ain sleep alone. It is a game paradise, with rich pastures for ponies. It was in this valley that the grandfather of Chief Joseph welcomed the daring explorers, Lewis and Clark. Speaking of them, Joseph said: "They talked straight, and our people made them a great feast. All the Nez Perce made friends with Lewis and Clark, and served to them just as though they were the friends of the white men."

Encroachments of the White Men. It was not to be expected that the Indian would be allowed to remain for ever un molested in the possession of this beautiful valley. But it could not last. There came a day when by means of presents and fair promises a portion of the land signed a treaty dividing their lands. Joseph's father was to sign away his birth-right, and the old chief said: "I will not do it. In 1863, another council was held. A chief, named Lawyer, with authority of a part of the tribe and more of the Nez Perce country, including the Wallowa Valley. The latter was the particular property of Joseph's own people; his boundaries, for years, had been marked by poles; had never been disturbed. The old chief said: "I will not do it. In the home of my people—the white man may take the land outside. Inside the boundary, all our people were born. It circles around the graves of our fathers, and we never give up their graves to any man."

In spite of the treaty, the Indians remained in un molested possession for several years, who the white men tried to encroach upon the boundaries. The Indians, and the Government asked for a treaty council. Joseph, owing to his father's age and illness, declined to attend. He refused, represented the Lapwai agency in Idaho and give up the valley, so the council came to naught.

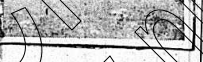

CHIEF JOSEPH AND MONUMENT VALLEY BY WARRIORS OF HIS TRIBE.



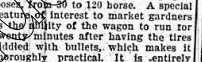

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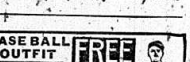
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**EASTER LILY GROWING.**  
TO BECOME AN AMERICAN INDUSTRY

GUY ELLIOTT MITCHELL.

The general policy of the Department of Agriculture has been to endeavor to produce at home plants to be grown abroad and shipped into the United States. This is just as true with regard to luxuries as to necessities, and especially applies to Easter lily. For some years efforts have been made to cultivate successfully the Easter lily in the South-eastern States, but it has been found that the climate of that section is not as favorable for the lily bulbs as it is in the Bermuda and Japan.

Experiments have demonstrated that bulbs of the Easter lily can be carried over a season in cold storage, with a result that they are benefited very materially as it subjects them to a condition approaching that existing in Japan, the native country of the species, where the bulbs are heavily covered with snow during the resting period. This discovery has opened new possibilities in the cultivation of the lily. Heretofore, bulbs have been planted in some parts of the South early in the fall, with the result that they sprouted considerably before the weather set in. When severe weather set in the plants were killed or severely injured. During the period before coming into bloom, plants rendered sickly during the winter often suffer severely from lack of moisture, resulting in poorly developed plants.

**On the Blue Bermuda Islands.**  
Lily growing on the Bermuda Islands is an exceedingly profitable industry. Practically all the land available for the production of bulbs is utilized for this purpose, and while the rotation of crops, together with the most ap-

**Orchard Notes.**

Soon is the time when the apple borer will emerge from the trunk of the tree in the shape of a fly and look about for crevices in the tree trunk in which to deposit her eggs. A wasp often recommended to take a hole and fill up each tree about six inches from the trunk where they can be easily gotten at and destroyed later.

May will be a good time to walk rapidly through the orchard and rub off the new shoots or water sprout on the trunks of the trees. If much pruning has been done these will be found in abundance. When soft and green, as they are during this month, they can be easily removed, pulled out by the roots, and when later they will have to be cut off, causing a liability to sprout again.

The propagator of the Department of Agriculture has been working on this particular line for a number of years, with every indication of success. In some instances, he has obtained blooming plants in from 7 to 9 months from germination of the seed, while in recent trials, as many as twelve magnificent blossoms have been cut from a plant within fourteen months after the plant has shown light above ground.

In order to further this class of work, the Department of Agriculture has obtained plots of land in Illinois and Oregon, where it is believed the Easter lily can be grown as profitably as in any other section of the world. A point greatly in favor of raising the Easter lily from seed, to constitute the crop of marketable bulbs, is that from one to two years' time is saved in the operation over the seed method. The results of the work of the Department of Agriculture in obtaining blooming plants so short a time after planting the seed would probably seem like a fair tale to the participants of the lily conference held in London in 1901. One of the papers read at that time states that many species of lily bulbs must have come from ten to twelve

If any top grafting has been done and the grafts have taken, all sprouts below the grafts should be rubbed off clean, allowing the full vigor to go into the graft.

For the best results fruit and other trees should be cultivated early and small during the spring and early summer, so that it is the time when most growth is made. When the fruit is small there is plenty of sap for vigorous wood growth, but after the fruit approaches maturity the wood growth decreases.

