In fact the enterprise is the largest ever established in Rockcastle. The managers are straight forward business gentlemen and Rockcastle will reap much benefit from these works.

Gen'l W. H. Gentry, of Fayette, has issued invitations to all the Gentrys to meet in re-union at Crab Orchard Spring's, Aug. 1. The object is to bring together as many of the name who have descended from the Revolutionary soldier, Richard Gentry, who is buried near those springs on the old Gentry farm; also the descendants of his brother, David, two sisters, and his Uncles, Martin, Watson, William and Moses Gentry, all whom came from Virginia.
