POLITICAL SENSATION.

Col. Thos. E. Moore Denounces Debsa Breckinridge, and Suggests a Left Hand-Side.

LEXINGTON, Ky., Feb. 18.—A political sensation is caused by the publication of a letter from Col. Thomas E. Moore, of Boone county, leading first Democrat, denouncing Debsa Breckinridge, son of Col. W. C. F. Breckinridge, editor of the Herald, and suggesting a duel to settle their differences. Col. Moore is an ex-confederate and is paralyzed in his right arm. He suggests that both use left arms.

WILL NOT VIOLENT.

The Seven Congressionals Pledge to Remain in Jail.

INDEPENDENCE, Ky., Feb. 18.—A. N. Nieber, chief magistrate, J. L. Rahn, saloonkeeper, Michael Mesingler, tobacco broker, H. B. Husefeldt, cigar manufacturer, John Hornel, retired justice, Charles Avery, iron roller, F. C. Niemeyer, butcher, the seven imprisoned congressionals of Covington, were before Judge Tarvin Wednesday at 10 a. m. in the hearing of the habeas corpus writ issued by Judge Hobbs at Lexington.

Col. Moore recently suggested as a penitentiary commissioner and the Herald ridiculed him. This led to the challenge. Breckinridge is in Frankfort and will probably answer Col. Moore Thursday. Col. Breckinridge declined to discuss the challenge.

LEXINGTON, Ky., Feb. 18.—Mr. Debsa Breckinridge, manager of the Morning Herald, and Col. Thos. E. Moore, of Boone county, father, are disposed to treat the challenge of Capt. Thos. E. Moore of Boone county, rather lightly, owing from the tone of an editorial which will appear in the Herald Wednesday, under the caption "Once a Soldier, Always a Soldier," there will be no duel so far as either of the Messrs. Breckinridge are concerned.

An effort to swear Judge Tarvin out of the bench in the case on the ground that he was an interested party. The judge said his only interest was to prevent certain persons from acting as attorneys.

There were legal titles on the writ. Attorney Fluke cited legal authorities. Theodore Italian retorted to the judge, who spoke of his presence: "You are offering me an insult and I can not respond." The judge refused to release the men on Judge Hobbs's writ and said he would allow the prisoners to make a writ appeal in habeas corpus before him.

STRUCK OUT.

Testimony as to Husband and Wife—Sent to From Other Place in Divorce Case.

FRANKFORT, Ky., Feb. 14.—The senate had nearly as many new bills introduced as yesterday. The following bills were passed:

Relieving stockholders in newspapers of double liability; relieving physicians in Louisville; house bill making Wickliff, Ballard county, a fifth judicial circuit; a bill providing a penalty for officers of county school superintendents to comply with the law as to informing each county school board and their sending pupils to the A. M. college. The house bill changing the code as to the divorce law was passed. The senate had amended the measure so as to strike out the provision allowing husband and wife to testify against each other in divorce cases.

RECEIVED.

The seven congressionals were recommitted. Theodore Italian was told that he was in contempt.

All the prisoners show evidence of confinement. Several requiring the attendance of a physician, and all appearing in need of rest. It was this which probably induced Judge Tarvin to urge them, before adjourning court Wednesday afternoon, to end the unfortunate affair and give him opportunity to let them return to their homes and families. His opposition, however, couched in the friendly manner, was rebuffed and they were again remanded to jail.

DESPERATE DUEL.

One Man Dying, Another Heavily Wounded and the Third In Jail.

LOUISVILLE, Feb. 18.—A desperate duel was fought with knives and pistols between George Vogt and Arthur B. Waldron, Sunday, at the corner of Third and K street. Fred Vogt, the son of George Vogt, was also drawn into the encounter. As a result, Waldron is lying at the hospital in a precarious condition and is not expected to live. Fred Vogt is at the city street infirmary, badly wounded, and the elder Vogt is in jail charged with malicious shooting.

NO APPEAL.

Can He Take It if the Court Records Have Been Destroyed?

LEXINGTON, Ky., Feb. 18.—Lawyers here are of the opinion that Judge Tarvin's decision has not exceeded the limit of the law in its contempt proceedings.

"In this case," said Attorney Webb, "council has a right to appeal."

Ex-City Judge Falconer, who showed himself to be one of the original kind by his decision in dismissing Harris, the slayer of Merritt, his wife's paragon, said: "If the records in this proceeding have been properly entered, an appeal can be taken. I do not know if the court of appeals would take the matter up simply the note of a stenographer. The councilmen certainly have the right to habeas corpus proceedings."
