POLITICS AND POLITICIANS

Pres. Roosevelt has signed the bill making Collector Denton, of Danville, Ky., ineligible for re-election to his present office.

Representative Hearst has introduced a bill prohibiting interstate commerce in an article of labor of the sort for which the article is produced or controlled by a monopoly.

There is a new small prospect of the Public Buildings and Grounds bill being passed by the Senate. The bill has absolutely refused to allow a title for its consideration to be brought in.

The authorities of 17 States are said to be making inquiries concerning the Kansas situation, apparently a possible legislation of the character enacted by the Kansas Legislature on the oil question.

Hearing of testimony in the Peckody Adams gubernatorial contest at Dover, Colo. has closed. The result of the contest cannot be made known until the election in just session March 2, and it will then be determined how much time shall be allowed for argument.
