# Two men arrested for menacing two Brodhead women and their children

Two Brodhead men were served with arrest warrants last week after an ongoing investigation into physical and sexual threats against two local females and their minor children.

Joshua D. Bengé and John C. York, both of Brodhead, were each charged in two separate incidents.

A total of four criminal complaints were filed against the two men after alleged incidents in and around the Brodhead Baptist Church in July and August.

Two of the complaints (one for each man) says York and Bengé ap-

proached Betty Holt and her juvenile daughter with intent to harass, annoy or alarm another person with offensively coarse or abusive utterances, gestures or displays.

According to the complaints, Bengé had previously pleaded guilty to menacing and 4th degree assault of Holt's 13-year-old daughter and had received an order of no contact. However, Bengé and York allegedly approached Holt and her now 15 year-old daughter after they had left the church causing them to fear for their safety. The complaint also says Bengé rides a bicycle in front of their home regu-

larly causing them to fear going outside. The complaint also says Bengé has approached the juvenile on another day when she began to scream, drawing residents outside before Bengé left the scene.

In two other criminal complaints (one for each of the two who are reportedly related) the two men allegedly approached Brodhead resident Skylar Miller and her two young children on August 3 with intent to threaten physical harm or sexual assaults after they left the same church after evening services.

According to the complaint, the two men rode bicycles up to them and made threatening, sexual

innuendos causing fear in all three. The complaint says the two small children now have night-

mares from the encounter and that Miller planned to tell the two children to run

# Drone to help local Sheriff's Department

Rockcastle County Sheriff's Deputy Sam Brock has received another piece of equipment in his quest to provide quicker more accurate accident reconstruction.

The department received the new specialized drone last week that will accurately map an accident scene and help with the calculations involved in determining fault or cause.

According to Brock, the new high-tech drone can fly on its own over a specified area and provide detailed mapping, including elevations and obstacles.

The drone was made possible through donations from Sam's Club, WB Transport, ECO Tech, and Walmart distribution centers 8188, 1113, 692, DC6097, 825 and 1190.

Rockcastle County.

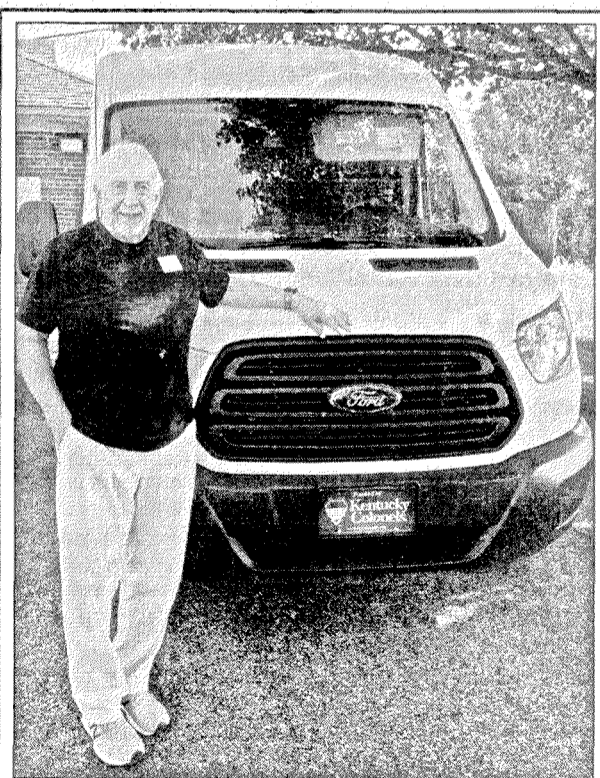
Lisa Cox, CEO at Hospice Care Plus, says the van is essential to caring for patients and families.

It is a rare service for hospices to provide, but it is a key way we can make things easier. It lets them focus on what is most important: being together comfortably at home, making the most of their time together. We are very grateful to HOKC and the E.O. Robinson Mountain Fund for supporting the program."

