THE RAILWAY HEARING.

The State Railway Commission continued its Oct. 12, next, hearing of the general complaint of discrimination in freight rates, filed against all railroad companies operating in Kentucky. The commission will refuse to allow the Oerzboro shippers, who originated the charges to withdraw, as they asked to do Tuesday, Oct. 4, Beckham Tuesday afternoon, retained former United States Senator William Lindsay, of New York, to represent the commonwealth in the investigation, and he and Attorney Bennett H. Young asked that the state be made a party complainant. After hearing preliminary motions here, the commission may adjourn to Louisville to hear testimony.

KILLED BY A BOLT. Every Bone in a Boy's Body Was Crushed.

Newport, Ky., Oct. 3.—Caught by a swiftly moving bolt and hurled against the ceiling in the Higgins Manufacturing Co.'s plant, at Fifth and Washington streets, Elmer Green, 15, was held as with a vice while all the power of machinery crushed against him until every bone in his body was broken. To add to the horrifying nature of the accident, the victim remained fastened in the death trap, for workmen gazing helplessly at him, until a physician arrived and cut loose the bolt. The men in the place had apparently lost presence of mind temporarily. Green did not live long enough to tell if he knew how he caught and was whirled to death.
