Kentucky fared especially well in the distribution of public buildings by the 57th Congress, which has just adjourned. Danville gets \$80,000, Bowling Green \$100,000, Lebanon \$50,000, London \$105,000, Mayfield \$145,000, Owensboro \$75,000, Paris \$40,000, Winchester \$45,000 and Cattlesburg \$7,000.

The following law passed by the recent legislature may be of interest to many in this section. It provides that a company, other than a corporation, shall do business under the real name of the persons composing the company or at least one real name shall be used in the style of the company. The real name is used the company must use with the County Clerk a statement of the name of the individuals who make up the firm. A firm may do business under the name of John Smith & Co. John Smith is a real member of the company. If he is not, it is under a name assumed name, as The Smithville Mercantile Co., then a statement may be filed of record in the County Clerk's office giving the names of the individuals who compose the company. A violation of this law subjects offenders to a fine of \$25 to \$100 or imprisonment from 10 to 30 days. The law is an important one, as it effects a multitude of wrong doings business throughout the State.
