LEVEL GREEN

Sunday has been with us again since we wrote, with no preaching Sunday or Bible school, little crowds, short calls; and as usual, rest from unusual toil and a number of pleasures; but who knows that we are required in this day and time to keep "one day in seven holy" (1) sanctify it; and if we are so required, who can tell us whether it be Saturday or Sunday?

Where is any divine authority for a change of day duty, and haven't we as much authority from Divine Law to rest our lands, horses, etc., every 7th year as we now have to rest every 7th day? But whether the decalogue is still in force or not we think it best even as a matter of political economy to "take the day off." It affords an opportunity for the farmers to meet, talk their crop prospects over, boast, in a pleasant way, of their young colts, calves, lambs and pigs; and how the good matrons delight in telling each other how many young chicks, ducks, geese, etc., they have, and boast of early taters, peas, beans and lupines, now ready for use, and how they will work to prepare a dinner of those early vegetables, a cherry pie, fried chicken, new honey and other, fads of earth even on this Holy day while their lords the men, will hardly fetch a load of stove wood or a fresh basket of eggs. They want to go on ministering to their talks—often spirited arguments—on poly thy, religion and other matters which they must discuss in order to save the union, elect John Smith or convert the world and save the dear people from sin of political assassination. Finally when the meal is prepared offer those good women are too hot and tired to enjoy it. We are not a Sunday Saboteur or a "Sunday Christian," but we do know that Sunday is more poorly kept by our best class (the women) than by the poor.
