THE WOMEN AT THE POLLS

Outside of the final result, which eclipses all else in its paramount importance, one of the very interesting elements in the recent election was the way the women

Twelve states opened the way to her. Out of these, ten were found in the Wilson column and two in that of Hughes.

This is significant of a wide spread Democratic feeling, for while Illinois and Oregon, the two suffrage states for Hughes are larger and more important than most of the Wilson states, the latter are scattered over a wide area and show a general feeling, while the sentiment of the other is more concentrated and curtailed.

More women voted in Illinois than in any one other state, but although Mr. Hughes was victorious, all of them did not vote for him. The tabulated percentage of women's vetes there splits not very far from half and half, for in the state at large the figures were 56.8 for Hughes and 43.2 for Wil son; while Chicago and Cook county had 53.7 for Hughes and 46.3 for Wilson. Had Jane Addams seen that Wilson "ligot" a little earlier the figures might have been materially changed. But *he almost certainty was that

The "golden special," or the poodle dog train," as it was scornfully called, flashed through the west without changing probably a hundred votes. Oregon was Republican in the minds of men, and the women had most likely quire made up their minds what they would do long before the bejeweled orators told them "their duty." Of all campaign "etcetera" the "golden special" was the most flauntingly spectacular and alto gether the most barren of results.

The branch of suffragists known as the Congressional Union for Woman's Suffrage opposed Wilson tooth and toe nail: "'Because," they said, "he kept us out of suffrage". This was a catch phrase in answer to the declaration of other women; "He kept us out of war', and when the leaders gave out that shibboleth they knew it was but a shifty subterfuge. worse than that, they knew it was a falsehood. For they are intelligent women, and they know that no president can, of his will, change the Constitution of the United States They know the right to vote would come to them only through individual state legislative enactment or through a change in the national constitution in which both state and nation must concur. The declaration sent out by those women was a Republican trick, pure and simple. It is a most interesting question as to whether the women decided the contest in Wilson's favor. Would those equal suffrage states that lived up for him have been found in That column if only the en bad voted? Many of these same states, were for Wilson four Years ago. If the women in them voted this time for Wilson they merely helped to hold the "boat tight". If they voted for Hughes then their vote was not sufficiently strong for any candidate to worry ever. The election statistics of these commonwealths are going to make good reading for those persons who are interested in equal suffrage either in the affirmative or the negative.

BATTLE IN A SNOWSTORM

Attack Made by British Amid Blinding Flakes—Heavy Cannonade Around Douaumont-Relatively Calm Everywhere Else on Front.

London, Nov. 22 .- An advance o from 200 to 1,000 yards over a front 3,500 yards by Canadian troops wa officially reported today in dispatches to the war office from British head quarters on the Somme front. The adyance followed a cannonade which be gan last Saturday . The Canadians swept forward along the Ancre river due west of Bapaume.

Berlin, Nov. 22.—The German positions on both sides of the Ancre and in the St. Pierre-Vanst wood were shelled henvily by the allies; the war office announces. There was a revival of artillery activity in the Champagne. The statement is as follows:

"Army group of Crewn Prince Rupprecht—Our artillery was in action against hostile batteries and points of support. The effects of the bombardment were visible. A lively hostile fire was directed against our positions on both sides of the Ancre and on St. Plerre-Vaust wood. There were no infantry engagements.

"Army group of the German crown prince—In the Champagne and in the Meuse sector (Verdun) artillery activity was revived for a few hours Monday.'

Shell British Near Grandcourt. London, Nov. 22 .- "During the night our line was heavily shelled southwest of Grandcourt," says the official statement from the French front, "To the right of our new front a hostile patrol fell into our hands. "Enemy trenches were successfully raided at Gommecourt and in the loose-leaf floors are crowded for the neighborhood of Roclincourt and

Battle in the Snow.

Special dispatches from British headquarters describe the British advance on the Ancre Saturday as the winter's first battle in the snow. The advance was swift, following up the victory at Beaumont Hamel. The stroke was delivered in a blinding snowstorm before daybreak.

For three days the weather had oeen freezing, so that puddles were frezen to a depth of thice inches and the road surface was ringing hard. Saturday morning the ndvancing troops found the whole earth blanketed with snow. The advance made by the British and Canadian troops was preceded by a short, flerce bombardnent. The Cambians, especially, had numerous brisk hand-to-hand conflicts n German trenches, which were conealed from the observation stations by lancing snowflakes.

A thaw began about ten o'clock in he morning and the snow was quick y replaced with slush and the air beame thick with a raw November fog. which halted operations.

Bombardment Around Douaumont. Paris, Nov. 22.- The official commu ication on the French front given out oy the war office Tuesday afternoon

"Artillery activity was maintained ast night to a notable degree in the region of Saillisel and Douaumont. The night passed in relative calm every where else on the front."

RESCUE 53 FROM STEAMER

British Life Savers Go to Aid the Siberia, an American Ship, Near Dover.

Dover, Nov. 22 .- Fifty-three passen gers and crew of the American steam ar Siberia, stranded on the Goodwin ands, were landed at Deal by the Gingsdown lifebont.

The rescued persons from the Si eria, which stranded in the gale, had distressing experience during the 24 ours they were on the steamer await ng assistance in momentary peril or he steamer's being engulfed in the reacherous quicksands.

The examination is being conducted under civil service rules.