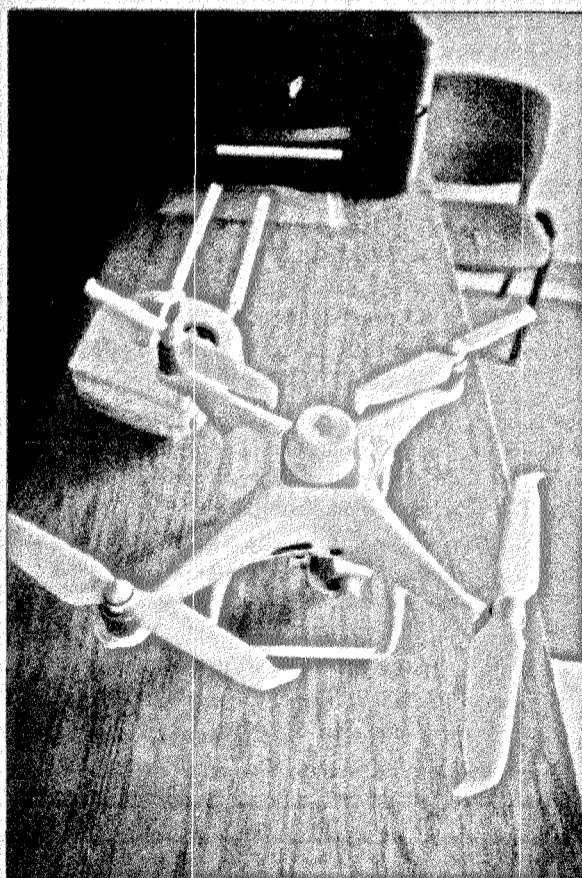
Cox said that, for newly admitted hospice patients, the van may carry as much as one hospital bed, oxygen equipment, bedside tables, walkers, wheelchairs and other pieces of equipment to help manage symptoms and support autonomy and quality of life.

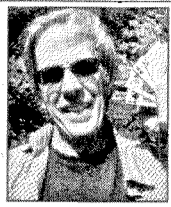
And, another thought on the "not really a vaccine subject." Pfizer is the 6th most owned stock by Congress. Surprised?

crowdads. Sometimes we would spot a swinging bridge and go play on that until an old farmer would run us off.

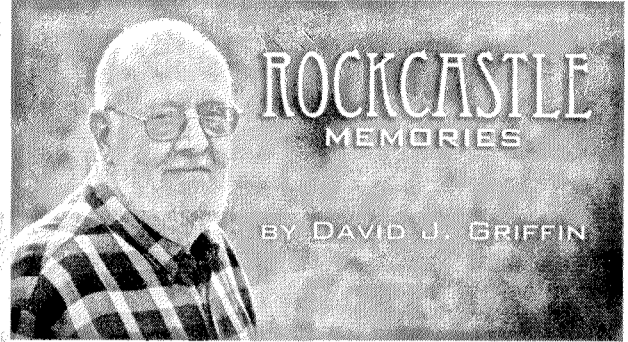

### Summer Employment

In the summer of 1968, I accepted a teaching and coaching position at Mt. Sterling High School. In those days, teachers were not paid for the summer months, so we had to secure employment for June, July, and part of August.

I inquired about a summer job and was told to check at A. O. Smith Electric Motors, here in Mt. Sterling. I applied immediately and was hired the same day. I was told to arrive the next day at 4:00 pm, which was the second shift lasting until midnight.

On the first day of my new job, I was assigned to work in the room where the "blast" furnace was located. That room could get up to 140 degrees Fahrenheit. At the end of the day, I was wringing wet and was exhausted. I decided to find something else for the summer.

That night, I went to my supervisor to resign, when he noticed that I had a college degree. He asked, "If I made an Inspector out of you, would you keep this job?" I had no idea what an inspector's duties were, so I told him I would give that position a shot.

The next day, I was placed at the end of a very long line of electric motors on a conveyor belt. As the motors came to me, I had to set each one on an electrical surge machine to see if any motors had a "short."

I was instructed to attach an electrical cord to each motor on the surge machine, remove my hands, and step on a button to surge electricity through the motor. If it was defective, the machine would indicate the problem.

The surge machine would literally knock you on your behind if you forgot to remove your hands before hitting the floor button. I did not forget to remove my hands for the entire summer. I was determined to do a good job as an inspector.

