Dunn's weekly review of trade for last week begins with these words: Assurance of prosperity for 1905 has been established in all departments of trade and industry. Contracts are placed for payment of very large and commercial payments are more prompt. It is the old familiar story. When the great agricultural interests of the United States go to good crops all other interests prosper. The owner of railroad stocks and bonds is in better humor because his property is commensurate with the good crops from the farms; the manufacturer is happy because he sees lots of sturdy fellows with money in their pockets who want his wares, and are ready to pay for them; the banker and the mercantile leaders know that they are going to get their money back, the wholesale jobber and the retail merchant find sales easy and payment prompt. Everything seems to be going on as if the good crops and selling them for good prices.

Every week there are bunches of good lots of cattle at the stock yards which sell above \$2 per hundred. Inquiry into their breeding and feeding invariably reveals the fact that they are good stock from pure bred sires, and that the feeding has been carefully conducted to develop them rapidly. An instance at point is that of the yearling in this line of an excellent farmer near Heyworth, Illinois, Mr. J. O. Davis. He is one of the best cattle feeders in the country. A few days ago he sold six car loads at the yards, which he led to a finish on his own farm. His prime Polled Angus steers, 18 in number, averaged 1,368 pounds, and sold at \$6.50 per hundred. Another lot of high grades brought \$6.30, and still another lot of grades sold at \$6.25. Attention is called to these cattle to show what painstaking both in breeding and feeding will do. On the same day these cattle were sold there were finer fatsteers sold at \$5.60. The difference in quality was that the latter were not well bred, not fed and lacked the thick meat which sells highest.—Indiana Farmer.

In these words William J. Bryan administered a check to the enthusiasm which at the Jefferson Club banquet given this week in Mr. Bryan's honor greeted the speeches exhorting his nomination for the third time for President.

There had been warm words of praise for Mr. Bryan, particularly from Congressman Olin M. James, of Kentucky, and Judge J. P. Far- of Covington, Ky., who had declared unqualifiedly for Mr. Bryan as the Democratic nominee for President in 1908, and from Alexander Troup, New Haven, Conn., who declared that Bryan was the natural and legitimate leader of the Democratic party in the coming campaign.

"I am not now," said Mr. Bryan, "a candidate for any office, but I want to say now that talk of candidacy for office does not affect me as it once did. I believe that my place in history will be determined not by what the people are able to do for me, but by what I am able to do for the people. I think it is time before that time comes to name a man for the next presidential race that I may be chosen for the party who will be able to do for the party more than I have yet been able to do."

The town of Lancaster, seeing the great need of an additional passenger train over their line, purport a united effort, sent their delegation before the officials at Louisville, and the result is, that they will have four passenger trains passing through Lancaster daily on the road of two. If there is a section of the State which really needs more train service, it is that portion contiguous to the Knoxville Division of the L. & N. between Lebanon and Corbin. To go to the city, where a few hours is all that one wishes to spend, it is necessary to go at night and return at night, or so in the day, pay for a night's lodging and then return a night. The increase in population in the South Eastern part of the State has made a marvelous increase in the travel from that section to the Central portions of the State. What we need is a train to leave Corbin early in the morning for Louisville, returning the same evening which would be unquestionably the most direct route, the division.

The railroad company is that given credit as being the history of the company shows that they are always ready to do their part, when circumstances and conditions demand it.
