Eleven witnesses in rebuttal were xamined Monday in the Haywood rial. Harry Orchard reappeared on he stand and was asked a few ques ions as to his acquaintance with some f the witnesses for the defense who ave testified as to his movements. Yn being turned over for cross-examnation he admitted that his uncle, Peter McKinley, committed suicide by hanging 13 or 14 years ago.

Counsel for the defense asked Or hard if his uncle was not insane efore he killed himself and also tried o show by the witness that his materal grandfather was insane, his mone nania being imaginary crimes comnitted a long time ago in Ireland Orchard denied al knowledge of the randfather, but admitted that his incle was demented.

The case enters its tent eek of hearing Monday before Judge remont Wood in the district court of da county. Both sides have rested ad the rebuttal has commenced.

Haywood Witness Arrested. The rebuttal for the state so far i eing directed against the witnesses roduced by the defense to discredi orchard, At the end of the first da of rebutfal a warrant was issued for Dr. I. L. McGee, who swore that he saw Orchard in North Idaho at a time when Orchard swore he was in Denver. McGee is a prominent man living in the northern part of the state. Counsel for the defense, as soon as they heard of the warrant having been issued, sent a telegram to Mc Gee, in which, according to Clarence Darrow, one of Haywood's counsel, they urged him to come to Boise at once. He was arrested at Spokane.

Another Crime Confesser.

The most novel feature of the case is the confession of the witness, William Dewey, who Saturday swore that he participated in the riots in the Coeur d'Alenes when two men were killed. In making this confession Dewey laid himself open to arrest. Counsel for the state express the opinion that Dewey will not be prose-







Charles J. Bronston, the lawyer, has intormed Arthur Goebel that on account of ill hegith he will not be able to act as one of the attorneys for the prosecution in the fourth trial of Caleb Powers for complicity in the assassination of Gov. William Goebel, which will begin at Georgetown next Morday. Soon after the death of Thomas C. Campbell, who had been the leading council for the prosecution in the Powers case, Mr. Bronston was retained for the prosecution, and when Powers, two years ago, took an appeal to the United States Court at Covington, Mr. Bronston was engaged by Gov. Beckham to assist Attorney General Hays and Lawrence Maxwell, of Cincinnati, in presenting the prosecution's side. When the case was argued subsequently in the Supreme Court of the United States, however, Mr Bronston was in Europe and did not participate in the arguments. It has been generally supposed that Mr. Bronston would continue to act for the prosecution. Mr. Bronston's letter to Mr. Goebel is as follows:


