EDUCATIONAL REFORM.

It is estimated, with a reasonable approach to accuracy, that twenty-five is the largest number of pupils one teacher can deal with in one class. "Until there are teachers in this proportion," says the New York Times, "the children will be thirteen, and buildings suited to them and the rest of the requirements fulfilled for the best education of body and mind, we would let the high schools and colleges wait."

There is another striking intimation that the school funds are too largely applied to the "higher education" of those who can afford to keep at school, to the neglect of those who can hope to accomplish not more than the "three R's." The common school systems of the various states in the Union are for the instruction of the masses in the common branches of the education of the country by the dangers of illiteracy. Higher education in the common school system should not be permitted to run ahead of the necessities for common education among the masses.

PASTOR'S SUNDAY SCHOOL INSTITUTE, THE GREAT-EST SUNDAY SCHOOL MEETING OF THE YEAR.

The Third Pastors' Sunday School Institute, of Kentucky, under the auspices of the Kentucky Sunday School Association, will be held at Louisville in the First Presbyterian Church, December 8 to 9, in connection with the Annual Sunday School Lectures at the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. Dr. A. H. McKinney, of the most prominent Sunday School lecturers and authors of the East, delivers the lectures before the Seminary. He will also take a prominent part in the Institute. All in attendance at the Institute will get the benefit of these lectures. The faculty of the Institute this year will consist of four of the most noted Sunday School experts in America. In addition to Dr. McKinney there will be Mr. Marion Lawrence, International General Secretary and the leader of the Sunday School forces of the world; Dr. H. M. Hamill, of Nashville, Tenn., the recognized authority on Teacher's training in the world; Dr. Chas. B. Woods, of Philadelphia, formerly General Secretary of New York State and now at the head of the Sunday School work of the M. E. Church. An exceedingly strong program has been arranged. Our Pastors' Institute is now one of the most notable institutions in America. Inquiries are coming to us continuously even from over the sea.

The More Comes The Worse It Is.

President Roosevelt's plurality of the vote, as well as his loss of the electoral vote, is a record breaker, and the indications are that he will exceed 1,500,000. The electoral vote from the present indications will stand 343 for Roosevelt

and 133 for Parker. Missouri has landed in the Roosevelt column by a plurality estimated at 8000, though Folk, Democrat, is elected Governor by a plurality approximating 90000. The Missouri Legislature is believed to be Republican, and the Democratic candidates for the Missouri State offices probably have been defeated. The Democrats will lose several Congressmen in Missouri. The early reports which indicated a Democratic slump in Tennessee are not borne out by the returns which indicate the biggest Democratic presidential plurality since 1880. Maryland is the only State whose electoral vote seems doubtful, the chances favoring the Republicans. The Democrats are still claiming the election of Berge, the fusion candidate for Governor in Nebraska. Gov. Todd Democrat, probably has pulled through in Montana by a close shave though the State is largely Republican in the national contest.

Judge Alton B. Parker Wednesday gave to the press an open letter addressed to the "Democracy of the Nation," in which he thanked all those who aided in the campaign. In the letter he says he will never again seek a nomination for a public office. He says he will still work for Democratic success and strongly urges party harmony. He repeats his previous statement that the greatest moral question that confronts the party is: "Shall the trusts and corporations be prevented from contributing money to control or to aid in controlling elections?"

W. J. Bryan Wednesday issued a lengthy statement on the results of the general election. Mr. Bryan favors an aggressive fight for the future on the old issues, and mentions a number of new issues which he thinks should be taken up in the future. The party, he asserts, should seek the support of the wage earners and the common people rather than an alliance with predatory wealth.
