Four miles south of Crab Orchard, Saturday night, an attempt was made to cremate the body of Stevens. Mr. Stevens was awakened by the fire, which was burning briskly on the door step. While putting out the fire he was fired upon, the charge from a shot gun destroying his right eye and badly burning his face. On investigation it was discovered that the body of Stevens was found in the house, which was on the back side, was securely fastened and propped from the outside. Rags soaked in oil were found. In the house were two children and a sister of Stevens. Mrs. Taylor, Anthon's wife, was found, but it is alleged that she belonged to her husband, a near neighbor of Stevens. A warrant has been issued for Granville Taylor, charging him with the crime. Taylor was not seen apprehended.

George T. Lawson, of near Lancaster, a stock dealer, was arrested here Wednesday evening and lodged in jail for obtaining money under false pretense. Lawson came here over a week ago to buy some horses, and while here got a check cashed for \$25.00 by The Bank of Mt. Vernon, which went to protest. He bought while here last week three horses, one from Jones McKee for \$100, one of S. H. Mattie for \$85, and one from R. L. McFerron for \$65 and the checks which he gave for the horses also went to protest, but as the horses were put on pasture and not disposed of, these gentlemen will be able to get them back, without much loss. On Wednesday of this week Lawson again arrived in Mt. Vernon, by rail, carrying with him a saddle and bridle, presumably his intention to buy other horses. When asked by the cashier to make good the check for \$25, his only reply was that he only had money in the Lancaster bank. He was tried yesterday morning and held over to the Circuit Court under a bond of \$250 which he failed to give and was remanded to jail for safe keeping. As Mr. Lawson has always been a straightforward man in every particular, it is a little hard on his friends to understand the situation.

ADJOINING COUNTIES

The passenger office of the L. & N. at Middleboro, was robbed of \$225 Tuesday night. No clue to the guilty parties.

Suit has been filed against the First National Bank, of London for back taxes on \$50,000 for the years 1901-1902 and 1903.

The body of Constable Ben Jones was found in a hanging condition near the railroad tracks at London. It is thought that he was murdered and robbed before his body was placed on the railroad track for the purpose of hiding the crime.

Judge Reams, of London held George and Frank Ward and J. B. Landrum over on the charge of killing Jeff Goff at Pittsburg last week. Landrum is allowed bail in the sum of \$5,000, George Ward \$2,000, but Frank Ward is held without bail.

The Cumberland Railroad Co. has begun the work of grading its 12 mile extension up the valley of Brush creek, Knox county, and will fully develop the immense deposits of coal in that region. When the mines are fully developed several thousand men will be employed.

Gov. Beckham commuted from life imprisonment to two years the term of James Mize, of Laurel county, an inmate of the State penitentiary. Mize was sent in October 1903, upon conviction of having killed Elijah Whitaker. The judges of the court of appeals recommended clemency.

Fire of supposed incendiary origin was discovered in the basement of the old Seminary building, now the boys' dormitory of the Georgetown college, Monday morning. Hay was stuffed between the joists and crosspieces supporting the floor and set on fire. The blaze was extinguished before gaining much headway. This follows several attempts made recently to set fire to Rucker Hall, the girls' dormitory.

Editor W. P. Walton, who has been anxious to launch a newspaper at Frankfort or purchase the Kentucky Journal, has made a deal with the owners of the Journal, and will take charge of the sheet at once. He is one of the most fearless journalists in Kentucky and will, within a very short time, thoroughly rejuvenate the Journal.—Advocate.

J. Stone Walker, banker of Richmond of Madison county, was given an assignment Wednesday. His assets will go to nearly \$120,000, while his liabilities will fall far short of that amount. Mr. Walker has been in very poor health for some time and recently went to New Mexico, where he has large holdings, for his health.

Near Allen City, Floyd county one man was killed, one fatally wounded and one slightly wounded in a fight, says a report. The trouble was brought about by a quarrel; it is said, between Joe Maggard and Kit Stone. Maggard was shot three times and killed by Stone, and Stone was shot twice and fatally wounded by Maggard. Young Combs, a bystander, was slightly hurt.

