

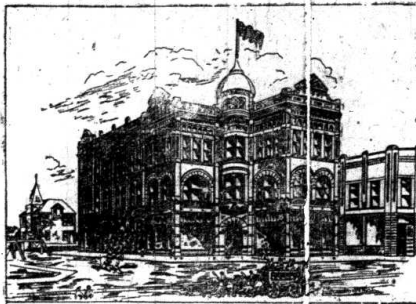

Dexter Baileu bought several veals at 35 to 40... Mark Hardin bought several yearlings at \$25... S. G. Anderson sold to A. J. Thompson some steers at 50... C. C. McClure sold to J. C. Hays a bunch of steers at \$25... G. A. Swinebroad sold to O. T. Layton nine heifers at \$23.95 and to another party nine at \$24.25. He also sold a bunch of steers at 50... Hon. John S. Owsley, Sr., bought 40 two-year-old 800-pound cattle of Montie Fox at 5c, making 160 of that age that Mr. Owsley will fatten for the fall market. Mr. Owsley sold a Polled Angus bull calf to Col. W. H. Dudder for \$50 and another to a Garrard county man at the same price. [Interior Journal.] Lancaster Court.—There were about 350 cattle at Rice Benge's pens yesterday and about two-thirds of them changed hands, some extra good steers going as high as 5 1/2c but 5c was the ruling price for yearlings and two year-olds. Heifers brought 3 1/2 to 4 1/2c; butcher stuff 2 1/2 to 3 1/2c and scrub cattle 2 1/2 to 3 1/2c. A few miles sold at \$95 to \$100 and several horses at \$40 to \$50. The crowd was not up to the average and business was not as brisk in any line as usual.

Frank Martin has bought 41 calves and cattle in Louisville paying from 4 to 6 1/2c. Curry & Forsythe are shipping wheat South and are receiving from 75 to 75c for it.

B. F. Saunders & Co. purchased 65 1,200 pound cattle of George Robinson for 15th of July delivery at 4 1/2c. They also bought 55 hogs from Mr. Robinson at 4 1/2c. Ransdall Lisey bought in Washington county 30 steer calves for Iowa parties, at an average of \$22.50. [Harrodsburg Democrat.]

The Stanford Journal notes the sales of 30 sheep at \$5.50 each; one 1,200 lb steer at 5c; a bunch of 800 lb heifers at 4c; fifty five 1,041 lb cattle at 2 1/2c; a crop of last year's

sheep at 75c; 75 ewes and lambs at \$36; 125 mountain sheep at \$2.80; to \$3.80; 18 heifers at 4c, and a premium of \$1 each.

OFFICIAL CALL.

At a meeting of the Eighth Congressional District Democratic Committee, held at Lawrenceburg, Ky. on April 28, 1900, for the purpose of fixing the time, manner and place of selecting a Democratic nominee for Congress from the 8th Congressional district of Kentucky, to be voted for on behalf of the Democratic party at the general election in 1900, pursuant to the call of the Chairman, Hon. Simeon Cook, the following members of the committee were present in person: W. M. Scott, of Shelby; W. M. Black, of Spencer; Wm. Sandusky, of Jessamine; W. C. Bell, of Mercer; S. E. Booth, of Anderson; and the following by proxy: J. S. Chrisman, of Boyle.

The meeting was called to order by the Chairman, Hon. Simeon Cook, and on motion W. M. Scott was elected Secretary and Treasurer.

Moved, First—That a convention be held by the members of the Democratic party of the Eighth Congressional district of Kentucky composed of the counties of Anderson, Boyle, Garrard, Jessamine, Lincoln, Madison, Mercer, Rockcastle, Shelby and Spencer, for the purpose of nominating a Congressional candidate to be the nominee of said party, and to be voted for at the general election in November.

Second—That said convention be called and notice forthwith be given for its holding on June 30, 1900, at 2 o'clock p. m., at Harrodsburg, in Meshier county, Ky. That there be selected from each county delegates to that convention, upon the basis of 1 delegate for each 200 Democratic voters as returned for Governor at the last State election; that for the selection of said delegates there will be a mass conven-

tion held by the Democracy of each of said counties, at the court house, on June 16, 1900, at 2 o'clock p. m.

Third—That all legal voters may take part in said respective mass conventions who have heretofore affiliated with the Democratic party, and also those who are known Democrats and who recognize the obligation of supporting the nominee of said Democratic party by participating in the selection of said delegates, and also any person as will be entitled to cast his first vote at the next general election and who, by his action, will pledge himself to support the nominee of said Democratic party, which respective mass conventions will be called to order and duly conducted according to the party laws.

Fourth—That any person offering himself as a candidate for the nomination is required to deposit the sum of \$100 with the Treasurer of this Committee to be used in defraying the expenses of holding said convention and the calling thereof, on or before June 1, 1900, and should declare himself as such candidate on or before last mentioned date.

Fifth—That should not more than one person offer as a candidate by the time aforesaid, then this committee will meet on June 2, 1900, and declare such person the nominee.