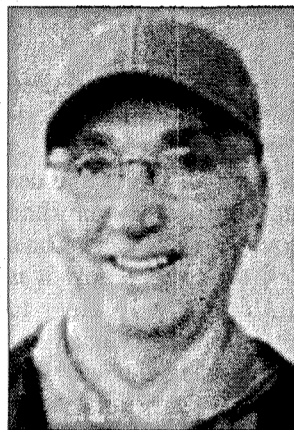

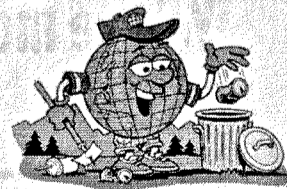

pervisor asked me to train another worker on the surge machine. In my training, I fully emphasized the need to be careful and to always remove your hands before applying electricity to the motors.

After approximately an hour of training, I was told to allow the new man to run the surge machine. I was told to observe the new guy and to take note of any mistakes he might make.

After about 30 minutes, I saw the surge operator receive an electrical shock that made him yell and fall back. I tried to show him his mistake, but he was already headed for the door. He declared, "They don't pay me enough money for this job!" as he walked out the door.

One other incident about this particular summer job comes to mind. On a certain day, I was

finding several motors which had "shorts" in them, and they had to be set aside on a palette to be re-worked.

After setting about ten motors onto the defective stack, a large and muscular man with a threatening menace strolled up to me and said, "If you set one more motor on that stack, I will come back and kick your butt!"

A bit rattled, I continued to do my job, which included finding several additional defective motors. That gentleman never did come back to see me. And I was greatly relieved.

This particular summer job taught me to love my teaching and coaching position even more. Eventually, the state of Kentucky made it possible to receive our salary on a monthly basis. And that was an even greater relief.

(2) He is described with personal characteristics such as speaking, tempting and lying. (3) The devil is one of several angels who sinned and were punished by God. (4) God has prepared an eternal place for Satan and his angels. (2 Peter 2:4) For if God spared not the angels that sinned, but cast them down to hell, and delivered them into chains of darkness, to be reserved unto judgment.

The Devil is evil and desires people to become evil like him. Further, Satan will be punished forever in hell, and he wants everyone to suffer the same punishment. The Scriptures view the devil as a roaring lion stalking his prey. (1Pet. 5:8) Be sober, be vigilant; because your adversary the devil, as a roaring lion, walketh about, seeking whom he may devour.

*Score two touchdowns in under a minute*  
**Rockets score in final seconds for 27-17 win over East Jessamine Jaguars**

Things looked a little shaky for the Rockcastle Rockets football, in their second outing of the season against the East Jessamine Jaguars, last Friday night. The Rockets were down 14-0 in the first half but mounted a comeback in the second half, for the 27-17 win.

It was all East Jessamine in the first half, with the Jaguars hitting paydirt twice in the second quarter to take a 14-0 lead to the locker room at halftime. But, the Jaguars, with the exception of a field goal early in the fourth quarter, were held in check by the Rocket defense for the entire second half.

The Rockets got on the scoreboard for the first time with 2:56 left in the third quarter on a six yard touchdown run by quarterback Caleb Moore with Benjamin Brenda

adding the PAT. The score was set up by a 31 yard run by senior Ethan Medley and it was 14-7 at the end of the third period.

The Jaguars kicked their field goal in the fourth quarter, at the 9:57 mark, to make it 17-7.

The Rockets struck back just two minutes later on an 18 yard pass from Moore to freshman Isaiah Jackson for the score and, with Brenda's PAT good, it was 17-14.

That score was set up by a 41 yard run by junior Christian Larkey.

Then, with 57 seconds left in the game, and following a 26 yard pass from Moore to Larkey, the Rockets took their first lead on a three yard touchdown run by Larkey. Brenda's PAT was good again, and it was 21-17 Rockets.

The Rockets then de-

ecided to go with an onside kick which was successfully recovered by senior Cam Prewitt and, with 37 seconds to go in the game, Moore broke free for a 47 yard touchdown run. Brenda's kick failed but the Rockets managed their second win of the season 27-17.

Offensively, the Rockets gained 269 yards on the ground to the Jaguars 17 and Moore threw for 118 yards to the Jaguar quarterback's 144.

