The eight Road Commissioners of the county met last Saturday, and made the yearly allowances to the various overseers. It is a matter of pride to the citizens of Rockcastle to witness in the last two years, such a vast improvement in our county roads and much credit is due the Commissioners. The law is being strictly enforced, but even though the overseer complies with the law, yet frequently he does not have the proper idea as to the best way to build up our roads and fails to get the proper amount of work out of the road hands. The two road graders bought this year are proving, the very thing needed and the people are thoroughly realizing the great benefits to be derived therefrom. With such men as we now have in charge, we are confident that the roads will even get better, smoother and more solid. Next year, more grading will be done, saws, lances set back, and the broken finer and more gravel used.

Messrs. R. L. Hubble, Jesse Alverson and Sam Embry, Jr., three worthy Democrats, of Lincoln, were arrested Wednesday by Marshal Short on a writ from the U. S. Court charging them with a felony but contained no other specification. They appeared before Commissioner White that same afternoon and promptly gave bond for their appearance before Judge Evans in Louisville, on February 16th. The arrest of these elegant gentlemen, whom we well know is simply the work of jealousy and spite. These men claim that they have violated no law whatever, that as election officers, they did nothing but their duty, which they are ready and willing to stand by. It was reported to them that the charge was keeping ballots out of the ballot box. They are ready to meet that charge, as they are any other one that may be brought against them. All they ask is a fair trial and justice. It is true, that by agreement of all the officers, Republicans and Democrats, Mr. Hubble was selected to hold the ballots that were challenged. He did so and there were 12 in all. No desire to conceal them was made because he was the one chosen as the custodian of these ballots. The ballots were not destroyed in any way—the number corresponded exactly with the number of stubs. When the time came to count the vote the custodian produced the challenged ballots and on occasion, John J. McRoberts, a Republican the ballots were sealed up and sent on before the County Board. It was also intimated that they intimidated negroes when they knew nothing of that matter, and believe that the testimony of the Republican witnesses will thoroughly exonerate them if that should be the charge.

He was a splendid citizen; an upright, Christian; and a business man; a loving and devoted father and a tender husband.
