The court of appeals in an opinion by Judge Stebbins affirmed the Lincoln circuit court in the case of Hiram Denham vs. the Commonwealth. Denham was sentenced for three years imprisonment on a charge of assaulting and robbing C. H. VanArsdale, the indictment being for "striking and wounding with intent to kill." The appeal was taken alleging that it was in competent to introduce evidence showing the result of trading by bloodhounds. The court held that the evidence was thoroughly good as it was thoroughly corroborated by other testimony. This sets precedents for dog testimony which is in many cases so reliable that what is heard from the witness stand.

One of the pleasantest episodes of the week was the meeting of Mr. William Jennings Bryan and Mr. Theodore Roosevelt in the White House, as it is another indication of cordial intent and the subsidence of that bitter feeling which politicians engender. Such meetings of leaders of opposing political forces are rare in history and cannot elsewhere be seen in modern times, except perhaps in England, and even there it is not as conspicuous as in this country.

According to Washington dispatches, one week Mr. Verkes, Internal Revenue Collector, is shaping his affairs to return to Kentucky in 1907 to make the race for governor, the next week he is to be appointed to some important judgeship, minister to some foreign country but the final report is that he, that the noted Kentuckian, is holding tight to what he already has, risking no uncertainties.

Both Democrats and Republicans seem to be falling over each other in their race to get there on the Railway rate regulation measure. Mr. Bryan's presence in Washington and his call at the White House may have done something to promote the great and harmonious stampede.

William J. Bryan called at the White House Saturday and had brief talk with President Roosevelt. At the close of the interview, Mr. Bryan said their talk had been "cordial and satisfactory."
The rapid increase in the number of ignorant negroes in Indiana has led to the introduction at Indianapolis of a proposed constitutional amendment to require that all voters shall be registered and shall be able to read and write the English language.

The birth anniversary of Gen. Robert E. Lee was generally observed throughout the South. At the celebration in Washington, Mr. Terrell, in the course of his remarks, strongly attacked President Roosevelt because of his published criticisms of Jefferson Davis.

Senator Smoot was put upon the stand in his own behalf in the Senate Committee. He refuted the charges introduced against him in many important particulars, declared that he never contemned polygamy since it was made unlawful in Utah, and while he believes it as a church tenet, he also believes in the strict observance of the law.

So the Republican members of the General Assembly are working hard to make the session a failure, and every one of them in the House, ready-made, are ready to assist the Democrats in the same. There seem to be a good many Democrats in the Legislature who are determined to make the session a failure, and unless they are allowed to do this without opposition, the Republicans have a good chance of making the session a failure. — Courier Journal.
