The largest crowd ever assembled in Louisville was there Tuesday, to witness the parade of the 30,000 Klansmen. Never before in the history of the city, has there been anything which surpassed this parade, which marked the formal opening of the 28th. Triennial Conclave of the Grand Encampment of Knights Templar. At the reception given at the Girl's High School Tuesday afternoon, Judge Henry S. Barker, on account of the absence of Gov. Beckham, was selected as his accredited representative, to deliver the address of welcome to the Templars, on behalf of the State of Kentucky, from which the following is taken:

"Perhaps, Sir Knights, before I speak the words of formal welcome it will not be inappropriate that I mention another Knight of whom a personal sorrow has robbed us. To me personally he is a stranger. I do not know that I can rightly call him by name. But I know that when our beloved country was in peril, when he, with matchless skill and undaunted courage, tracked the enemy across the pathless sea and locked him safely in the harbor of Santiago, men gratefully called him "Slay" (Schley), but when the enemy dashed again into the ocean, to fight his way to home and safety, when there was flashed from the bridge of the Brooklyn those words of awful carnage which swept Cervara from the sea—when our plumed Knight stood matchless amid the wreck and ruin of Spain's second Armada, then every patriot tongue called him "Slay" (Schley). To-day he and our country's honor are again in pawn to fate. God grant to her and him another victory."

on the market. Quality common, with few exceptions. Trade was better than last court, but at prices a little lower. One bunch of 2-year-old cattle sold at 10c yearlings at 3 to 4c; heifers at 3 to 3 1/2c; cows at 2 to 2 1/2c; bulls at 3c. About 1,000 or 1,200 sheep sale, quality common. One bunch of good ewes at \$2 75 was refused, the rest being \$3. Most sales at about \$2. A few 125-lb hogs sold at 50c.

W. C. May sold a bunch of stock hogs to Jake Tucker at 50c; J. T. Meyers bought 17 ewes of Doc Tenney for \$3 per head; U. H. Pope sold a bunch of hogs to J. C. Johnson at \$5 50 per cwt.; Dr. W. B. Peany bought a Jersey milk cow of G. T. Helm Saturday for \$40; Thos. Metcalf bought 78 ewes and two Southdown bucks of W. P. Clevens for \$160; Joe Irvine sold a car load of fat hogs to Miles McKee, of Bloomfield, at \$5 25 per cwt.; J. C. Bayne & Bros., of Bagdad, sold two car loads of shipping cattle to Carrithers & Co., at 50c; Mr. N. W. Isham, of the Stewart neighborhood, sold to J. H. Robinson & Co. 200 bushels of wheat at 70c; P. C. Bros. sold to Hubble & Hubbanks, of Lincoln, 25 mules at \$71, and bought from Oakes Bros. 2 mule colts at \$35 and \$40; John Webb shipped a car load of lambs, a car load of hogs and a car load of cattle to Louisville last week. The lambs were bought at \$2 50 and \$3 25, the cattle at \$1 50 and \$3 and the hogs at \$5 and \$5 25—Danville Advocate.

LANCASTER COURT.—There were a number of cattle at Lancaster yesterday, but buyers were scarce and very few sales were made. A small bunch of butcher cattle brought 2 1/2c and some yearlings 4c. A number of mule colts changed hands \$17 to \$40 and aged mules \$75 to 140. The horse market was dull.

Dr. P. W. Logan left at this office Saturday some Oklahoma corn which is very much unlike that raised here. The sample of "sawm," or primitive corn has grains of every color of the rainbow. He also left samples of the original Russian or Turkey wheat, introduced into Kansas and known there as Kansas hard wheat. It weighs from 15 to 50 bushels per acre and weighs 64 pounds to the bushel and having a hard, small grain is much sought after by exporters.
