FILED FORGERIES. Charge against Pension Attorney of Mt. Vernon, Ky. —Disbarred From Interior Department. Washington, Sept. 30.—Pension Attorneys Samuel B. McLean, of Elizabeth, Pa.; M. M. Chase, of Los Angeles, Cal.; and D. P. Bethurum, of Mt. Vernon, Ky., have been disbarred from practice before the Interior Department. The first two named are charged with demanding and receiving illegal pension fees, and Bethurum with filing forged declarations in pension cases. (From Friday's Court Journal, Oct. 15, 1897.)

TRAIN IN THE RIVER.

Twenty-Eight Lives Lost and Half That Number Injured.

High Water Injures the Railroad and a Fatal Blow Is Dealt to the River—Most of the Lost Lives From Drowning.

New York, Oct. 23.—Buffalo and New York special No. 46, on the New York Central and Hudson River railroad, due to arrive in this city at 7:30 o'clock Sunday morning, was wrecked on the track into the Hudson river, one and a half miles below Harrison station.

The train consisted of the engine, a combination baggage and express car.

A central five-car baggage and four forward cars are submerged in 30 feet of water. Engineers Lost and Fireman Tompkins went down with the engine.

The first man, unknown, who was taken out of the wreck by the rescuers, was breathing when found, but he died.

The sleeping car conductor says he is able to account for all his passengers except five, and he is not certain that these are lost.
