DEMOCRATIC TICKET.

WILLIAM JENNINGS BRYAN says that the paramount issue at this time is the trusts. In 1896 it was the silver question and in 1900 imperialism. On the money question he spoke in parts as follows: "Our opponents have derived not only criticism pleasure, but also political advantages from the division caused in our party by the money question. They ought not, therefore, to be grudge us the satisfaction that we find in the fact that unexpected conditions have removed the cause of our differences and permitted us to present a united front on present issues. The unlooked-for and unprecedented increase in the price of gold had brought a victory to both the advocates of gold and the advocates of bimetalism—the former keeping the gold standard which they wanted and the latter securing the large volume of money for which they contended. We, who favor bimetalism are satisfied with our victory if the friends of monometallicism are satisfied with theirs. And we can invite them to a contest for zeal and endurance in the effort to restore to the people the rights which have been gradually taken from them by the trusts."

PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT authorized the announcement that the reform in spelling recommended by the committee which had been created by the executive committee of the National Democratic Association in 1904 and 1905, as the time of the Fifth State Development Convention at Winchester, active preparations have been begun in Winchester for the convention and will be pushed from now until the meeting in October. It promises to be the largest and most important gathering of the year in the State. A plan for a permanent organization will be presented to the Convention for adoption, which it is believed will make the Association a stronger organization and give it greater power toward carrying on its objects.

Kentucky is far behind what it can be in its position as an industrial and commercial State, its resources having been neglected and its commercial and manufacturing development overlooked. The State Development movement was started by business men with the patriotic desire to see the State forge ahead and grow to be among the first of states in her industrial importance. During the four years of its existence, the Association has done much along the line of advocating needed legislation and the shaping of politics that have helped our manufacturing and business interests.

Much of interest to the business people of the State will be discussed at the convention at Winchester, and plans mapped out for its work. Speakers of national reputation and specialists on particular subjects of agriculture, mining, manufacturing, etc., will address the Convention.

Delegates to the convention will be named by the County Judge of each county, Mayor of each city, and by each commercial club or organization. Anyone who wishes to attend the Convention can be appointed a delegate direct upon application to the Secretary of the Convention. Last year at Louisville about 500 delegates were present, and some 90 counties of the State represented by business men of the county.

We hope that some of the most active and best business men of this county will go as delegates to the convention and will go prepared to thoroughly present our resources, industries, products, etc., and to be able to tell what we need in the way of industrial development and have to offer to investors and prospective citizens. These matters should be looked into and carefully prepared, and arranged to be made for use at the Convention.

Judge J. M. Benton, of Winchester, was elected Vice-Chairman of the Executive Committee, and P. J. Altier, of Winchester, is Secretary of the Convention.

The claim against the United States Government, owned by the Rural Prohibition Church at Harrodsburg, is being likely be allowed with a short time. Malcolm A. Cole, attorney for the government before the U. S. Court of Claims at Washington, was in Harrodsburg Monday and Tuesday looking into the claim. Several deposits were taken and it looks as if the church may get all or a greater part of its claim allowed. This claim of the church is for damage done to their building and for depreciation of its use during the war.

At the time of the bloody battle of Perryville the church was forcibly taken by the commanding general and used as a hospital. The windows were torn out, the windows broken, the well defaced, the carpet ripped, the furnace destroyed and the building generally injured. It was held by the soldiers for seven months, and the damages were kept out of his actual income figured up about \$5,000, and \$1,000 was added for depreciation of use.