Larkey led in rushing yardage with 150 on 30 carries, including one rushing touchdown; Moore got 72 yards on seven carries, scoring two rushing touchdowns and Medley picked up 47 yards on nine carries. Brenda was three for four in PATs.

Quarterback Caleb Moore was 11 for 15 in passing for 118 yards. Isaiah Jackson had eight receptions for 81 yards, including one touchdown; Larkey caught one pass for 26 yards and senior Kaden Kidwell got one reception for 12 yards.

Defensively, the Rockets were led by Anthony Goodin with four solo tackles, six tackle assists and four sacks. Cam Prewitt got two solo tackles and three assists and had three defensive sacks; Carter Powell was credited with three solo tackles and two assists; Larkey accounted for two solo tackles and one assist; MJ Farthing got one solo tackle, two assists and a defensive sack; Jackson got three solo tackles; Medley got a solo tackle, one assist and a defensive sack; Ethan Tyree was credited with two solo tackles; Jai Denny got one solo and one tackle assist and Jayce Bowles got one solo tackle.

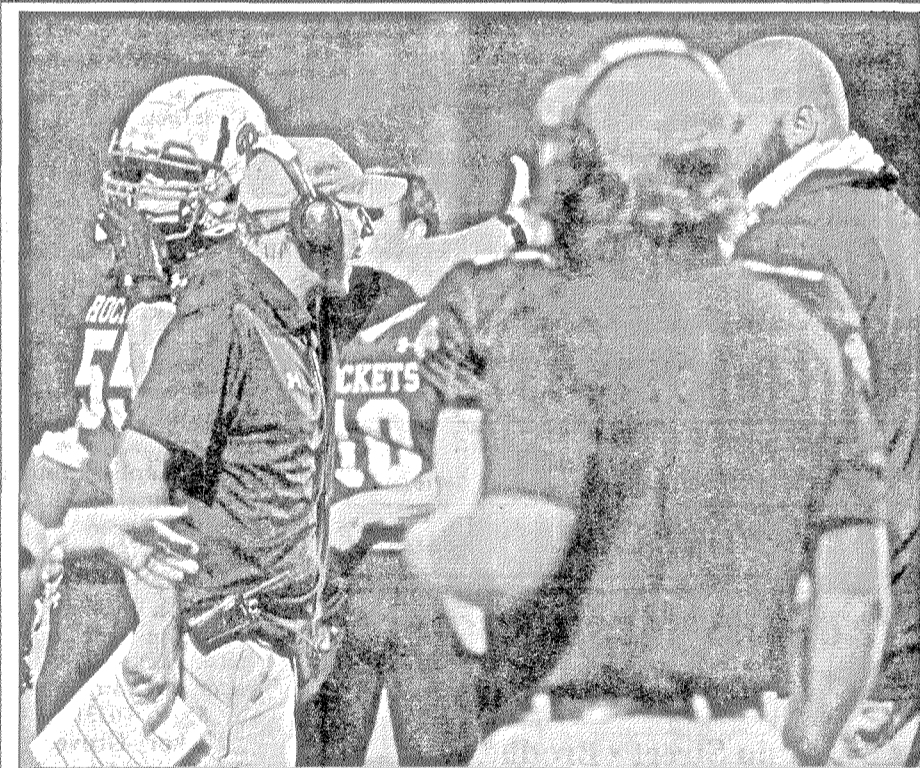

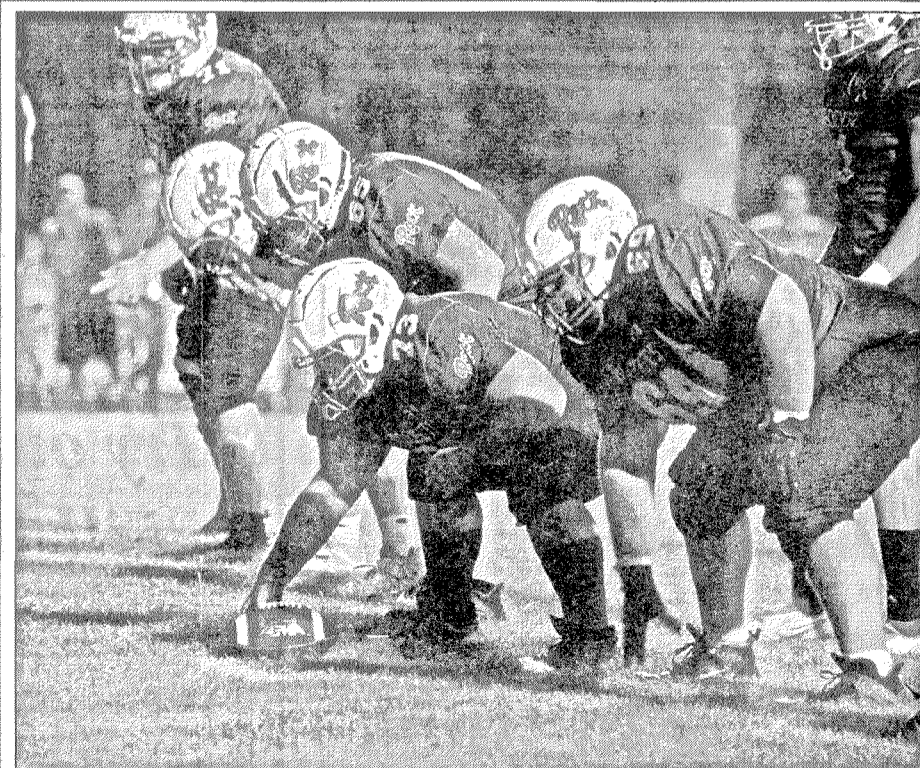

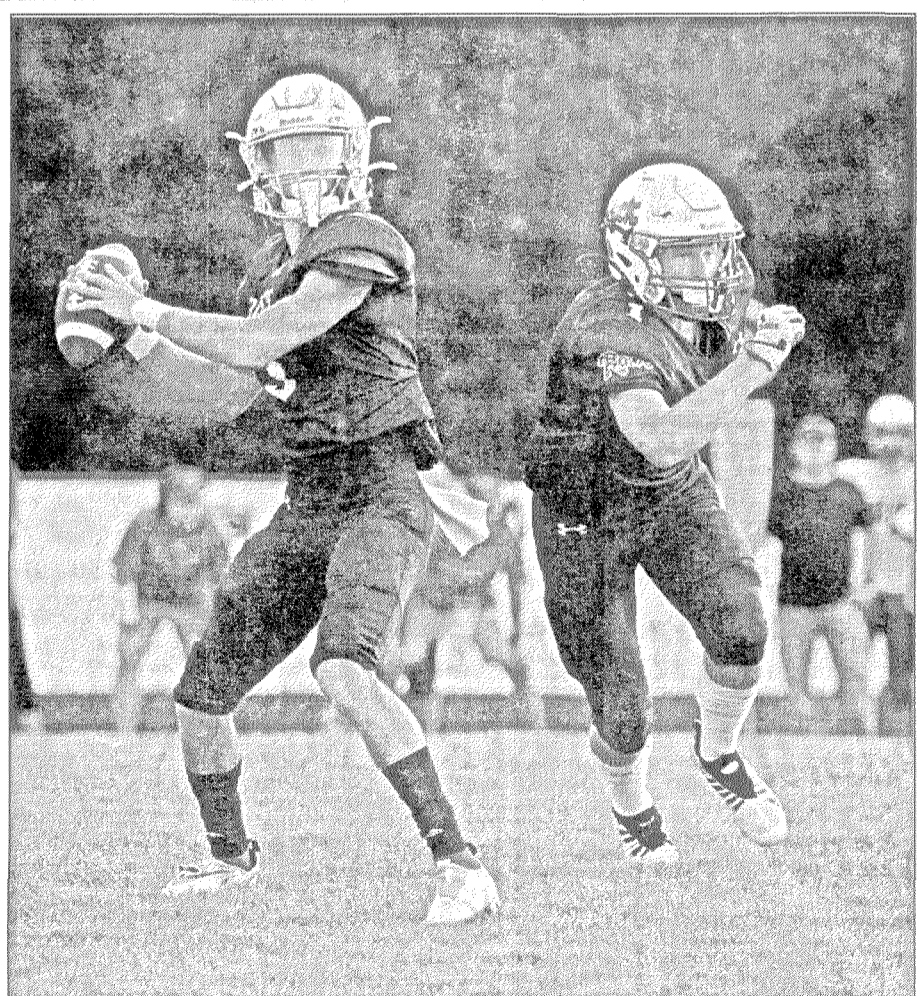

# Agricultural News

## Obtaining Payments Due to Deceased Producers

In order to claim a Farm Service Agency (FSA) payment on behalf of a deceased producer, all program conditions for the payment must have been met before the applicable producer's date of death.

