A Republican President has called attention to the fact that the tariff schedules must be lowered to secure a "square deal" to all American citizens, "because the present high rates are being used in the protection of the hogs with their feet in the trough," as the President terms them—to rob American consumers while foreigners are reaping the benefit of the self denial practised by the American people to build up their "infant" industries. A Republican President, in appointing out the railroads and that justice cannot be insured to all equally as long as these public highways are dominated by a few individuals or corporations. A Republican President has demanded a statute which shall compel the managers of political campaigns to make public the list of the contributors to their campaign funds, so that the people may know who supports the respective candidates and to whom they are obligated. These remember are the demands of a Republican President. If the Republican party is not all that the Democrats have charged the way is open for the party to prove it by responding to the demand of its own President.

POLITICS AND POLITICIANS

We are told that Congressman Edwards has "opened the door of hope" to a colored man at Altamont by recommending him for the postoffice.—London Local. W. L. Douglas, the Democratic Governor of Massachusetts, who received a plurality in the election last fall when Roosevelt carried the State by an overwhelming vote, has announced that he will not be a candidate for reelection, as he has little taste for public office and prefers the quietude of private life. It is believed at Washington that the President is almost persuaded to abandon the idea of calling Congress together in extra session. President and Mrs. Roosevelt's annual Memorial Day tribute to the memory of the late President McKinley was a wreath of pink and white roses. Editor Harry McNulty, of the Jessamine Journal, received the nomination for Representative in Democratic primary in that county Thursday. He is for Blackburn for Senator.

ADJOINING COUNTIES

London Citizens will vote on a graded school June 23. A company is to be organized at Somerset to furnish the town with natural gas. George W. Pulliam, of Shelby City, has been made master and editor of the Somerset Mountaineer. The Louisville & Nashville railroad is building a round house at Corbin. It is rumored that the shops at Covington will be removed to Corbin.

At Otter Creek in Clay county, A. Edwards shot and killed Thomas Frederick and a son-in-law of Frederick. A feud is expected as the result of the killing.

In the mines at Pittsburg Friday, Peter Baxter, Sanford Dyer and Robert Brown, white, while operating machinery, were hurt by falling slate. Brown and Dyer are thought to be fatally hurt. Baxter will recover.

In the Breathitt Circuit Court Friday, the case against Sam Jett and Sam Fields were transferred to Lee county, and the case of Mose Felner charged with the murder of Jesse Fields, was transferred to Estill county.

A feature of the Whitley County Circuit Court is the case of the Commonwealth against a man charged with stealing a box of Bacon worth \$28. The case has cost the State over \$1,000 and the defense perhaps an equal amount. Ground has been broken at Williamsburg for the erection of a handsome college building. In fact, it will be one of the finest educational structures in Eastern Kentucky. The nucleus, to which other funds have been added, was a donation from the American Missionary Association, an organization under the guidance of the Congregational church. Some time ago, the academy under the protection of the church, was burned at Williamsburg, and it was decided to erect a building of a more pretentious type, enlarge the facilities and raise the standard of the school.

IN THE STATE

A battery of light artillery will be organized at Paducah. The village of Hodgenville will put in a \$15,000 waterworks plant. The Shelbyville Home Telephone Co., went into the hands of a receiver Friday.

The Old Fiddlers' Reunion of Nicholas county will be held at Carlisle June 10th. Mayfield will vote on a \$100,000 bond issue for street improvement and sewers. The non-union insurance agents of the State will meet at Olympia Springs June 8th.

The survey of the new electric road from Shelbyville to Milton has been completed. Mr. and Mrs. John Haley, of near Midway, both died Thursday from the effects of eating poisoned meat.

The State Board of Equalization has raised the assessed valuation lands in Fayette county ten per cent.

The Kentucky Homeopathic Medical Society met in Louisville Thursday, with fifty members in attendance.

The County Farm of Scott county paid a profit to the county of \$500 in excess of expenditures.

James Mason, in jail at Elkton, charged with calling a horse, tried to commit suicide by drinking a pint of coal oil.

The Beattyville Bank, a State institution, has been changed to the Beattyville National Bank, with a capital stock of \$25,000 paid up. County Attorney O'Donnell has filed suit in the Mason Circuit Court against Superintendent of Schools Well to compel him to pay the county the \$5,000 he paid attorneys who won the suit for the American Book Company. O'Donnell claims Wells had no right to employ attorneys.

At Richmond Monday afternoon Bud White, a negro, became involved in a dispute with chief marshall Becksted, of the Louisville and Albany workshops, and fired at him. The bullet struck James Anderson and Everett Green, two workmen, who were standing near by, and both were dangerously wounded.

Last week an unusual initiatory ceremony transpired in the Masonic Lodge in Carlisle. The Advocate says: "Howard Keene Veatch, who was twenty one years old on the 22nd, son of Sam K. Veatch, was given the Entered apprentice degree with his father as Worshipful Master, his mother's oldest brother—Dr. S. R. Fisher—as Senior Deacon, her youngest brother—C. H. Fisher—Senior Warden, his grandfather, eighty years of age, was to have vacated as Junior Warden but illness prevented. Old members say it was the most impressive ceremony ever witnessed in a lodge."

Answer to J. N. Brown's question, as to why we invert divisor in division of fractions, as for example: If we wish to divide 75 by 3/4, the fraction is divided by and multiplying its denominator, we multiply the denominator of the dividend 75, by the numerator of the divisor, which is 3; 75x3=225. We have now divided the fraction by 3, but that is 100 large as the required division is 75 and 3/4 is the time 3/4, consequently, we multiply the numerator of the fraction, then we have 225x3/4=168 3/4.
