DRIVE UP TO JAILER'S DOOR, Sent His Carriage Away, and Asked To Be Locked Up.

Daville, Ky.—Several days ago the large stock barn, located a mile from town, on the Lexington pike, belonging to John Weisler, was burned. The property was valued at \$15,000, and the fire was attributed to spontaneous combustion. James Spaulding, wealthy planter, residing three miles from town, drove his carriage down Fourth street, stopped in front of Jailer Fitzgerald's residence, stepped to the door and rang the bell. The officer responded, and Spaulding entered his room and took the carriage. He and his wife were in the carriage when he burned the Weisler barn and treated to lock up the jail. He said that he bore no ill feeling toward Mr. Weisler, but that at times he just felt mean, and that his old dog was so born mean. He stated that on the night of the fire he felt that his ill-feeling depended on the burning of the barn, and that he got out of his buggy, touched a lighted match to the barn and then drove home and retired. He further stated that the burning of the barn had not been intended, but that he had been feeling even meaner since the fire than before, and believed it necessary that he be locked up last he commit other similar deeds.

BATTLE IN THE STREET. White Men and Negro Fire Hurt. Shots, But Only a Male Is Hurt.

London, Ky.—In a street fight between several white men on one side and Robert Butler, a negro, on the other, Butler was shot and killed, and a male was shot through the rider. The battle took place in front of the store of James Phillips and the building was pierced by several bullets. Butler was a member of a street crew known as the 'Rye' crew. He was shot by a white man named George Johnson, who is a member of the same crew. The shooting occurred on the night of August 14, 1906, at about 10 o'clock. Butler was shot in the chest and died shortly thereafter. The white men who were in the fight were not injured.

BENTRIES Fired in the Men Who Attempted To Rob the Bank.

The woman was arrested and charged with the theft of the ring.

POLITICS AND POLITICIANS.

W. J. Bryan, who is now in Paris, confirms the report from Melbourne that he intends to visit Australia. He says he will start immediately after the November election.

Republicans in the Tenth congressional district nominated Harry B. Anderson for Congress, and adopted a resolution calling on Theodore Roosevelt to become the Republican candidate for President again in 1908.

The primary subcommittee of the Democratic State Executive Committee held a meeting in Lexington Tuesday. It was decided to move the headquarters of the subcommittee from Frankfort to Louisville. The official call for the primary will be issued in a few days.

Mr. Bryan's itinerary upon reaching the United States will be as follows: New York, August 30; New Haven and Bridgeport, Conn., Aug. 31; Jersey City, N. J., September 1; Chicago, September 4; Lincoln, Neb., September 5; St. Louis, September 11; Louisville, September 12, and Cincinnati, September 13, stopping at Kansas City on his way home.

CALL FOR CONGRESSIONAL PRIMARY

1. A primary election is hereby called for Saturday, the first day of September, 1906, in all the voting precincts in the Eighth Congressional District of Kentucky...

2. Every candidate who desires to file his name printed on the ballots to be used in said primary must deposit with the Chairman of this Committee...

3. Said election shall be held, in all respects as required by law for holding said primary, and a uniform ballot shall be used in every precinct...

4. The Democratic County Committee of each county shall appoint the officers in each precinct to hold the election, and they to select the judges to be held by the candidates at least ten days before said election...

5. On the next day after returns have been made, the County Committee shall meet and canvass the returns, and certify the same to the Chairman of the District Committee...

6. The Secretary of the County Committee directed to give public notice of this election, as is required by law, and without delay.

7. In the event there is a surplus remaining after defraying the expenses of said primary, it shall be returned to those by whom the same was paid, in proportion to the amount by them paid, and if there should be a deficit, then the candidates shall be assessed to supply such deficit...

8. This registration shall be required in those cities where no registration has yet been had under the general election law.
