The Secretary of War has received a letter from Noel Gaines Inspector General of the State of Kentucky. The author writes in vigorous protest against the argument of Inspector General Horton of the army in favor of the Canteen.

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It was decided at a meeting of the republican executive committee of the Third district at Bowling Green Monday that no contest would be made by Wm Henry Jones for the seat of J. M. Richardson in Congress.

Gen. J. Warren Keller, member of Congress from the Seventh Ohio District, declares his mission is to secure the election franchise for the Negro in the South and he would do so by enforcing the 14th amendment.

The Franklin county democratic committee refused to consider the contest filed by Col. E. H. Taylor, Jr. for the nomination for Representative against Frank Johnson in the grounds that it was filed too late. The matter may be taken to court.

The total vote cast in Kentucky at the last election as shown by the official records at Frankfort is 458,766. The leading Democrat received 217,170 votes and the leading Republican elected 241,597 votes, making a Democratic majority of 24,427 votes.

A sensational development in the exciting primary election in Shelby county is the theft of the ballot box in the Booneville precinct. About 65 candidates were entered and the ballot was a veritable picture book. The theft is believed to have been in the interest of one of the candidates.

Wm. R. Wilson will be the new postmaster at New York. National Chairman Thomas Taggart has entered upon his duties as personal manager of his newspaper the Indianapolis Sentinel, and hereafter will give his attention to the publication.

A. E. Richards was appointed City Attorney of Louisville for a term of four years to succeed Henry L. Stone. Mayor Granger made the appointment and the price pays \$5,000 a year.

It is said that numerous shifts will be made among the officers of the L. & N., among them being the appointment of C. B. Compton, now traffic manager, to the vice president, made vacant by the resignation of Walker D. Hines. D. M. Goodwin, at present general freight agent, is reported as Mr. Compton's successor. Other changes said to be contemplated are effective January 1, 1905.

It is announced that David R. Francis, president of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition is to make a tour of the world to repay the visits of foreign dignitaries and to express the gratitude of St. Louis and the National Government for the liberality of foreign nations as exhibitors. Plans for the tour have not yet been made, but it will begin in the spring, as soon as the affairs of the exposition company set afloat.

The official figures for the attendance at the World's Fair were made public Monday. The total attendance was 19,410,723, and that for the closing day December 31, 1904: Recapitulation: April, one day, 187,793; May, twenty six days, 1,901,591; June, twenty six days, 2,124,839; July, twenty seven days, 2,343,557; Aug., twenty seven days, 3,088,743; Sept., twenty six days, 2,634,874; Oct., twenty seven days, 3,622,329; Nov., twenty six days, 2,517,485; December, one day, 233,001; total, 18,723,093.

St. Louis, (Special), Dec 9: The World's Fair has made, according to police, fire and hospital reports, not only a creditable showing but the lack of crime and casualties, not as compared with the Chicago and Buffalo expositions, thefts and figures are remarkable. There was more crime committed on the opening days at Chicago and Buffalo expositions than throughout the whole period here. Pickpockets and highwaymen operated extensively in both places, while Chief Detectives Desmond challenged anybody to take a single inch of change where twenty-seven days ago a highway robber had operated within the big iron fence that circles the 1,240 acres of exposition property. Following are the police and fire records at the Louisiana Purchase Exposition: Number of cases treated at the Emergency Hospital, 6,921; number of deaths, 1,403; number of amount of property lost and stolen, \$5,000; total number of thefts reported, 362; total number of prisoners arrested, 1,260; number of children lost, 1,091; total number of fire alarms responded to, 102; false alarms, 4; alarms sounded by persons thinking boxes mail boxes, 15; total damage done by fire, \$40,000; amount of counterfeit money confiscated, \$52.

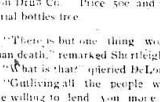
