On the Murder of Goebel and Taylor's Acts of Highbanded Lawlessness

Republican Papers on Caleb Power Trial.

The verdict of the jury in the trial of Caleb Powers, ex-secretary of state of Kentucky, which find him guilty of complicity in the murder of William Goebel and fixed his punishment at imprisonmer for life, will surprise no one wh has carefully followed the evidence and is at all familiar with preposit ical conditions in that state grow ing out of the contest over the gov

It cannot be denied that the state produced a formidable array of evidence tending to prove that the assassination of Goebel was not the work of a reckless, datedevil moun taineer who did the dastardly job upon his own responsibility, but that it was the result of a carefully planed conspiracy. There is no longer any doubt among fair-minded Republicans as well as Democrats that the Goebel murder was deliberately planned and the assassin was the agent of a conspiracy which had conceived that some advantage was to be derived from the removal of the Democratic claimant to the governorship

The task for the state in the case of Powers was to establish his con nection with or responsibility for the conspiracy which is known to have existed. The state claims to have done this upon the testimony of several witnesses who related conversations in which Powers is alleged to have stated that "Goebel had to be killed " The most cred ible testimony of this character was given by Finley Anderson, a Republican and a warm personal friend of Powers, a resident of Barbour ville, the home of the defendant who detailed a conversation in which Powers told him that "Goebel would not live to take his seat, and that "if necessary he would kill him himself."

CALL TERM ROCKCASTLE COUN TV COURT SEPT 21 1000

Whereas, twenty per cent of the legal voters of Rockcastle county election to be held on the 6th day of November 1900, at the va rious voting places in said county, for the purpose of taking the sense of the voters of said county as to whether or not, they desire an appropriation of thirty thousand dol lars (\$30,000) to be secured by selling Bonds of the county, 'to be payable at the option of the county at any time within twenty-five years from date of their issue, and to bear a rate of interest not great er than four per cent. per annun from date until paid, and not to be sold at a price less than their par value, for the purpose of raising money to build and maintain turn pikes and gravel roads in Rock castle county. Said bonds to b paid as well as their interest by means of levving a tax of not to ex ceed 15 cents on each hundred dollars worth of taxable property in said county, each year until the same are paid.

Said election is now ordered be held at the next regular election which is on the 6th day of November 1900.

The Sheriff of this county is hereby brdered and directed to open a pol; at each and all the voting places of the county afore said, for the purpose of taking the sense of the voters on said question. 