If a producer earned a FSA payment prior to his or her death, the following is the order of precedence for the representatives of the producer:

- administrator or executor of the estate
- the surviving spouse
- surviving sons and daughters, including adopted children
- surviving father and mother
- surviving brothers and sisters
- heirs of the deceased person who would be entitled to payment according to the State law

For FSA to release the payment, the legal representative of the deceased producer must file a form FSA-325 to claim the payment for themselves or an estate. The county office will verify that the application, contract, loan agreement, or other similar form requesting payment issuance, was signed by the applicable deadline by the deceased or a person legally authorized to act on their behalf at that time of application.

If the application, contract or loan agreement form was signed by someone other than the deceased participant, FSA will determine whether the person submitting the form has the legal authority to submit the form.

Payments will be is-

sued to the respective representative's name using the deceased program participant's tax identification number. Payments made to representatives are subject to offset regulations for debts owed by the deceased.

FSA is not responsible for advising persons in obtaining legal advice on how to obtain program benefits that may be due to a participant who has died, disappeared or who has been declared incompetent.

Bengé was charged with harassment, two counts of menacing and terroristic threatening. York was held on a \$5,000 cash bond. Bengé was held on \$1,000 cash or property bond for menacing and a \$3,500 cash or property bond for terroristic threatening.

(Continued from front) According to Brock, the drone will save the department over an hour on every accident call and will be much more accurate in rebuilding the scene.

However, Brock says he still requires about \$2,000 in donations or grants to have the proper software to operate the drone properly. "We are looking for donations and searching for grant money to have the complete system," he said.

Once Brock has the complete system, his new efforts will focus on donations or grants to purchase a search and rescue drone for missing children, the elderly, fugitives and more. Brock says that drone has capabilities specifically for locating individuals and would be very useful to the department.

However, in the meantime, anyone willing to donate for the software to operate the new accident reconstruction software, or for the new search equipment, should send a check to the Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department at 205 East Main Street, Suite 2, Mount Vernon, Kentucky, 40456.

(Continued from front) clean, family event was astounding. "We couldn't believe how many people were looking for something like that without all the world's distractions," he said. "So that got us thinking about a Drive-In with a Christian atmosphere that would let these kids know that there is no shame or stigma attached to things that society has told them is terrible."

Anglin said most young adults hesitate to come to church if they have a drug addiction, for example. "They feel shame or something and they don't think they would be welcome," he said. "The opposite is true. That is what the church is for. That's why

it is there. We want to use this new endeavor to reconnect people with the church and show them they are welcome, regardless of who they are."

So, as part of this effort, the Anglins saw a drive-inn movie theatre as the perfect opportunity to provide such lessons to the youth of the area while providing good, clean, family fun.

Along with the massive movie screen, which will be 85 feet wide, and digital, high-tech movie quality of the most popular movies, there will also be the always popular concession stand. But not just any typical concession stand.

"Our concessions will be tied to a full time restaurant," said Anglin. "There will be more than one level and each level will have its own theme and atmosphere and we plan to tie it to the Rockcastle Baptist Association and include community-wide Bible study. We are going to let people know they are loved and welcome and invited to church. We believe those who have big problems in life should feel welcome and we need to erase that disconnect that society seems to have with the church."

The entire operation will be located in downtown Brodhead in what has become known as the "Hog Pen" area next to city hall. "We are going to call the restaurant the 'Hog Pen Restaurant' and we haven't settled on the name for the drive-in but we are leaning towards Sunset Drive-In."

Anglin said he expects the gates to open in the spring of 2023 and he feels certain the restaurant will provide food for the body as well as the soul. "We are breaking ground on the drive-in

and restaurant today (Monday) and the projection building is under roof already," he said.

Anglin says he will announce progress throughout the construction and he is looking forward to opening night. "I think this will be a good thing for the community in more ways than one," he said.

