### POLITICS AND POLITICIANS

The Ohio Legislature will ballot Mch. 1 for a successor to Senator Hanna.

The citizens of Frankfort will give a banquet to the members of the General Assembly. State officials and invited guests. Tuesday evening, March 1st, in celebration of the Legislature's action in providing for new State buildings.

The bill to regulate political parties in the state by prohibiting committees from holding public meetings in the house Monday night. The chances are that the measure will pass both branches of the General Assembly.

The Democratic committee of the first district has issued a call for a primary on May 7 to nominate a candidate for Congress to succeed Congressman James.

The bill to prohibit the co-education of races in Kentucky, passed by the House almost unanimously will doubtless receive a similar treatment in the Senate, and then will be removed one of the greatest menaces to white supremacy in the State. Let the institution be made straight out negro school or removed to a more congenial section for the domination of social equality ideas—Lexington Democrat.

Gov. Herrick and W. E. Cox are out of the race for United States Senator from Ohio to succeed the late M. A. Hanna, and it is now certain that the honor will go to Gen. Charles W. Dick. Gov. Herrick's refusal to enter the contest is ascribed to a promise given Mr. Hanna, that he would serve out his term as Governor and thus prevent the Lieutenant Governor, a former adherent, from becoming Governor.

### A SOLDIER'S LETTER.

Pt. Wight, Wash., Feb. 19, 1904. Editor Signal:

Thinking that some one might be interested in the great North-West and the American soldiers who are stationed in this department, I thought I would try to write a few lines to the dear old Signal, which I peruse with much interest each and every week. I left my home in which is in Rockcastle county, Ky., near Livingston, Ky., in Lexington, the fine blue jeans and a piece I love most dearly. I started in to school there on Jan. 1st, 1902, staid there a few days over a month and enlisted in the Regular army for a period of three years. We left London on the 5th of Feb. for Lexington, and on the 10th we put on the blue; we were there a few days and then sent to Columbus, Ohio for military instructions where we staid for four months. Columbus being a regular recruiting station we were kept there until some regiment needed filling up. On June 4, one hundred and seventy five enlisted men and three officers in a charge left for San Francisco, Cal., to join our regiment which we were all well pleased. There we were all divided up and assigned to our different companies. We were there ten or twelve days, just long enough to begin to like the place and then were ordered to the department of the Columbia, of which Gen. Fredric Funston is commander. Eight companies of this regiment and department headquarters are at Vancouver barracks Wash. Just eight miles from Portland, Oregon. The two are connected by bridges. It is a fine place during the summer and fall. Two companies of this battalion are at Fort Lawton, Seattle, Wash. I don't know but very little about that post except hearsay. The other two companies are here about two miles from the city of Spokane, the metropolis of Western Wash.

This post reminds me a great deal of Ft. Thomas, Kentucky, except it is a large city, but it can be. A few weeks ago we thought we were going to get a trip to Panama, but I guess we will not go any where for a while unless Uncle Sam gets mixed up with the Russo-Japanese trouble which I hardly think he will.

If this catches the writer's bait I will probably come again.

### COBB WILL NOT RUN.

"Who has the best of the race so far, as you see it?"

"Helm, undoubtedly. Madison county has always dictated the nomination, and if its delegation goes for Helm, and the sentiment is decidedly in his favor he has the nomination as good as clinched. In the past years, when Madison had a candidate in the field, she could count on Lincoln's support. As an instance of her loyalty, look what she stood by McCree. Now that Lincoln has a candidate, it is no more than right that we should reciprocate the courtesy."

It is a fact that when Mr. Gilbert ran two years ago he promised that he would not again make the race?"

"I cannot say. I have heard this statement attributed to him. He is now serving his third term and many of the leading politicians who supported him in his other races, think he should step aside and give other aspirants a chance. Madison county feels kindly toward Mr. Helm, the Lincoln county entry, not only because of the loyalty of its county to our candidates in the past, but because Mr. Helm is part of a Madison man, having graduated from Central University, when it was located in Richmond. Yes, you may say that it looks very much like Helm, and if he is nominated he will win in a walk."—Lexington Leader.

#### A CANDIDATE FOR APPELLATE JUDGE OF THIS DISTRICT.

### LEGISLATURE.

#### FRANKFORT, Ky., Feb. 28.—

The principal feature of the work of the House Thursday, as told in these dispatches, was the passage of the Day bill prohibiting the co-education of the races, which measure effects only Berea College, in Madison county. That is the only co-educational institution in the State, and after this session it will have to make provision for a separate co-educational white school at least twenty-five miles from the Berea school, which is sure to pass the Senate and signed by the Governor.

The House passed the bill by a vote of 24 to 8. Seven Republicans voted for it after it was amended so as to permit the same management to conduct two separate schools, one for negroes and one for whites, provided they are twenty-five miles apart. The law will not go into effect until after July 15.
