Adams attend the vote of said county.

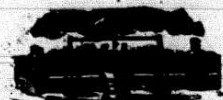

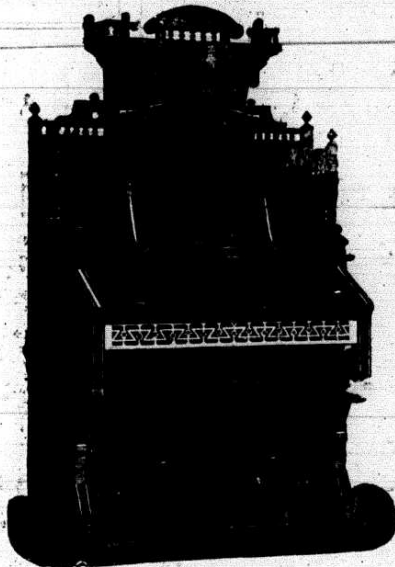