So in 2023, when you are in Brodhead, don't expect to see the typical crowd of youth on a street corner with their eyes focused on their cell phone. Instead, they will be experiencing life much as their grandparents did by sitting in their car, with a bucket of buttered popcorn, enjoying a movie.

And before they leave, someone will most likely invite them to church.

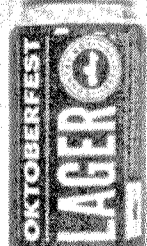

# Two mayors stepping down

If Dwane King should lose his race for Mayor of Livingston against either Donna Durham or Larry Davidson, it would be the first time in the memory of local officials that all three Rockcastle County city mayors would be replaced at the same time.

Starting in January of 2023, Rockcastle County leadership will change somewhat either way since two of the county's longest serving mayors will turn over the reins to their city to their successor.

Mount Vernon Mayor Mike Bryant and Brodhead Mayor Walter Cash have decided to end their long-time positions as mayors of two of the county's biggest cities. Neither of the two mayors are running for re-election.

According to Rockcastle County Clerk Danna Ford Allen's office, a date will be set as close to the first week of January as possible to swear in the new mayors.

## Walter Cash Mayor, City of Brodhead

Mayor Walter Cash holds several special recognitions in Brodhead, one being the fact that he is one of the longest continual mayors ever in the city with 24 consecutive years in the top city position. But he is also most likely the oldest mayor in the state of Kentucky at 88 years old. "Several people have researched that and we can't find any serving mayor older than I am in the state," he said.

But after these years of service, Cash says he simply thought it was time to move on. "I figured it is just that time to move on and let someone else hold the reins for awhile."

Cash became the mayor of Brodhead in 1998 when Mayor Bill Bussell decided to leave his post. "The day I retired from Parker Seal, he (Mayor Bussell) called me that night and I thought he needed some electrical work done on his house," said Cash. "But I went over there and he asked me to take his spot as mayor and told me he would back me all the way." Cash was 64-years-old at the time.

The Brodhead native said being mayor and running for the position was different in the early years. "People didn't campaign like they do now," said Cash. "I just put my name in the box and won and then won every year since then."

Soon after becoming mayor, Cash lost his son Jerry Lee (Hooch) Cash in a truck accident and he has experienced some health issues over the years but he has

continued as leader of the city and said he has enjoyed the countless meetings and work sessions. "As far as I can recall, I haven't missed a single meeting in 24 years," said Cash. "There might be one I am forgetting but we sure don't remember me not being at a meeting."

The mayor says the job is not as complicated as he expected. "Mostly I just have to be there," he said. "The commissioners and clerk and city employees do their thing and I just have to be there to oversee all that is going on."

Cash said he has seen a lot of changes in his city in the past 24 years. "I would have to say we have accomplished quite a bit," he said. "When I became mayor, we had an old broke-down backhoe and now our fire department is one of the best and we have everything anyone could want in the sewer department and we have a strong, well supplied police force. I think a lot has changed and we are still growing every day. I hope Jerry (Adams, the only candidate for mayor in the November general election) will keep things moving forward. I love my town."

Over the years, Cash has presided over countless new ordinances for the City of Brodhead and has led his team through many flood events, annual budgets and other issues that mayors deal with every day. Cash has seen the entire city commission change members more than once and has kept his position as most every city employee has also changed as well. "I

guess I outlasted them all," he said with a laugh.

Cash has overseen countless projects in the city during his six terms as mayor, including upgrades and renovations to the sewer plant and renovations of the Depot Park. "I am proud of our park," he said. "People get a lot of use out of that and it will be here many years. I'd say long after I am gone people will be enjoying that park. Maybe they will be having a picnic or whatever and they will think of that old mayor."

Cash says he is not going to stop being a part of Brodhead. "Back of all this, the hardware store offered me a job as their greeter," he said. "I done got my vest with my name on it and everything. I reckon I'll be right there at the hardware store every day if anybody needs me for anything."

Cash, and his wife Christeen, expect to remain in Brodhead for the rest of their lives. "I will miss being mayor some but I will be around somewhere," he said. "I know that in my time I did what was right and I did what needed done. I didn't hide nothing and I didn't pull no shenanigans. I just hope I left a good, clean town and Brodhead will just keep getting better every day."

