On joint ballot the General Assembly will be largely Democratic with 85 Democrats, and 51 Republicans and two doubtful. What is the use of Bradley, Morrow, Yerkes, Boyd, and Holt coming out when old Joe Blackburn will carry off the plum?

The Democrats of Lincoln are workers from the head waters of "hell for sartin." They proved that by carrying the county for Goebel. Milford North, Democrat, was defeated by only 14 votes for the legislature by P. M. C. Roberts. The Republican it is said, had more money than they could possibly use and by that means beat North who had made that county a splendid member in the last general assembly.

The night Hon. G. M. Davison spoke at the court house here the Republicans organized what they called an "Honest Election League" and insisted even on the good, Christian women present, joining and assist in purifying the ballot, yet some of the leaders of that same Club sent money all over Rockcastle county to buy votes and corrupt the ballot on last Tuesday. GENE BROWN AND L. & N.
ORNE BROWN, a nice young Democrat received orders from the L. & N. Railroad Co., Monday morning to report at Lebanon Junction that night for work. He plead with them in order to remain over Tuesday, that the night vote, but no, he had to go. He did go, and lost his vote. The Republican boys were all sent home and special arrangements made by which they were to be sure to get a vote. They even got their time given them. But Gene Brown who asked no pay for his time lost, was made to go, because he was going to vote for Goebel. Is this justice? Is it right? We are glad to say that we heard several Republicans say that it was wrong. As much as we like the L. & N., as much as it has done for us and as nice as it is treated to; we say that it is an outrage upon a free ballot, an insult to manhood and ought to be, and will be, condemned by all.

The returns from all but 70 of the 1807 voting precincts in the State, give Goebel a net plurality of 2107. Thirty-nine of the missing precincts make up five entire counties which gave in 1807 a net Republican plurality of 263. Of the

seventy missing precincts were in Jefferson county, twenty-eight in Democratic counties and thirty-seven are in Republican counties. Gen. Taylor, Wednesday wrote a card thanking the people for his election when the returns showed Goebel ahead. The card was decidedly premature and caused the people to give him the "horse laugh." From the returns of the Capital Hotel, on Tuesday night at 12 o'clock, Senator Goebel said he believed I have been honest. I know I have been elected in fact. Mr. Taylor says in an interview that he will assume the office and maintain it. Ah I have to say to this is: that if declared elected, I will occupy the office in spite of the threats of the Louisville Nashville Railroad Company and its political allies. We will have in the State four years of Democratic management of State affairs. We will have no riot alarm bells, no bayonet rule and no Federal marshals at the polls, but the representative of the plain people of the Commonwealth.
