JESUS DESCRIBED BY PILATE OFFICER.

The Official Correspondent has just made public the text of a letter written by Pontius Pilate, an officer of the Roman Empire, which, as announced last week, was recently discovered in the library of the Lazarist Fathers in Rome, says a Berlin cable to the New York World.

"It is this letter proves authentic it may be considered the most important historical document ever discovered regarding the personality of Jesus. It purports to have been written just as Christ was beginning his preaching through Judea. It reads:

"I have learned O. Caesar, that you desired some information regarding the virtuous man called Jesus; the Christ, whom the people consider a prophet and his disciples regard as the Son of God, Creator of heaven and earth.

"It is a fact that every one hears wonderful things told of him. To be brief, he makes the dead rise and heals the sick.

"His is a man of medium size, whose appearance indicates both great sweetness and such an amount of dignity that one feels in looking upon him that he must love him, and in the same time fear him.

"His hair down to his ears, is of the color of his walnuts and hangs down on his shoulders as a light blonde and clear mass; it is parted in the middle, according to the fashion of the Nazarenes. His beard of the same color of his hair is curly, and although not very long is parted in the middle like his hair.

"His eyes are rather severe and shine like the sun; it is impossible for anyone to look at him long in the face.

"When he speaks he speaks fast but very soon he himself begins to shed tears. Even in the most severe moments he is affable and pleasant.

"It is said that no one has ever seen him in anger, and that he speaks very often.

"Every one finds that his conversation is very agreeable and attractive. He is not at all vain or in public, and when he appears he carries himself modestly.

"The answers are very distinguished and he speaks intelligently. It is perhaps because the Emperor is the looking upon him ever seen in these parts.

"If you wish to see him, O. Caesar, you write me once, let me know and I shall send him to you. If you wish to see him, you may study him, he is well up in every branch of knowledge.

"He is a man of great intellect and without hindrance.

"Many people make fun of him when they see him coming, but as soon as they are in his presence they tremble and adore him.

"The Nazarenes say that they have never seen a man like him; nor heard teachings like those he imparts.

"Many believe that he is a god, and others assert that he is the thing of a Caesar.

"These naughty Jews give me much trouble. They say that he is never given trouble to anybody but that in the contrary, he tries to make everybody happy."
