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IN THE SENATE

The General Deficiency Bill Will Be Taken Up and Passed.

The Disposition to be Made in the Way of General Deficiency Outside of Taking Up the Tariff Bill—The Case Before the Senate.

WASHINGTON, July 15.—Beyond the fact that the general deficiency appropriation bill, probably will be passed and that the senate will stand ready to take up the tariff bill at any time that a report may be brought in by the conference committee, little can be predicted of the course of events in the senate during the present week. The disposition is to do little in the way of general legislation, and there is a proposition under consideration by the leaders of the two sides of the chamber to adopt the plan now in vogue in the house for sitting only every third day after the deficiencies bill shall have been disposed of.

MINERS' TROUBLES

President Asked to Name United Arbitrators in the Matter.

It May End the Appalling Strife on the Mountain Slopes by the Appointment of Arbitrators in the Matter.

New York, July 15.—A special to the Journal and Advertiser from Washington says:
 Having ascertained from the leading constitutional lawyers in congress that there is no provision upon which the federal government can take part in an arbitration of the dispute between the miners and the coal owners involved in the present gigantic struggle, the Journal and Advertiser has laid the whole matter before President McKinley personally, and asked him to name an official body of arbitrators, whose character and reputation for fairness and good sense would be sufficient to guarantee a just and acceptable decision.
 The president expressed his willingness to take the case in hand, provided the mine owners and the coal owners would assented under immediate consideration on condition that the mine owners shall also agree to submit their case to an arbitration committee of five men.
 Of course, it is understood that this body can have no official character, and will be unable to enforce its decision, but it can, perhaps, induce the mine owners and the coal owners to accept the principle of arbitration.
 A board of arbitration, at least successful in placing the dispute for the continuance of this disarming and merciful strike which has been President McKinley's own, and will not, undertake to select the arbitrators, but will advise the president to appoint such a body, and agree to the principle of arbitration.

 CLEVELAND, O., July 15.—Mr. Dan Hanna, of the firm of M. A. Hanna & Co., declares Saturday afternoon that the West Virginia miners would never quit work had that coal could be secured from that source if the railroads were prepared to hand it to Col. COLLECTIVE NOTE

Of the Foreign Countries in the Most Severe Terms, Said the Turkish Government.
 CONSTANTINOPLE, July 12.—The collective note of the powers, demanding the cessation of the obstruction of the peace negotiations, which was presented by the ambassadors to the Turkish government Friday, is couched in the most severe terms. It states that the frontier between Greece and Turkey be traced by the military authorities of the belligerents as a date within which a settlement of the question is impossible must be effected, and that the belligerents should be proposed to take in the event of Turkey not complying with the wishes of the signatories, which might be as to whether the note will have the desired effect.

The Cuban patriots are close to the gates of Havana and their prospects for final victory and freedom grow brighter.

The big fight at the Boltoerat convention were Col. W. C. P. Breckinridge, Senator Lindsay, ex-Minister McKenzie and ex-Secretary Carlisle.

This battle-ship Oregon has sailed for Hawaii. The New York Herald says that Uncle Sam may have a brush with Japan over the island. The prospect is flattering for the annexation by this country.

The Senate has passed an amendment to the general deficiency bill giving \$500 to A. T. Wood, Gov. Bradley's Senatorial appointee for his expenses incurred in claiming his seat. That would amply pay for such a Senator for a full term.

The Courier-Journal says this is not a third party movement. Correct. It is not even a fourth party movement at all. It is simply a protest against death and taxation, but the fact has been issued and the execution will proceed.

The Boltoerats couldn't or didn't command force enough to hold a meeting here last Saturday to nominate delegates to poor old Watterson's little State convention held in Louisville, Wednesday for the alleged purpose of nominating a candidate for Clerk of Court of Appeals on a Hannacart ticket.

When all of the delegates to the Republican Aid Society's convention are shown up it will be found that every one of them is in some way connected with a bank or corporation, except a few perhaps who are simply afraid of the vengeance of the one or the other. The hold, free people will have no representation in that fraudulent assembly.

The great miners' strike in the North and East is still on with West Virginia and Indiana miners likely to join the striking forces. Arbitration has been attempted but so far nothing has resulted from it. The brightest workers in labor circles are now working in West Virginia striving to convince their brother miners that all depends upon their coming out.

In the Boltoerat Convention which met in Louisville on Wednesday, Senator Lindsay made use of language that he will regret at no distant day. He stated that the lawlessness, anarchy and tollgate raiding in our State was the natural outgrowth of the teachings of the leaders of Democracy, the Silvers people. Billy may be returned to the Senate after his term expires but it will be under different conditions of under another device than that of Democracy.

NEGRO deputies may do well enough in some localities, but Marshal James' had better not send his negroes to the mountains unless he wants the stuffing shot out of them. Most of the mountain spots are Republicans and nearly all the law breakers of their region are of that faith, but they won't submit to being handcuffed by a Negro. (Interior Journal)

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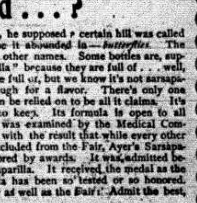