**Caring for Transplanted Trees.**  
It is well the first year a large tree is transplanted to put it in a shallow box or case of some material in diameter, in an upright position, and stimulate the tree by pouring down soap suds or other liquid which furnishes sub-irrigation and allows but little of the water to evaporate.

Trees should also be watered from time to time if they rapidly grow is desired. proved methods of selection and cultivation, would undoubtedly be eventually a good policy for the growers to pursue, yet, except in the case of the most progressive growers, there is little likelihood of this being done. Growth would materially decrease the revenue of lily farming for the time being. This will readily be understood when it is stated that an acre of lilies will bring from \$1,000 to \$2,000. Some growers on the islands who thoroughly appreciate the importance of careful methods are using small bulbs in preference to scales, and are selecting and fertilizing carefully, but they are heavily handicapped by the many small growers who cultivate their crops according to old methods; and in these cases there is no selection with a view to producing and perpetuating good types. Little manure is used. The methods of propagation are very faulty and they have not been changed since the beginning of the industry in the islands. For instance, in the growing of the bulbs for American markets the smaller sizes are planted in the fall and harvested in the fall or before the bulbs have thoroughly ripened. In the process of handling, many of the immature scales drop from the bulbs. These are thrown away, as they are thought to be but are carefully saved and planted with a view to producing small bulbs. These bulbs ultimately form a large part of the general crop.

As a result of all these conditions the bulb markets of Bermuda have become impregnated with disease, so that, at the present time it is almost impossible to secure a bulb of any variety which does not show some trace of disease.

**The American Method.**  
Investigations made by the Department of Agriculture have shown that the use of seeds instead of scales, larger bulbs can be secured in a much shorter time than can be produced by the scale method. Moreover, it has been demonstrated that in this way

## THOUSANDS FROM OTHER STATES

Will Be Here For The Conference of Education in The South

QUESTION OF ACCOMMODATIONS BECOMES IMPORTANT, AND CITIZENS ARE ASKED TO HELP—SOMETHING FOR THE WORK OF CAMPUS COMMITTEE.

Since local preparations were begun for the reception and entertainment of the Conference, for Education in the South, which meets in Lexington, May 1, 3 and 4, a vast amount of work has been accomplished by the local Executive Committee.

MANY LETTERS RECEIVED. Letters have been pouring in upon the corresponding secretary of the conference, and the writers would be present at the conference, and most of them asking that quarters be reserved for them. The indications point to the probability of so many persons being present from points outside the State of Kentucky that at the meeting of the Executive Committee the question of how to dispose of them was discussed most seriously. It was estimated that with the undoubted large attendance from the Southern States, the strangers from other States will number at least two thousand.

WORK SPEAKERS. It is impossible at this date to present the complete program. The address of welcome will be delivered by Hon. J. C. V. Beckham, Governor of Kentucky. Among the other speakers will be Prof. N. S. Fisher, of Harvard University; Dr. Brown Ayres, President of the University of Tennessee; Hon. John W. Yerkes, of Washington, D. C. and Governor Peck, of Missouri.

## NO SYMPATHY.

A farmer from Georgetown, Ohio, writing to the Enquirer, concerning the coal strike says:

"Your thousands of farmer readers have but little sympathy for the men engaged in the present coal strike. Farmers and their hired men do not have an eight hour day and hired men at \$14 to \$20 per month work right along with their employers, from 12 to 14 hours a day the year through, with no thought that they are being ill treated and no intention of striking and damaging their employer's property. Young men with good common school education will attend our agricultural colleges from one to three years and then accept jobs as herdsmen and farm and dairy foremen at \$40 to \$50 per month, knowing that many times they will be compelled to put in 16 hours a day. We see the statement that coal miners get \$2.50, \$3.84 and even \$5 per day for eight hours, and we know that even \$1 a day will bring in more money than two men can dig out of an average 100-hundred-acre farm valued at \$5,000 outside of the teams and implements.

True the farmer has no well dressed walking clothes to one in and around stir up strife between him and his employees, and, thanks to the intelligence of hired men on farms, such a walking delegate would get cold comfort from them. The main body of workmen everywhere seem to be a flock of the wags they are getting, and such being the case, why do they listen to the oily talk of labor agitators, who are well paid, travel in comfort, even in luxury, smoke cigars and give water at first class hotels 25 cent per day? The first of this and a prophetic newspaper man says one of these agitators do the things above mentioned a few months ago and two weeks later the newspaper man saw skilled workmen, satisfied with their day pay they were getting, called out on a strike because other workmen called only the day they were getting but were being used as much as the agitators thought they should have.
