FIFTY-FOURTH CONGRESS

At the opening of the Fifty-fourth Congress, the Senate met on Monday, March 8, 1897. The Senate was composed of 54 members, including 28 Republicans and 26 Democrats.

The Senate opened its session with a prayer by the chaplain. The President of the Senate, William Sherman, then delivered an address to the body. He reviewed the history of the Senate and expressed his confidence in the ability of the members to carry out their duties. He then introduced a resolution to adjourn until the following day.

THE POWERS

Will the Senate, according to the chart of powers, have the right to remove the President?

This question has been raised in connection with the impeachment of President Johnson. The Senate has the power to impeach the President, but the question of removal is a separate issue. Some believe that the Senate has the power to remove the President, while others believe that this power is reserved for the people through their representatives in Congress.
