Japan has a national debt of more than 900,000,000 and the Russian national debt is close to the four-billion dollar mark.

A Maine newspaper inadvertently got the headline "News about Lobsters" over the "local mention" or persons about prominent citizens.

The largest Dante library in the world is that of Leonidas Leonelli in Udine, Italy. It comprises more than 9,000 publications in all languages relating to the poet.

The London Express gives its word among the latest inventions patented is a contrivance which, fitted to an ordinary sewing machine, will fix and message the operator while she is working.

Officers started from Ogden, Utah, Sunday night for Gettysburg, Ky., with Perry Ritter, the confessed wife murderer. Later will be kept handcuffed to the officers for fear of an attempt at suicide.

During the laying of a cornerstone in Pittsburg a platform collapsed and five hundred people were precipitated fifteen feet into a cellar. Many were hurt, but it is believed that no fatal injuries occurred.

Louisville are in the lead in competition for Cuban trade and are getting their full share of business, according to the Southern railway's representative in Havana, who was in Louisville Monday night.

Edward A. Conger, of Iowa, has resigned his position as ambassador to Mexico to take effect October 15. David E. Thompson, of Nebraska, present Ambassador to Brazil, is mentioned as his probable successor.

Lashed by a guilty conscience for years and confronted with the near approach of death, Mrs. John Lynch, of Bloomington, Ind., confessed to her sister that twenty years ago she murdered her three-year-old daughter because the child was in the way.

The British army council has decided to discontinue the experiment of providing recruits with artificial teeth. The soldiers would not pay for their teeth as agreed, out of their pay of 25 cents a day, and when the military authorities tried to make them they were rejected and all.

It is claimed at Manila that a well authenticated case where leprosy was cured occurred there. After the patient's death from another cause, bacteriologists examined the remains but could not find a trace of leprosy.

An excursion train carrying negroes, plunged through an open drawbridge near Norfolk, Va., and it is believed that fifty persons were drowned. Two white men promoters of the excursion, were among the victims.

In a desperate fight in Powell county near Clay City Saturday night Tom Morton was slashed seventeen times with a knife by Campbell Anderson, and instantly killed. Anderson and Cale Morton were also probably fatally hurt.

There are in all 60 members in the imperial family of Japan including five of a married and four widowed princesses, who are members of the family by marriage, not by birth. Of the rest there are 11 married and 16 unmarried princesses, inclusive of the Mikado, and 18 unmarried princesses.

Fred Miller, John Miller and Fred Johnson were shot from ambush near Hartman Junction Saturday morning. The shooting is believed to have been the result of a feud, and members of the Rawlings faction, with which the men shot had trouble of long standing, are suspected of the crime.

The recent school census shows that in Kentucky there are 735,349 children of the school age and the State will this year pay for their tuition \$2,420,896.80. More care is being taken to see that children who are not entitled to be on the school list are kept off and in consequence there are fewer children reported this year than last.

The South African gold mines have recovered from the effects of the Boer war as shown by the output for July. The total production for that month is stated to be 425,000 ounces, valued at \$9,031,250, as compared with that of June of \$8,757,060. Previous to the war the highest record of the Rand production was \$9,604,000 in August 1895.

Only two of the St. Petersburg newspapers speak of the new Russian assembly project with any degree of enthusiasm. Others, while half heartedly admitting that it makes for improvement, freely criticize the limitations of the powers of the assembly.

A storm has been raised in Alabama by Booker Washington's act in dining with John Wabamaker and daughter at Saratoga. A large element of the State press declares that Washington's infidelity is a scandal, and some influential citizens of the State, members of the board of trustees of Tuskegee Institute, threaten to withdraw both moral and financial support from the institution. Washington has published in a Birmingham a denial and explanation of the Saratoga story.

The feature of the proposition which Pauline Rooder submitted through Baron Rosen Saturday was based upon the principle of arbitration. Whether the proposition contemplated arbitration of all the articles upon which the peace envoys have failed to agree is not known, but it is considered probable that it relates only to indemnity, not to indemnity and the cessation of the Island of Sakhalin. It is not known whether a similar proposition has been placed before the Japanese commissioners. It is now believed that the issue will not necessarily be decided at Tuesday's session and that the meetings may adjourn from day to day until the Russian Emperor's final answer is given.

Pessimists who declare that the world is growing worse and that there are no honest men, are cited to a case in Barren county. In 1857 W. W. Palmore loaned Martin Skaggs of Elmton county, \$100. Skaggs was a quite young man and at the beginning of the Civil War enlisted. Palmore heard that Skaggs was killed and gave up his \$100 as lost. The incident had passed out of his mind till a day or two ago Skaggs appeared at the home of Palmore and said he was ready to pay that note. Palmore didn't know him and did he recall the loan. Skaggs insisted on paying it with 10 per cent interest, but Palmore declined to accept more than 6 and that rate of interest was finally agreed on. The note with interest for 48 years

NO GAMBLING—MANAGEMENT OF THE KENTUCKY STATE FAIR PROHIBITS GAMES OF CHANCE There will be no gambling allowed at the big Kentucky State Fair to be held at Lexington, September 18-24. The Board of Control is endeavoring to place the fair on the highest possible plane, and hence declined the number of large monetary offers for gambling privileges which were forwarded to it. This announcement will be greeted with pleasure and approval by the people of the whole State. Some previous fairs held in Kentucky, and some of the good fairs held at Lexington, have been characterized by certain games of chance that could not be regarded otherwise than as reprehensible, and this decision of the Board of Control not to allow any such devices on the grounds of the State Fair will add to the respect in which the big exhibition will be held.

There will, however be plenty of sources of varied amusements. The attractions of the Heck World's Fair and the Carnival Company are of a high class and possess features of the greatest interest. Several of them are shows that were among the most successful given on the "Ripe" during the World's Fair at St. Louis last summer and will be reproduced at Lexington exactly as given at St. Louis.

The famous Duss band of forty odd pieces will also be a feature of interest. It is one of the greatest musical aggregations ever gotten together, the hobby of a man of millions who leads a band because he loves it more than any other occupation in which he could engage. The people of the State will one accord will approve of the decision to allow no gambling at the State Fair, and those who want excitement and amusement and recreation will have it abundantly supplied in much more healthy ways.

There will be seven sessions, each devoted to some particular branch of agriculture, horticulture, manufacturing, river improvement, and roads, minerals, forestry, immigration, etc. In fact everything in which the people of the state are most interested will be discussed.
