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THE LEGISLATURE. Measure to Prevent Weapon Carriers From Pleading Self-Defense.

Frankfort, Jan. 16.—Under the bill introduced in the senate by Senator Joe Johnson, of Nelson county, no person who has been convicted of carrying a deadly weapon shall be permitted to plead self-defense, and no testimony attempting to establish self-defense shall be submitted, provided it can be shown that the defendant carried concealed on his person a deadly weapon at any time within 12 hours before the act for which he is on trial was committed. It is estimated that this bill will largely decrease the criminal habit of carrying deadly weapons and to more than all the present laws. The bill was introduced in the Kentucky Senate on Jan. 10. All the members of the Workmen's Council in St. Petersburg have been arrested and the police claim to have found important documents and a list of names. Insiders are being becoming prominent in Russia.