A meeting of the Stockholders and Directors of the Cumberland & Nashville Railroad Company was held at Burnside, and it was definitely determined to begin the construction of the proposed railroad from Corbin to Nashville, the coming summer, and a contract was authorized to be entered into with a Cincinnati construction company at once for the building of 20 miles of the road from Burnside to Monticello, via Mill Springs.—Somerset Journal.

NEWS ITEMS

Mr. Henry Anthon is under arrest at Columbus, O. on the charge of poisoning her two children.

An earthquake in England caused alarm throughout Derbyshire and Yorkshire and in adjacent districts. Little damage resulted.

In a speech at Calabozo, President Castro, of Venezuela, intimated that if by war against his republic is being planned he is ready for it.

The eleventh annual meeting of the Lake and Hook Conference of International Arbitration will be held at Mohank Lake, May 31-June 2.

Pope Pius X received many Easter greetings and celebrated mass in the presence of a large number of persons, to whom he gave communion.

The beef packers are said to have a record of the testimony before the Federal grand jury in Chicago and declare it is not strong enough to warrant indictment.

The anti-boycott bill passed by the Colorado Legislature was signed by Gov. McDonald. Violation of its provisions is punishable by fine or imprisonment, or both.

The Wabash may go to court to obtain one-fourth of the west-bound tonnage of the United States Steel Corporation, said to have been promised to enter Pittsburg.

The health report for March shows sanitary conditions in the isthmian canal zone to be steadily improving.—During the month the death rate was only fourteen in a thousand. There were only four cases of yellow fever, whereas there were twelve cases the previous month.

President Burris A. Jenkins, of the Kentucky University, has received a letter from Andrew Carnegie stating that the latter will give \$25,000 for the erection of a science building for that college, provided that the authorities of the institution can raise the like amount of new endowment.

J. Wilcox Brown, of Maryland who holds a \$25,000 policy in the Equitable Life Assurance Society, issued in 1867, filed a suit Tuesday asking for the appointment of a receiver for the company. His attorneys issued a statement pointing out what they consider evidence of serious mismanagement of policyholders.

The low price paid by the Standard Oil Company for crude-oil has led to renewed agitation regarding the establishment of independent refineries in Kentucky. Local capitalist with extensive interests in the upper and lower fields are establishing a refinery at Georgetown, and will make illuminating oil and asphalt.

Taking of testimony in the third trial of Wm. Patterson, accused of the murder of Cassius Young, was begun in New York Tuesday. The prosecutor's father was not at her side in court, the trial judge having ruled that any scene tending to excite the sympathy of the jury must be avoided. At the conclusion of the prosecutor's opening statement Miss Patterson almost fainted, and the trial had to be suspended until she was restored.

An interesting story is told of an inserted comma which cost the United States Government \$2,000,000. When the United States Congress was drafting the tariff bill, the comma in one section of the articles to be admitted on the free list. Among these were "all foreign fruit-plants." The copying clerk, by his superior wisdom, omitted the hyphen and inserted a comma after "fruit," so that the clause read, "all foreign fruit, plants, etc." The mistake could not be rectified for about a year, and during this time all oranges, lemons, bananas, grapes and other foreign fruits were admitted free duty, with the consent of the Government to at least \$2,000,000 for that year.

### OVER THE WORLD.

A man charged in a London police court with carrying a pistol said he had bought it for "self-protection," as he was "going to America." He was sympathetically discharged.

Japan has 4,567 postoffices and 51,347 letter-boxes. It ranks in this matter next to Germany, the United States, France and Great Britain. The number of letters forwarded last year was 205,000,000; of postal cards, 483,000,000.

Many of the British soldiers suffered greatly from snow-blindness in Tibet. The native Tibetans escape snow blindness, as do the inhabitants in other snowy parts of the world, by greasing the face and then blackening the skin all round the eyes with a burnt stick.

Recent excavations in Egypt have revealed a home, dated A. D. 100 - representing a slave for two years in the "semigraph," to be taught to read and write shorthand, or "this sign that your son Dionysios knows." The teacher receiving in all 120 drachmas - about \$3.

In the London Times of recent date there was a cablegram from Colombo, Ceylon, in which the statement is made that Sir A. J. Blake had announced, at a meeting of the Asiatic society, that Singapore medical books of the sixteenth century recorded 67 varieties of mosquitoes and 42 kinds of malarial fever caused by mosquitoes.

