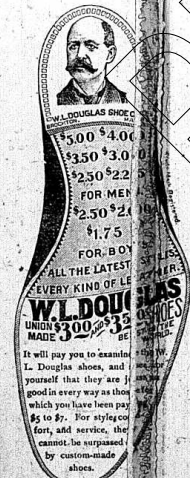

BULLET FROM A FLOBERT. It pierced the Head of a Life-Long Friend of Gov. Goebel.
Ovington, Ky., Jan. 22.—Seated upon a chair in the square little shop where he had lived for years on 12th street, near Harvard avenue, John May, one of the most unique characters in the city, was found dead. A Flobert bullet, which had entered the back of the head and passed through the brain, had caused his death. The rifle which belonged to a hunter and found beneath the agent's bed, but so far the police have been unable to ascertain any trace of the murderer. Sheriff Taylor held an inquest and ordered the police to arrest Edward Emmons, aged 32 years, the boarder at the May's place and the owner of the rifle. Always eccentric and peculiar, he had few friends, and one of being the friend who never deserted him was the late Gov. William Goebel, whom he had known from childhood, and whom he had often held on his knee for hours, telling him tales of the great world as he had read of it. Later he bought many of his books together with his young man, and the friendship cemented them last until the assassination of Gov. Goebel.
