a way to give back to the community in the spirit of the things that "Doc" represented.

I finally came up with a program and at the center of it was a scholarship to give to one of the graduating seniors at RCHS that would be going into an animal related field and had the similar values as "Doc".

Through Livingston Community Lions Club and a lot of effort on the part of several individuals all working together, there was a potluck meal and an auction held. Last week we gave the first Dr. James S. Chism Scholarship to Kaitlyn Burgin who also got a scholarship to Eastern Kentucky University and then plans to attend Auburn to graduate as a veterinarian. She plans to come back to Mount Vernon to begin her practice. There probably will be a memorial/meditation garden to begin in the near future, as well as scholarships on a yearly basis.

I don't think that I have ever been as pleased to have a dream come to fruition as this one has.



I got to ride in the back




what life was like in 1968, but for me, it was the absolute best of all times







the fill from the 40-acre lot and move it to the 1.6 acre lot.

RCIDA Executive Director Jeff VanHook said the county would need to draft a contract with specifications concerning how the company would take fill from the lot in question. "We shouldn't just tell them to take what they need," he said. "We should specify what trees they will remove and the clean-up procedures and what condition they will leave the land in when they are finished."

Holbrook agreed saying the court can discuss a price per load of fill dirt or consider providing the fill, without charge, since it will facilitate another potential business in the City of Livingston and the county.

While discussing selling the fill material, VanHook told the court they may consider providing the fill for free since the work could provide a "nicer, larger, flatter area for future use" on the 40-acre property if "the contract is handled properly."

The court agreed to further investigate the matter.

Holbrook also asked the court their wishes concerning the Town and Country property for sale. "It is up to the court," he said. "Whatever you want to do, we will do, but we Democrats.

need to let them know something." After some discussion of pricing, removal of the fuel tanks and soil testing through the EPA, as well as potential future use, the court decided not to pur-

sue the purchase. The court also held a first reading of the budget. The draft budget was presented earlier to the court and Holbrook said there were no changes to the draft budget that had been approved earlier. The budget was approved unanimously.

The court was then presented with a budget amendment. However, this amendment simply moved funds inside the budget and did not change any overall totals since the expenditures and revenues each equal \$914,515, according to Holbrook. The amendment also passed unanimously.

Having no further business, the court adjourned.

(Continued from front) before Election Day. Slightly over 400 voted early with no excuse while 74 mailed in their ballot. Including all methods of early voting, nearly 500 voters cast their ballot before Elec-

tion Day. Of the 2,380 voters, 1,890 of them were registered Republicans and 186 were registered

In the Republican race for Governor, Kentucky Attorney General Daniel Cameron, running against 11 opponents, won statewide by more than doubling the votes of his nearest competitor Ryan Quarles. Cameron had received Donald Trump's endorsement. In fact, Cameron received more votes than his two nearest competitors combined, getting 122,854 votes to Quarles' 56,200. Kelly Craft, who was endorsed by Florida Governor Ron DeSantis, and who spent about \$9 million of her own money, according to reports, received 45,108 statewide.

Cameron dominated in Rockcastle County as well receiving 1,051 votes while Quarles received 458. Kraft received 439.

However, Cameron did not win every precinct in the county. Quarles won the Wildie and the

Climax precinct. In the Democrat race for Governor, incumbent Andy Beshear won his bid, running against only two opponents, by a massive margin. Beshear received 151,579 votes statewide while his nearest opponent Geoffrey M. Young, received 8,634.

In Rockcastle County, Beshear won with 171 votes while Young received 8 votes.

Cameron will face Beshear in the race for Governor of Kentucky in the General Election on

Tuesday, November 7.

In the Republican Primary for Secretary of State, Michael Adams won with 146,335 votes with Stephen Knipper receiving only 62,239. Again, well over double the votes of his nearest opponent. In Rockcastle County, Adams won 1.362 to 421 over Knipper. Adams won every Rockcastle precinct.

In the race for Auditor of Public Accounts, Republican Allison Ball more than doubled her opponent Derek Pettey's 162,979 to 63,117 state wide, and won in Rockcastle County 1,402

to 526. In the race for Kentucky State Treasurer. Republican Mark H. Metcalf nearly doubled his opponent, Andrew Copperrider state wide with 116,197 to 66,603. Metcalf also won big in Rockcastle County with 1,379 votes Copperrider's 412.