From inquiries it appears that both the medical men and the poor law guardians who come in contact with many lunacy cases, are firmly of the opinion that life is responsible for an undue proportion of the increase in lunacy, which is costing London rate payers an enormous sum of money every year. A woman inspector in a working class district was emphatic upon this point.

In Paraguay the women are in proportion of seven to one as compared with the men. The consequence is that the men are taken the greatest care of, and everything which is unpleasant or might be risky to the life of a man is done by the women. The streets are cleaned, ships are loaded, oxen driven by them, and it is even said that they have taken part in their country's wars, acting as substitutes for their men folk.

Every postmaster in the United States has orders to notify postpaid. Should counterfeits always be discovered on mail matter they be held for postage, and not delivered until the name and location of the sender of the package or letter are discovered.

Spain collecting France gives employment to thousands of people in the neighborhood of mail folds, and while business engages it, earning a good living. The collectors set out at daybreak, carrying big baskets and iron hooks. They scratch along the foot of hedge rows and under the ivy covering of trees and walls. With luck a good collector can secure from 1,000 to 1,500 snails a day, which means a weight of from 20 to 30 pounds. This earns about \$1.25 each day, which is good for those localities.

The new railway station to be at Leipzig Germany, will, it is expected cost \$37,500,000, and be the largest in the world.

Frank G. Bigelow, anti-Monday president of the First National Bank of Milwaukee, was arrested Monday night on the charge of embezzlement, and was held to the Federal grand jury in bond of \$15,000. Bigelow's arrest followed his confession before a meeting of the directors of the bank, in which he admitted he was a defaulter to the extent of \$1,450,000, the money having been lost in speculation. The directors of the bank decided to make good the shortage and steps were taken to prepare for the run on the bank. At the closing hour Monday afternoon nearly \$1,000,000 had been paid out to depositors, and more than 2,000 persons were waiting at the doors clamoring for their money. Bigelow was arrested on the charge of manipulating the bank's books by the assistant cashier, Henry G. Goll, and a warrant has been issued for Goll's arrest.

IN THE STATE. The body of Mrs. Carrie E. Evans, a pauper, was found under the railroad tracks at the foot of North St. in Louisville. It is believed the fall of the treacle while intoxicated. Col. E. L. Muttley, assessor for the Bank of P. J. Potter's Sons, of Bowling Green, made bond Saturday and assumed charge. The institution had more than 6,000 deposits, and the deposits exceeded \$100,000. Local capitalists with extensive interests in the paper and lower fields are establishing a refinery at Georgetown, and will make them plant and asphalt.

The Goebel Monument Commission approved the selection of C. H. Fiehau, a sculptor of New York, to execute the bronze figure of the late Governor which is to be part of the monument. It is expected that the monument will be completed not later than September or October next. The commission has on hand the sum of \$15,135.51.

James Hargis took the stand in his own behalf and denied all connection with the killing of James Cockrill, Town Marshal, of Jackson County. He made a sweeping denial of statements made by Messrs. Feltner, Felix Feltner and John Feltner in connection with the prosecution. He said that the \$1,500 given to Felix Feltner was in the nature of a loan, Feltner executing a note for the amount. This note and the check were presented as evidence by Hargis.

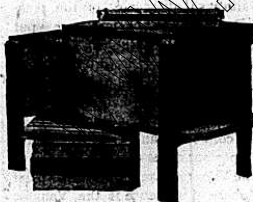

## NEWS ITEMS

M. Delcasse, the French Foreign Minister, has reconsidered his determination to resign and will remain in the Cabinet. This decision was reached after he had received assurances that the other members of the Cabinet approved his foreign policy. It is expected that as a result of the incident he will assume a firmer attitude toward Germany in regard to the Morocco question. His effort to resign has been very generally construed as a triumph for Germany, and the feeling in Paris is more acute in consequence. The Cabinet's course in giving united support to M. Delcasse insures him strong and material backing in carrying out his Moroccan policy.

