FOR MAGISTRATE

We are authorized to announce GRANVILLE LEECE as a candidate for Magistrate in the Fifth district composed of Brown and Broadhead voting precincts subject to the action of the Democrats of that district.

A convention of the Fifth Magisterial district has been called to meet in Brodhead, Saturday June 17, for the purpose of nominating a Democratic candidate for Magistrate in that district. Squire Granville Leece, the present incumbent, the only announced candidate, seems to be the most available man for the place and in every particular the most logical candidate: His services during the past years have been creditable both to himself and his constituency. It has been generally conceded all the while, that he will not have any opposition for the nomination and opposition in the final race would be of no avail.

LILLIAN RUSSELL is writing a magazine article on "How to Keep Husbands." Judging by her experience she is about as qualified to write on that subject as some magazine writers are qualified to write on the subjects they select.

No one can blame a Russian officer who surrendered from refusing a parole. He knows that he is better off in Japan than at home.

ACCORDING to Dr. Parkhurst, Philadelphia is the worst city in the Union and New York makes a good second.

A long, loud cry has gone up from Russia for peace abroad as well as at home.

POLITICS AND POLITICIANS

It was announced at the White House that the President would start on his Southern trip on October 17, and that the extraordinary session of Congress which he proposes calling will not begin until after the elections in November.

According to a Washington story Justice Harlan is said to have expressed a desire to resign from the Supreme bench and accept the Republican nomination for Governor of Kentucky, with the intention of rounding out his career as Governor of his native State.

President Roosevelt has communicated to Gov. Douglas, of Massachusetts, his wish that no official reception be tendered him when he visits Boston to attend the Harvard commencement exercises. The President's purpose is to avoid the necessity of meeting Gov. Miles.

CIVIL SERVICE Commissioner Greene will resign as the last of this month, and it is understood that he will make a thorough investigation of every Federal office in the State presided over by a presidential appointee. It is alleged that the officeholders are mixing too much in politics. Some think the investigation is a move toward rejecting several officeholders for reappointment.

Chief Justice Hobson, Tuesday reversed the decisions of the Franklin Circuit Court in the primary election contest cases of E. H. Taylor, Jr., against the Democratic Executive Committee of Franklin county, and ruled that a court cannot order a recount of the ballots cast in a primary election, but by mandamus or otherwise, control the discretion of a party committee in proceeding to bear a contest for a nomination. The court also held that a court cannot by writ of certiorari being the ballot boxes and records of a primary before it, as it has no power to review the action of a party committee in a contest, the judgment being final. The court also ruled that in legislative contests the contestant has fifteen days in which to file notice of contest. In the case of T. J. Hill vs J. F. Harden and others involving the Democratic nomination for Sheriff, the judgment of the Lincoln Circuit Court was reversed, and the Appellate Court ruled that the limit for filing contest for county office other than legislator, is ten days, and if not filed in that time the committee is without jurisdiction.

ADJOINING COUNTIES

Robert C. Boggs, one of Madison county's most prominent farmers, dropped dead at the supper table while asking blessing.

Commonwealth's Attorney John R. Allen, of Fayette county, will make an effort to have James and Alex. Hargis indicted for perjury on the testimony given by them concerning the note to the Winchester bank for \$1,500.

Police Judge A. B. Steele, of Hyden, refused to receive Mosie B. Felton when the prisoner was brought to Hyden on a warrant charging him with robbery, and said he knew nothing about the warrant, which purported to have been issued by him.

Felix Feltner was found guilty of contempt of court at Winchester and the jury fixed his punishment at hard labor in the county jail and assessed a fine of \$5,000. Feltner was placed in jail. A motion will be made for a new trial. There is no time for the trial of the other contempt cases at this term of court, and a special term will be called for September to try the Hargises and B. F. French.

Near Lee City Wolfe county. Sunday afternoon, in a field battle, one man was instantly killed, two more will die and four are wounded. The shooting was the result of an old feud and occurred at a picnic. Andrew Wilson is dead, Henry Freeman and Harlan Dykes mortally wounded, and James Dykes, Lee Allen, John and Letcher Davis received wounds more or less serious. Henry Freeman was shot thirteen times.

NEWS ITEMS

The Rev. J. F. Milbank, pastor of the First Episcopal church, here, has decided to retire from the pulpit and go to the stage.

The plea to have the case of Caleb Powers transferred from the Scott county Circuit Court to the United States Court was heard at Maysville Thursday by Judge Cochran of the United States Court.

William J. Bryan, a trustee for the late Philip Sherman Bennett, of Connecticut, has sent Gov. Kentucky a check for \$400 for the Kentucky State College, it being a part of the \$10,000 left by Mr. Bennett to be given to colleges to be invested in a prize fund.

The all-Russian Zemstvo Congress, the delegates to which included the Mayors of twenty-five of the largest cities, met in Moscow Tuesday notwithstanding Government prohibition and resolved with practical unanimity to demand the convocation of a Zemstvo congress and the submission to it of the question of peace or war. The morning and afternoon sessions of the Congress were held without interference on the part of the authorities, though the afternoon session, which assembled in an open hall, adjoining a private house.

President Roosevelt has spoken a word for peace in the Peace East. In a conference with Count Cassini, the Russian Ambassador, at the White House, the President frankly expressed the opinion that Russia's cause was hopeless and that a further prolongation of the war would only increase the demands on Japan. What will be the effect of the President's action will not be known until the Emperor has given it consideration. Count Cassini expressed the personal opinion that the "psychological moment" for the discussion of peace had not arrived, and added that Japan's terms, as published unofficially, were "impossible."

As a result of the meeting of the Council of Ministers at Tarrsoko Selo, it was decided to telegraph instructions to the Russian ambassadors at Washington and Paris to the effect that Russia is desirous of ascertaining Japan's terms of peace. It is believed in diplomatic circles in Washington that preliminary negotiations are under way and that President Roosevelt will act as the friendly channel of communication. There is no official admission yet that Russia has accepted the "offer of good will" of the President, but instructions to Count Cassini are believed to have reached Washington at a late hour last night. Minister Takahira held another conference at the White House and later in the evening prepared a lengthy dispatch to the Japanese Government. Ambassador Meyer has called on the Russian Emperor with a tender of assistance toward bringing about peace, but had no reported result to the President up to a late hour.