In a slightly closer

race, Democrat candidate for Commissioner of Agriculture, Serra J. Enlow beat Mikael Malone 87,855 to 62,961. This race was also close in Rockcastle County with Malone winning 86 to 84 and is the only race that ended statewide differently than Rockcastle County results.

In the Republican race for Commissioner of Agriculture, Jonathan Shell won over Richard Heath 148,139 to 114,258 statewide. Shell dominated in Rockcastle County 1,629 to 494.

Of the 15 precincts in

Rockcastle County, the most voters turned out in the north Brodhead precinct with 320 voters casting their ballot.

Allen said she is pleased with the election process and is already preparing for the next election. "I am thankful to have precinct workers who have adapted well to the changes (post-COVID) and work so hard for things to go smoothly," said Allen.

Beshear and Cameron are now beginning their campaigns for the November elections for Governor of Kentucky.



Memorial Day Message The arrival of Memorial Day has come to feel like the start of summer, especially with so many students' school years

ending across the commonwealth. During the holiday weekend, families across our state will begin their yearly traditions and the memorymaking we all enjoy.

These moments with family and friends would not be possible without the sacrifices of many who laid down their lives to bless ours. Properly honoring the memory of fallen service members demands a celebration with a heart of gratitude and a deliberate effort to educate our children on the significance of Memorial Day.

How fortunate are we to live as United States citizens and residents of our great state? As is evident in thousands having just cast ballots in the state's primary election,

no other country boasts the freedoms and privileges we enjoy in America, a country founded on religious liberty and the pursuit of happiness, no matter how one may define it.

Protecting those freedoms requires a military force like none other. Memorial Day was established to honor those who perished in the Civil War, which claimed more lives than any conflict in our nation's history. In the late 1860s, Americans began holding springtime tributes to fallen soldiers, decorating graves, and praying together. These memorial activities became a tradition.

I ask you to join me in memorializing the brave servicemen and women who lost their lives in the line of duty. Tragically, we experienced a great loss here in Kentucky earlier this year. Nine soldiers died in a March 29 crash when two Black Hawk helicopters crashed. While

too many citizens. The fiscal court is required to appoint a Reapportionment Committee. as set forth by KRS 67.090, to redraw district lines in the county to make the districts more equal.

Holbrook said County Clerk Danetta Ford Allen presented the required three committee member nominees in Janet Vaughn, Kim Renner and Brian Bussell. The three citizens have been contacted and have agreed to serve on the committee and design the new districts to be presented to the fiscal court for approval. All three candidates were approved unanimously by the court and will now begin the arduous task of adjusting district lines as needed.

Holbrook said the goal will be to have each district within 5% of the same population though only 10% is required by statute.

"This is something that we can't argue or disagree with," Holbrook. "This is required by the state of Kentucky and there is no option for counties except to adjust the districts as needed."

The committee will have 60 days to present the changes to the court and the court will have 60 days to approve the changes.

Holbrook said the task is much easier than it has been in previous redistricting efforts, since the system is now computer operated. "They used to have to sit with pencil and paper and draw maps and count citizens one by one," he said. "But now they pretty much use computer software that helps them move district lines while keeping similar populations in each district. It isn't like it used to be."

According to the Census, district 1 (Lee Earl Adaqms) has 3,335 residents, district 2 has 2,918, district 3 (Doug Prewitt) has 3,353, district 4 has 2,990 and district 5 has 3,431 residents.

The last time the districts were changed (about ten years ago) an extra voting precinct was added to make 15 precincts in the county.

Holbrook said there are also school districts to consider but officials say the goal is to complete this process without the need to deal with school district changes.

As for the magisterial districts, Holbrook said roadways are typically used for the district lines. "We try to avoid having a district line dividing two districts going through a field," he said. "We try to use roads as the lines. It makes thing much easier for everyone. Sometimes that won't work, but that is the goal."

Once the new district lines are drawn and accepted by the court, the county plans to notify the public of any changes in district lines.







She is a dedicated teacher who is passionate about education and the academic success of all her students. Her motivation to open doors of opportunities for her students to learn about the history of their community, their government and their nation is an inspiration to all those she encounters, whether student or teacher. Her dedication to teaching students the importance of history and showing patriotism for one's country can be seen in her commitment to the annual Veterans Day program.

The Women in American History Award is given each year by DAR to acknowledge the outstanding contributions of women, especially those who have made a difference in our community.
