Information received here through members of the General Assembly from the counties of the district is that Madison county will have a candidate in the person of Judge Jere Sullivan, a Republican, Dick Miller, that Lincoln will present either Harvey Helm or Representative J. M. Alverston, that Garrard, has the bee in his bonnet, and that the Hon. L. H. Carter, of Anderson, is also a prospective starter. The latest possible starter is Attorney William J. Price, of the county of Boyle. Mr. Price is a young man qualified in every way to ably represent the district, and his friends here say, he is strongly backed when the race starts. He is a near relative of Col. Robert Evans, of Boyle, the county chairman, and has a host of influential friends in that end of the district. It is being urged that Boyle has had the Congress since the service of Judge Durham, nearly a quarter of a century ago. Attention having since that time gone continuously to Madison and Shelby, except for the brief time it was held by Mercer county, and the Republican from Lincoln, Mr. Price took a prominent part in the Gilbert-More fight at the Shelbyville convention last year. He held one more during the convention was suggested as a compromise candidate.—Courier-Journal.—[Mr. Gilbert has in every election told every man, woman and child in this district that he will not stand for a re-nomination. Why, he therefore asks, should he be nominated on this score?—Adds the editors of the Shelbyville Sentinel.]

Several of its members hold the record of having spoken continuously, with brief intervals for nourishment and sleep, for twenty four hours.

Notice was issued at Annapolis by the admiralty court that the fir class who are caught smoking will be dismissed.

Mr. and Mrs. George W. Dunville, of Vanhook, South Dakota are the parents of nine sets of triplets, all of them full of life.

There are 21 boys in Mr. Dunville's class of 42 years of age and Mrs. Dunville is 38.

The Interstate Commerce Commission assigned for the purpose of hearings in important cases. Oral argument will be kept April 10 in the differential case involving the question of differentials on railroads to the Atlantic ports.

While the West is in the throes of a blizzard, the South, emerging from a week of ice and snow, is not confronted with overworked streams, due to excessive rains and melting snows. Traffic is being interrupted by washouts and on some lines is suspended.

The worst blizzard the West has experienced in years swept down upon that section, and loss of much live stock resulted. In several cases persons died from exposure.

Railroad trains were stopped at Campagna, Va., because the mercury registered 20 below zero.

The Acting Governor says that Charles P. Brennan was asked to employ as counsel for the Haigges and Callahan in case the Court of Appeals decided they should be tried in Lexington. The principal ground of objection is that he was of counsel for Mr. Marcus in the big split here and that much of the evidence to be used in that trial was brought out by the plaintiffs in the big damage suits.

The breaking up of the ice gorge at Cincinnati resulted in much damage to property. One steamer sank another was carried down river in the ice, several others were badly damaged, and 150 barges were torn loose and sent down the river. They were loaded with coal and it is feared will prove a great calamity. Precautions were taken to prevent damage by the gorge at Louisville, two large towboats being ordered out under full head of steam with double crews to battle with the ice when it floats into the harbor.

A strange story of suicide comes from Ruddle's Mills, Bourbon county. J. H. Sharp, a young well-to-do farmer, died yesterday afternoon under suspicious circumstances after making a request that his autopsy be performed on his body by Dr. Keller. The doctor, on revealing the presence in the stomach of fifty-nine nails of different sizes and shapes. Sharp had been swallowing these nails for different times for a month, saying he wanted to commit suicide that way. The autopsy was performed in the presence of eight reputable witnesses.