Cash said he will be available to anyone who asks for his help or advice. "I'll help any way I can. I hope our little town keeps right on getting better and as long as I can keep going, I'll help anyone."

## Mike Bryant Mayor, City of Mount Vernon

Mike Bryant became Mayor of Mount Vernon in 2010 when he was 65 years old. Bryant won his first bid for mayor against Mayor Gary Cromer, who was serving as interim Mayor after the resignation of Mayor Clarice Kirby. When Bryant leaves his post in January, he will be 77 years old and he and his wife Carol plan to stay in the city. "Our plans are to live here, die here and be buried right here in our town. I just hope that doesn't happen for quite a while yet."

Mayor Bryant has enjoyed all three of his four-year terms and, including helping his family members, he has been involved in many campaigns.

Before becoming mayor, Bryant worked with state government and was in the ministry. He says he has brought that "congregation atmosphere" with him to the top position in the city. "I sort of look at every city employee and the entire city of Mount Vernon as my congregation," said Bryant. "All my life, in police work and many years with state government and the ministry, I have been trained that teamwork is the key to real success." Bryant used this training as his strongest asset. "I believe our partnerships and teamwork with the fiscal court, with RCIDA, with the school system, with the hospital, with the tourism department and so much more is the reason so many things came together over the past few years."

In fact, working together with local entities has shown up clearly in Bryant's

tenure. The city's partnership with the RCIDA and fiscal court, to provide grants for the Microfoodery project, was one of the few city/county loan partnerships established in the state at that time, according to local officials.

The city is also working closely with the Rockcastle County School Board to create SRO (school resource officer) positions at every school in the county. "My first and biggest goal as mayor was to establish these partnerships and I believe that has gone exceptionally well in our area," he said.

Bryant has presided over 12 fiscal year budgets and well over 100 council meetings that he says has also been a benefit to himself and the city. "All 12 of our budgets were zero balance budgets and they have all been approved unanimously by the council," he said. "Our city is doing well and I hope after I am gone it keeps moving forward with the same enthusiasm."

Bryant has been a part of countless new businesses coming to the city as well as new park space, a new Chamber of Commerce office, a history garden, new industry coming to the city, veteran memorials, water and sewer projects, police department growth, fire department development and many other areas of city government.

But, alas, the long-time mayor says it is time to step down. "Between my age and my wife's health and my own health issues, I

think it is time to move on," he said. "I believe you just know when it is time to step down and I feel it is my time. I will still be here to help anyone who takes over as mayor with transition or long-term advice at whatever level they desire. I have been truly blessed and the city has been blessed and I have played a very small part in the city's success over the years. I am proud to have been a part of our growth and development."

Bryant says he considers it quite the honor to be a mayor. "When you think about it, there are 330 million people in the country and only a handful of us are selected to be mayor of a city," he said. "It is quite the honor and I am proud to have played my little part in that and I am so blessed that the people would have me as mayor of Mount Vernon."

But Bryant says his biggest hope is that the city continues to move forward. "I believe that with the help of every other entity in the county and all the city workers and the city council, we have laid a strong foundation for growth and economic development. I am so thankful for the mayors before me who put us in a place that we could move ahead as we have. I just pray that I am leaving a foundation that is easy to build on for all those who come after me."

Bryant hopes to be able to help whoever is elected as mayor in November. "When I came in as a first time mayor, I was nothing

Newspapers w/inserts, magazines, catalogs, office paper, junk mail, shredded paper (needs to be bagged), books, phone books (paper products cannot be plastic lined or coated), cardboard (both corrugated and slick), plastics #1 Pet or Pete, plastics #2 HDPE, (no sheet plastics or plastic bags of any kind; no buckets or totes, no matter what number is on it), metal cans, aerosol cans, aluminum cans, aluminum foil, aluminum pie plates, glass bottles and glass jars (lids must be removed and discarded), old cell phones, car batteries, empty printer and toner cartridges, old computers (no monitors of any kind) and computer accessories, telephones, radios, digital clocks, (no televisions of any kind), rechargeable batteries (if the battery says rechargeable on it, then it is recyclable), and large bulky metal items.

Clean used motor oil may also be dropped off at the Rockcastle County Road Department.
