### HOT SPRING, N. C.

The town (H. S.) has grown up here since the war and as I before stated contains some handsome buildings. The Springs Hotel and other attractions, the parks, walks and beautiful shades are among the things on earth that each high up into the magnificent board there is a \$16 per day for transients. Some other good houses in the town run by very accommodating proprietors at \$5 per week, or \$1 per day for transients, and a few boarding houses at cheaper rates. All, so far as I am informed, furnish plenty of good wholesome fare.

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The system of collecting fares in the City of Mexico differs radically from that employed in this country, as a ship is handed by the conductor to each passenger as far as recent. This receipt shows the date, amount of fare and direction of trip, bears a serial number, and must be retained by the passenger until the end of his ride as proof that he has paid his fare. The company has 17 different rates of fare, varying from 3 cents to 20 cents (Mexican), and being divided between first and second class. On the city lines there are no second-class cars or fares, the city rate being 6 cents, which at the present rate of exchange amounts to a half cent less than 3 cents U. S. The tickets of the paper upon which the tickets are printed are changed each month, and this fact, together with the practice of varying the progressive enumeration of the tickets among the 17 different rates of fare, makes counterfeiting practically impossible. No transfers are given. As an incentive to each passenger to retain his fare receipt, the company has just announced the establishment of a lottery, the tickets of which will be the fare receipts issued by the conductors. Lotteries, as is well known, are exceedingly popular in Mexico, and in all other Latin countries, and in this case the sanction of the Government has been secured. The object of having the passenger retain his receipt is to "keep tabs" on the conductor. The highest prize in the lottery is \$10,000.

105 YEARS AGO.

How our people lived, acted, wrote, spoke and died 105 years ago. From the Ulster County N. Y. Gazetteer, Vol. 11, No. 38, Saturday Jan. 4th, 1800.

American Congress--The day 1 December 10th, 1799--Upon the hour having arrived which the Vice President appointed, Mr. Speaker attended by the members present proceeded to the President's house to present him their address in answer to his speech on the opening of the present session, and having returned the President's reply, there to was read as follows:

Gentlemen of the House of Representatives--This very special address from the Representatives of the people &c. &c. etc. United States. JOHN ADAMS Dec. 10, 1799. And then the House adjourned until to-morrow morning 11 o'clock. Mr. Josiah Parker and Mr. Robert Figg from Virginia, appeared on Monday were qualified and took their seats.

WASHINGTON REMEMBERED.

Georgetown, Dec. 20, 1799. On Wednesday last, the mortal part of Washington the friend of his country and the friend of man, was assigned to the tomb, with solemn honors and funeral pomp. A multitude of persons assembled for many miles round, at Mt. Vernon, the choice abode and last resting place of the illustrious Chief. There were the groves, the spacious avenues, the beautiful and sublime scenes, the noble mansion but almost unvisited by the inhabitant was now no more. That great soul was gone. His mortal part was there indeed, but how affecting! How awful the spectacle of such worth and greatness, thus to mortal eyes fallen! fallen! fallen!

In the long and lofty portico, where of the hero walked in all his glory, now lay the shrouded corpse. The countenance still compressed and serene, seemed to depress the dignity of the spirit, which lately dwelt in that lifeless form! There those who paid the last and honors to the benefactor of his country, took an impressive--a farewell view. The ornament at the head of the coffin was inscribed, "Signe of judicium--about the middle of the coffin, Gloria deo--and on the sides, gloria."

General Washington.

Deparied this life, on the 14 Dec. 1799, at 66. Between the hours of 1 o'clock the sound of artillery from a vessel in the river, firing minute guns, a wofe arose and solemn sorrow the corps was viewed. Bands of music with mournful melody melted the soul with all the tenderness of woe.

On the 13th the Austro-Russians were defeated at Glarus, with the loss of 1,200 prisoners, besides a great number killed. At this place there were 1,400 Russians wounded and 600 at Mitter.

The French army of the Rhine, about the 8 Oct. defeated the Austrians with the loss of 3,000 killed and wounded.