The Gates bull clique corner in May wheat collapsed in Chicago Saturday with a wholesale sacrifice of profits to escape possible huge losses. The closing price of May wheat was \$1, against \$1.24 six weeks ago. The general opinion is that Gates and his friends emerged from the deal with little, if any, actual financial loss. It is estimated that fully 5,000,000 bushels of the May delivery were unloaded in Chicago and Minneapolis during the day. There was a steady buying movement in July options and rumors were afloat of another corner with Armour and other leading traders as the chief manipulators.

Bound hand and foot and tied to a tree, the body of a stranger, was found near Big Ugly, W. Va. with a knife through his heart and his throat cut.

At the conclusion of a conference between former Judge Wing and Mrs. Chadwick at the county jail the latter stated that it had been decided not to offer bail until after the final hearing of the bankruptcy proceedings against her on May 2. Mrs. Chadwick declared that she was prepared to give the required \$52,000 surety at any time. She said that at this hearing she would give all possible information that would in any way aid her creditors.

According to the Toledo Times, the Hollfus-Zimmerman syndicate, in control of the Great Central lines, is gradually acquiring, by purchase or lease, new lines of railway, which will give them control of one of the most important systems in the world. The unrest in Russia grows and the authorities are exerting every influence to delay the outbreak. The empire is declared to be one vast area of intimidation at the hands of the police and soldiery. Meetings of all kinds are broken up, houses are visited, and arrests by scores and hundreds are made in all parts of the empire. More troops are being poured into St. Petersburg, where, as elsewhere, demonstrations are planned for the Raster holiday and May Day.

The Russian squadron left Kamranh Bay at noon Saturday. That

night heavy cannonading was heard out at sea, and it is conjectured that Rojstvensky met with some of Togo's scouts which were lying outside. Japan is discreetly silent as to the whereabouts of Togo's fleet, and Russia asserts that Rojstvensky has given no intimation of his plans or destination. Three warships, presumably Japanese, are off Corregidor Island, at the entrance to Manila Bay. Togo's main fleet, it is reported, will assemble south of Formosa April 26. Vice Admiral Kamimura's squadron is hourly expected outside Manila harbor. Japan is pleased with France's prompt enforcement of neutrality, but the Paris newspapers assert that the republic has treated its ally too harshly.

## NEWS WORTH KNOWING.

The children of the United States each year consume toys that cost at retail \$45,000,000.

Lloyd's Register of British and Foreign Shipping, just issued, states that during 1904, exclusive of warships, 712 vessels of 1,205,192 tons gross (613 steamers of 1,171,373 tons and 99 sailing vessels of 33,787 tons) were launched in the United Kingdom. This output of mercantile tonnage shows the slight increase of about 15,000 tons over that of 1903, and, with the exception of the latter year, is the lowest since 1897.

On the Prince Oscar, of the Scandinavian-American line, which recently arrived from Genoa, Rev. Paschal Robinson, of St. Francis' R. C. Church, was the only first-class cabin passenger. At his disposal was a suite consisting of practically all the first-class accommodation on a fine 7,000 ton ship. A dozen or more stewards stood ready at any moment to answer his beck and call. What he should eat was the care and concern of the chief and his large force of assistants.

A meeting of the paper and wood pulp manufacturers of Canada was held in Montreal a few days ago, at which it was unanimously resolved that, in the interests of the dominion, and especially of the province of Quebec, every effort should be made to obtain legislation to prohibit the export of logs and pulp wood. A special committee was appointed for the purpose of preparing a petition to lay before parliament, now in session at Ottawa.

China will be gridironed with railways if all or most of the present railroad schemes are put through. One English syndicate proposes to put a girdle around Shanghai, connecting nine important cities with the market of Shanghai. Another English scheme is to connect Hankow with several important cities north and south of the Yangtze river. England's chief sphere of influence is the Yangtze valley, with its immense wealth of mineral deposits—chiefly iron, and anthracite and bituminous coal.

What bids fair to become a great and important industry in the coast country of Texas is the cultivation of tea. The farm on which the government is conducting an experiment with tea culture is near Mackay, Wharton county, and is under the direction of Fred W. Clark. According to Mr. Clark, 25 acres were planted in tea plants. The scions were set in rows five feet apart and two feet on the row. The first year they attained a growth of two feet. This spring they were cut back one foot in order to make them bush.
